The act of putting on ashes symbolizes fragility and mortality, and the need to be redeemed by the mercy of God. Far from being a merely external act, the Church has retained the use of ashes to symbolize that attitude of internal penance to which all the baptized are called during Lent. Catholics of age 14 and older abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, and healthy Catholics from age 18-59 fast, limiting themselves to 1 full meal and 2 smaller snacks.

Confessions are Monday-Saturday before every Mass. **There will be no confessions scheduled on Ash Wednesday.**

STATIONS OF THE CROSS

Friday Mass at 6pm followed by Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament and meditations of the stations of the cross.

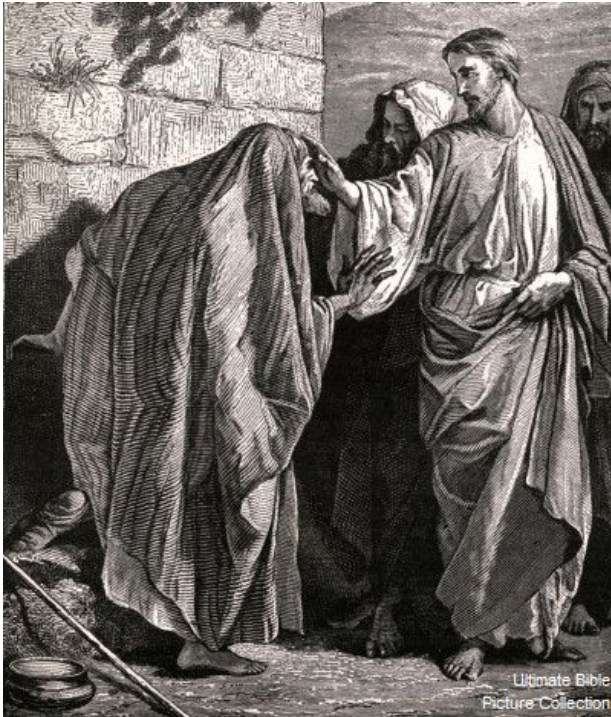

THIS WEEK'S GOSPEL MEDITATION

GOSPEL: MARK 1:40-45



We see both the divine power and the divine compassion of Jesus in this act of healing. The divine power was necessary in all instantaneous cures. Even if the diseases were curable, the ordinary process of nature took time to fight off the causes and to return to normality. Therefore, where there was an instantaneous recovery, some power above nature, some supernatural cause brought it about. But where the disease was incurable, as real leprosy then was, to remove it by a simple word of command was more emphatically still the result of divine power. This divine power Jesus had, for he was himself divine, the Son of God.
