In 1893, Senate Bill 730 was introduced by Mr. James Kyle from South Dakota. The bill was one sentence long, and had one simple purpose—to make “Labor’s Holiday” a national holiday, along with Christmas, New Year’s Day, Washington’s Birthday, Memorial Day and Independence Day.

It came at a time of industrialization, as advancements in technology were driving industry. With increased production, prices declined and accessibility increased, but came at the cost of harsher work conditions. Long hours, unsafe working conditions, child labor, low wages, few rights and a host of other problems became more commonplace in centers of industry. This was not just a problem here in the US, however, but around the world. Hence in 1891 Pope Leo XIII wrote one of his great encyclicals – **Rerum Novarum: On Capital and Labor**. In it he outlined seven interrelated key principles that form the basis of Catholic social teaching.

The **Dignity of the Human Person** is the principle that we are all created equally, with the breath of life, in the image and likeness of God. As such, persons should be respected and treated in just ways. This includes time off to worship God (no work on Sundays), no long hours, periods of rest, safe and moral working conditions, fair wages and a full day’s work for that pay, no overtaxing by the state, and giving time to fulfill family obligations.

The **Common Good** is the principle that we need to strive for the highest good for all people. Our highest good is not material wealth. It refers rather to the development of the person, of virtue, of goodness. In an age when labor and capital were pitted against each other, Pope Leo XIII reminded everyone of their need of the other. While some individuals might possess the financial ability to undertake a great work, they required laborers to help them. In the same way, laborers relied upon others to provide the factory to work in, the boat to operate, etc. As such, each should concern themselves with the good of other and the good of all, because we need and rely on each other.

Subsidiarity is the principle that governments should not intervene in things that can be taken care of by families or communities. States should serve families, not vice versa. Whatever level is closest to individuals tends to be the one that can serve them the best. Sometimes it isn't possible, which is why the larger entities exist. But the rights and duties of parents, families, communities, etc. should be respected and aided as far as possible.


Participation is the principle that every person in society has gifts and abilities which work not only for their good, but the good of others. It is through these that we reach our highest good, and help others do the same. We were created to live in communion, and so we must participate in the civic community in which we live. We all have different gifts, and each of these are needed to function properly as a society.

Solidarity is the principle that we have a responsibility to one another—whether members of our family, community, nation or world. Pope Leo XIII reminded us that we have a particular responsibility to protect and care for those who are unable to provide for themselves, who are injured, etc. This duty is not the primary responsibility of the state, though it can assist—but of individuals. He reminded us of the need to cultivate the virtues of charity and generosity. Sometimes the state needs to step in, but it should do so warily so as not to violate the rights of individuals unless necessary (cases of abuse, exploitation, danger, etc.).

The **Right of Private Property** is the principle that individuals should earn just wages, and through them be able to provide for one’s family. Pope Leo XIII argued against the redistribution of wealth or the confiscation of private property, noting that workers and the poor would suffer the most. Ownership of the land leads to a greater responsibility, pride and care for it. And from this flows a justice that the owner should share in the fruit of his labors. This also allows us to grow in charity (and solidarity) by having the ability to help others and build up their dignity. When freely chosen, this promotes growth in virtue, as opposed to when it is forced.

Universal Destination of Goods is the principle that God created everything on the earth for the good of all peoples. Everyone should have food and water and the other basic needs and rights of life, such as shelter and clothing. Creation was for our benefit, which means we must also care for it so it can serve future generations.


New for 2018-19, we will be bulk buying school supplies and passing on the savings to parents. School supplies per student is dependent on grade and will be communicated in August.

campaign is coming, and we hope to reach out to every person in the Archdiocese of

Seattle, as we know each person can help accomplish so much. When asked to do something big, whether a project or donation, it is often easiest to take the biggest piece and divide it into smaller parts. Making your gift into a pledge can help maximize your ability to support the worthy goals of the *Called to Serve as Christ* campaign. Breaking down payments into annual, semi-annual, quarterly or even monthly payments can help you budget your gift. If a family of four is asked to consider a gift of \$3,600 to the campaign, it may seem like too much to do at one time. If the family divides it annually, it may seem more manageable at \$1,200 over three years. But, even more manageable, if the family chooses to break it down even further, to monthly, it would come out to \$100 per month over three years, or about the amount the family might spend eating out at a restaurant during the month. Each family will need to decide on their own what is appropriate and meaningful for their specific situation. Soon, Archbishop Sartain will ask each of us to consider a gift in the hopes that all of us pledge to support the campaign's important goals in some way. He will ask us to ask ourselves: *what can we sacrifice for the next three years for these goals?*
