

The meeting has been rescheduled for Tuesday, September 22, at 7:30 pm on Zoom. The link is on the events page of our website. All are welcome.



PASTOR'S NOTE



Forgiven!

Growing up with two older sisters, being the youngest and the only boy in my family, my sisters Lisa and Linda and I would often get into sibling arguments. It was natural to fight when we were all squeezed in the back seat of my parents Oldsmobile Cutlass Supreme; we would argue who would be the lucky one to

have to sit in the middle (usually it was me) or we would argue over food at the dinner table. This time of year we would be in Ocean City, Maryland for our annual family summer vacation arguing over seashells, a miniature golf game, or who gets the last piece of pizza or cheese fries as we walked along the boardwalk.

Anytime we would get into arguments, my parents would sit us down, tell us to take a deep breath, and remind us to say we were sorry! I can remember my parents saying to me, "Tom, what do you say?" I would respond... "I'm sorry"! This weekend we celebrate the Twenty-Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time. All of the readings focus on forgiveness.

In the first reading from Sirach, we read how a wise teacher urges us to extend to others the forgiveness we seek from God. In the second reading from Paul to the Romans, we are reminded that we belong to Christ the Lord in life and death. We die as servants of the Risen Lord. In the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus proclaims the parable of the unforgiving servant. The king forgives the servants debt showing mercy and forgiveness. When the servant encounters a fellow servant who owes him a modest amount, he demands full payment immediately. Mercy and forgiveness cannot be earned, they come from the heart with no limitations.

We are called to live the commandments as the way we honor our covenant with God. Revenge and hate have no place in our relationship with God and others and treating others with mercy gives us peace. Like God, may we be kind and merciful to others, slow to anger and rich in compassion.

Reflections

Fr. David Taylor



Forgive us our trespasses. The Lord's Prayer is one of the most compelling statements about forgiveness and reconciliation. It is an essential part of the Mass and many of our daily devotions. It also speaks of a peace of mind so necessary for our daily faith.

We live in a world that often looks for revenge and retribution. This is the root of so much unhappiness in our lives. Jesus taught that forgiveness should be a way of life.

The gospel gives us a striking parable. The decision to forgive should be unconditional and in gratitude. It does

not depend upon the actions of others. If we are struggling with anger and a need for a grudge, we must take it to God in prayer. There is no other way to have peace of mind.

Many find it difficult to forgive themselves. Living in guilt can be a hurtful and painful experience. This can linger on long after others have forgiven us. This can be most challenging to our peace of mind and real happiness. We cannot undo the past but it should never hinder the quality of how we can live today.

We are living in difficult times. We must not let the past prevent all the good we can do today.

Over the past few weeks I have been focusing, in this space, on the three challenges facing the Catholic Church in the 21st century and beyond: (1) The church must be evangelical in the sense that it must respond to the growth of radical individualism, tribalism, materialism, secularism, and the polarization of

our society and of the world. These may be called the "signs of our times." We must have answers to the needs and the desires that drive these trends in our times. The church cannot afford to try to ignore or hide from these trends, but we also cannot enter into the public arena as political and ideological partisans. We must not add to the anger and the suspicion that characterize the current public discourse. The answer to the needs and desires of our times must not only be intellectual, it must also -- and especially -- take the form of the physical presence of the Christian in the world and in the lives of our neighbors.

(2) The second challenge is that in order for the church to respond and influence these "signs of our times" we must increasingly rely on the laity to be the leaven in the bread and the light in the darkness. As the director and editor-in-chief of the Catholic News Service, Greg Erlandson recently pointed out: "Whether we are talking about the needs of Christian education, or about the role of the laity in the Church, or about the role of the Church in the world, the mission statement of the Christian [can] be summarized as 'to rouse the sleeping ones'". We have to wake people up, and this begins with waking up ourselves. We must allow God to rouse us from our slumber and our complacency.

(3) The third challenge is that in order for the laity to evangelize our culture they must themselves be evangelized not only by the knowledge of the head, but also by the knowledge of the heart. This is true for the clergy also. We must be evangelized by encounters within the context of a community. Nobody, not even the cloistered, are evangelized on their own. We are part of a larger community of faith and we are shaped by our proximity to each other. This may seem particularly antithetical in these days of physical and social distancing, but proximity, presence, community, and person-to-person encounters are essential to what it means to be Christian.

This is also true about our relationship with Christ. As the founder of the international ecclesial lay movement "Communion and Liberation", Luigi Giussani once said: "Christianity is not an ideology; it is people who have met Christ." In Christ, we Christians are bound not to an abstraction or an ideology, but to the presence of a person who walked the streets of Galilee and Jerusalem and who lives even today beyond the constraints of space and time, whose real presence is found within the sacrament of the Eucharist, and who dwells within our hearts and in the midst of our community.

The Christian of the 21st century must be characterized by openness, friendship, intellectual engagement, and cultural fearlessness. It is only through personal encounters, the presence of other persons, and the personhood of Jesus Christ that we grow into a mature spirituality.
