

## **Please remember these Daily checks:**

- Fever (100.0°F or higher) or chills
- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- New loss of taste or smell
- Sore throat
- Headache when in combination with other symptoms
- Muscle aches or body aches
- Nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea
- Fatigue-when in combination with other symptoms
- Nasal congestion or runny nose (not due to other known causes, such as allergies) when in combination with other symptoms

## **FLU Vaccine:**

Massachusetts students of all ages (6 months and up) will now be required to get a flu vaccine by December 31, 2020 in order to attend school unless medically exempt, the Department of Public Health announced August 19, 2020. The new vaccine requirement is a step to reduce flu-related illness and the overall impact of respiratory illness during the COVID-19 pandemic. It is more important now than ever to get a flu vaccine because flu symptoms are very similar to those of COVID-19 and preventing the flu will save lives and preserve healthcare resources.
