## NON-TRIVIAL PURSUITS

### Weekly challenge from your Faith Formation Team (7/25/2021)

Another powerful type from the Old Testament which Christians see as fulfilled in Jesus is the terrifying story of the Akedah, or “binding” of Isaac, when God tells Abraham to offer his son as a sacrifice. Re-read that account, if you wish, in Genesis 22:1-19. What details in the story are echoed in the events of Jesus’ Passion?

### Answer to question 7/18/2021

Jesus said, “For as Jonah was three days and three nights in the belly of the whale, so will the son of man be three days and three nights in the heart of the earth” and “For as Jonah became a sign to the men of Nineveh, so will the Son of Man be to this generation” This example highlights an important caution about typology. To say an Old Testament person or event is a “type” of Christ does not mean that everything about that person or event is symbolic or Christlike. The story of Jonah begins with his cowardly attempt to run away rather than follow God’s command, and ends with his selfishly whining bitterly in response to God’s merciful sparing of the Ninevites. Clearly the character of Jonah was far different from that of Jesus. And Jesus was truly dead in the tomb, while in the Old Testament story, Jonah is very much alive and praying in the belly of the fish.

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### *Bread of life: sign, test, and teaching*

During Ordinary time the Lectionary presents stories and teachings from Jesus’ everyday ministry. This week’s readings focus on seeing and understanding God’s care and feeding of disciples.

#### **Gospel (Jn 6:1-15)**

This week the gospel evangelist changes from Mark to John. For the next five weeks, John’s gospel recounts the story of Jesus feeding five thousand (Jn 6:1-71). Today’s pericope describes the *sign* itself; the coming weeks’ pericopes, from Jesus’ “bread of life” discourse, *explain and interpret Jesus’ sign*.

**The sign of feeding.** Jesus already *knows what he will do*, but he uses the opportunity to *test* and teach his disciples. Philip and Andrew *see only limits* to Jesus’ request (lack of money, only five loaves and two fish); they haven’t grasped Jesus’ teaching about unlimited nourishment in Jn 4:32-34. John describes Jesus’ feeding sign a few words: *took, gave thanks, and distributed*. The people eat until they are filled, leaving twelve baskets of leftovers. Jesus’ sign teaches about God’s *superabundant care*.

**The sign’s meanings.** In Mark and Matthew, Jesus is moved by *compassion* to feed the shepherdless crowd. In John, Jesus acts to satisfy the crowd’s *physical* hunger, while also revealing that God’s kingdom can fulfill their *spiritual* hunger as well. John connects Jesus’ sign with stories and themes from *Hebrew scripture*, including manna in the wilderness (Ex 16:4-35, Nm 11:7-9), Elisha’s feeding the hundred (2 Kgs 4:42-44, first reading), and Ps 23. He also uses *liturgical language* (“take,” “give thanks,” “distribute,” “reclining” for a meal) to connect the sign with Eucharistic practices in his *ekklesia*. Jesus’ sign anticipates the *messianic feast*; it is a parable-in-action that God’s kingdom is near. The sign also foreshadows the *Eucharist*, the believing community’s *eschatological meal*.

#### **Summary and reflection**

This week’s readings ask us to think about how we see and interpret God’s care. Elisha, at God’s prompting, feeds a hundred people with a few barley loaves. The Ephesians author urges the community look for God in every aspect of creation. Jesus offers the sign of feeding five thousand to reveal a God who cares for people’s physical and spiritual needs and to reveal himself as prophet and messiah. How do we see God’s actions in our world? Do we limit God by seeing God with limited human understanding, or can we see beyond our own limits to God’s superabundance? Do we live in a small world, restricted to approved family and friends, or do we bear with one another, inviting all into community? Do we limit ourselves by fulfilling only our own needs, or do we accept God’s unlimited good gifts and share them freely?

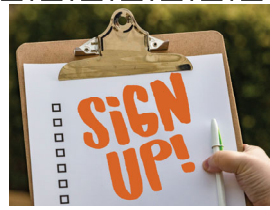


### Are you or someone you know interested in the Catholic Faith?

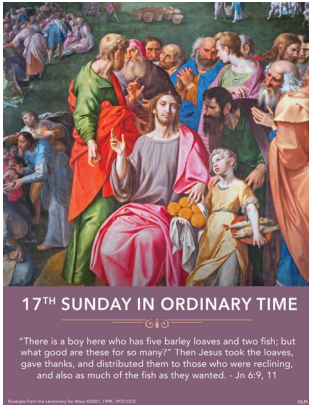

## 17<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time (B-2021)



**The account of the feeding of the 5000 is the only miracle recorded in each one of the four gospels!** The Evangelist John is true to his portrait of a more self-sufficient Jesus who knows what is in everyone. Miracles are "signs" that point to a reality beyond themselves, to the identity and truth of Jesus.

It is Passover, but the disciples and the crowds that follow Jesus to a mountain by the side of the Sea of Galilee are a long way from where the religious leaders would expect them to be for this festival, namely, in Jerusalem. St John's account is concerned with how people respond to Jesus. The crowd is enthusiastic about his healing of the sick and they hope that they will get something out of their following of this miracle worker. Although he knows what he will do, Jesus asks Phillip what they should do about buying bread for the people, and Phillip's response is logical: it would cost more than half the annual wage of a laborer to give this number even a few crumbs, and Jesus and his disciples don't have that kind of money! Andrew's response is pragmatic, producing one small boy with five coarse barley loaves and two dried fish, a typical and minimal meal for two poor people, not 5000!

All these responses are inadequate, then as now, for what is most important is not practical satisfaction, not logic or reason, not even the miracle that Jesus will work. The gospel concern is that people see what happens as a "sign" that points to something more and beyond, to who Jesus really is, and how he will satisfy not only empty stomachs but also empty hearts. Jesus takes the little that is offered to him and, in his hands, it becomes an abundant meal. Jewish memories and Christian eucharistic themes are woven together as Jesus takes the bread, gives thanks, and, unlike the synoptic gospel accounts, distributes both the bread and fish himself. The Evangelist John is not concerned with practical distribution methods, but with a teaching emphasizing that, in this Passover feeding, Jesus becomes a personally nourishing presence to each person. This food that he distributes is more precious than the manna, for the people were not to leave any manna until the next day because it would decay. Whatever fragments are left over from the lakeside meal are not perishable; they are to be gathered up and cared for by the disciples.

The response of the crowd is to hail Jesus as a prophet. Knowing their intent to "*carry him off*" to manipulate him to their own political and material expectations of what the Messiah should be and do, Jesus "*withdrew*" only to return later for a deeper engagement with the crowd, as we will hear in the continuation of the bread of life discourse these coming Sundays.

**We bring to this Eucharist the little that we have, all the fragments of our inadequacies, our successes and failures, our hopes and fears. We offer them to God with the fruits of the earth and the work of human hands, and these small gifts are transformed and offered back to us as the gift of Jesus' sacramental Body and Blood, into whose life we are gathered.** This is not logic, pragmatism, or self-satisfaction ... this is our Eucharistic thanksgiving for God's abundant and eternal generosity in our lives
