The Reality of Evil

Graffiti is unfortunately not surprising. A few times a year, it appears on the campus—usually small, and to most of us, unintelligible. The most frequent location is on the back of the school—facing Seattle Lutheran High School.

This past weekend, though, something altogether different happened. In the late hours of Sunday night, or the early hours of Monday morning, the Church and people of Holy Rosary were assaulted. As people arrived Monday morning for prayer, they were greeted by several graffiti marks—on two of the main doors and on the doorstep. The police confirmed what we already knew—it had no apparent meaning to them, no gang affiliation, etc. Which made sense—since the predominant symbol was a pentagram. While it has a varied history, in the modern spiritual context, it is most often connected with the occult and/or Satanism. This is confirmed by some of the other pieces also included in the graffiti on the side of the church building.

Whether it was someone who was mentally ill, someone pulling a well-informed prank, or someone fully conscious of their meaning, in the end it doesn't matter since the invocation of evil is real whether intended or not. Given the locations, though, it is my guess that it was done in true earnest since the signs were placed on the doors and doorway—and therefore connected to those who pass through them, as well as on the side of the building hidden behind bushes—and hopefully therefore lasting longer. In my last parish, we had someone leave a swastika in salt in the parking lot for the Sunday Mass goers to see and drive over as they arrived. While this was quickly washed away with blessed hot water before anyone else arrived, it was also done in the grass in front of the church—to leave a longer lasting imprint, or so they intended. While the police were dumbfounded since they weren't aware of any Nazi-connected groups in the area, to us it was a clear sign—we were being branded with a symbol of hate.

Signs and symbols have meaning. “West Seattle Bridge” is a sign that means something—it refers to a concrete reality. There is no such thing as a harmless symbol of evil. It invokes what it symbolizes—whether fully intended or not. Words, signs, symbols—they all have meaning, and power.

On Friday of this past week, at the end of Mass, we processed around the Church praying the Litany of the Saints. Prayers of exorcism were included, as well as blessing with holy water. Would this have happened inside the Church, it would be the bishop himself who would have to come and bless and rededicate the space. Because the invocation of evil is real—whether fully intended or not. What has been set aside for the Lord—must be reset aside again. Evil is real—and not something to mess with—as its only goal is to consume and destroy.

In Christ, we have nothing to fear from evil. In and through His death, Jesus conquered the Evil One. What appeared as a moment of victory for Satan was quickly transformed through Jesus' Resurrection. It is a powerful scene which is so well analogized by CS Lewis in *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe*—the death of Aslan, the apparent exultant evil queen, the rejoicing of her minions—only to face Aslan, risen from the dead.

In Baptism, we become God's children—and so long as we do not leave Him, nothing can pull us away. In this Sacrament we share in the death and Resurrection of Christ. Yes, oppression and possession are real—because through our own actions and choices we can open ourselves up to the Evil One. Not that it automatically results in what we see in the movies (which sometimes accurately portrays reality—though rarely), but when we leave Christ, which is the very definition of sin, when we turn away from His goodness, of course we are opening the door for that which is not good. The Gospels are filled with examples of exorcisms, and this is one of the powers that Jesus hands on to His Apostles as seen in the Acts of the Apostles. Today it is still a ministry—though restricted to those specially trained, and something which only takes place after a long process including meetings with counselors to determine whether the source of the problems are truly spiritual or not, and after frequent recourse to the Sacraments.

The Truth is that these are our best defense against the Devil—filling ourselves with the grace of God, and entering into a deep and mystical communion with Him through these seven gifts. Once we have been baptized, once we have become God's own, staying there by regular, good Confessions and being sustained on the Eucharist are God's greatest helps to us. Evil is real. Sin is real. To deny these is to buy into one of the Father of Lies' greatest lies. There are things that are of God, and there are things that are not. There is goodness, Truth, beauty and love—and things which are not. There is light, and there is darkness—the absence of light. There is good, and there is evil—the distortion or absence of good. There is God, and there is the Devil—one of his fallen angels who chose not to live with Him forever, and now spends the remainder of created time trying to separate others from Him. Let us be sure that in our own lives, we are always fleeing from sin and evil—remaining always with the Lord.
