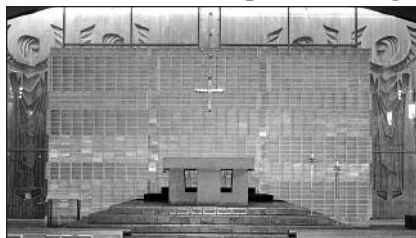

Designed by Robert Jones, an outer concrete wall houses a smaller glass-enclosed nave area. Frank Kacmarcik served as art consultant. By one report, this building has received more awards than any other parish church in the United States. The church building is featured in many publications, including *The Catholic Encyclopedia*.

Rev. Paul Holmes, S.T.D. Dies Domini: God's Joyful Rest and Our Joyous Work

How do we celebrate a God who rests? It is, according to John Paul II, a "mysterious rest" that sheds light on the nuptial relationship between God and Israel, and between Christ and his Church. The *Dies Domini* is indeed a mysterious, multi-layered, and holy artifact: a day of joyful "God-rest," during which we participate in a joyous "God-work" that never ends. Because *Christ* is the Sabbath, we therefore come to church on the Day of the Lord to die and to rise—for ourselves, and for others. And if Jesus said, "My Father is working still, and I am working," we must examine how our Eucharistic remembering does the justice such work requires. For, if there is no real rest for God, then there is, perhaps, no real rest for us.

Father Holmes is Vice President and Interim Dean of the Whitehead School of Diplomacy and International Relations at Seton Hall University. The University's first vice president for Mission and Ministry from 2001-2005, Father Holmes had previously served as associate provost for academic administration and has taught moral and sacramental theology since 1988. During his sabbatical in 1999-2000, Father Holmes was invited to be the first occupant of the Carl J. Peter Chair of Preaching at the North American College in Rome.

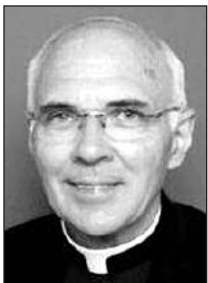
Rev. J. Michael Joncas, S.L.D. Sunday: When Easter and Pentecost Embrace

Father Joncas will offer a theological exploration of the second chapter of Pope John Paul II's letter, *Dies Domini*, highlighting the Christological and Pneumatological aspects of Sunday. This theme can also be seen in literature, in visual art, and in music. He will also address contemporary challenges to Sunday celebration.

Ordained a priest of the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis in 1980, Father Joncas holds a S.L.L. and S.L.D. from Sant' Anselmo in Rome. He is the author of three books, over 100 articles, and 20 collections of liturgical music.

Msgr. Kevin W. Irwin, S.T.D. The Eucharistic Assembly: Heart of Sunday

In this presentation, Msgr. Irwin will explore how the Church makes the Eucharist and the Eucharist makes the Church. The Liturgy of the Eucharist contains a wealth of theology and spirituality. It shapes our view of Christian life.

Msgr. Kevin Irwin is a priest of the Archdiocese of New York and is the Dean of the School of Theology and Religious Studies at The Catholic University of America. He holds the Walter L. Schmitz Chair of Liturgical

Studies. Msgr. Irwin is the author of fourteen books on liturgy and sacraments including his most recent book *Models of the Eucharist*. He has recently been named as an Advisor to the United States Bishops' Committee on the Liturgy, a role he also held in the 1990's. He also served for a decade as an advisor to the Bishops' Committee on the Permanent Diaconate.

In addition to his academic work, Msgr. Irwin regularly celebrates Mass and preaches at the Basilica of the National Shrine in Washington, D.C. during the week and on week-ends at the Church of Saint Mary, Richmond, Virginia.

Mrs. Pat Kerwin Sunday: Day of Joy, Rest and Solidarity

"This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad!" Sunday gifts us with the joy of the Spirit and calls us to community, to rest in God's presence, and to solidarity with all people. Mrs. Pat Kerwin is a member of the SWLC Board of Directors. She has served in parish and diocesan liturgical ministry in the Archdiocese of Galveston-Houston for over thirty years. She holds an MA in Liturgy from the University of Notre Dame and presently serves as director of Spirituality in Ministry for the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word.

Using story, humor, and plain English, Bill Huebsch will unpack the profound mystery of Sunday as a divinely ordered time in human life. For those working in liturgy and music ministries at the parish level, this will be a challenging and comforting closing presentation!

Mr. Bill Huebsch served five years each as diocesan administrator in the Dioceses of Crookston and New Ulm, both in Minnesota, and for many years as DRE in a suburban Minneapolis parish. For the past ten years he has worked in Catholic publishing, helping to launch "whole community catechesis." He now serves as President and Publisher of Twenty-Third Publications in New London, Connecticut. He has published more than a dozen books in recent years, along with numerous booklets, articles and screenplays.

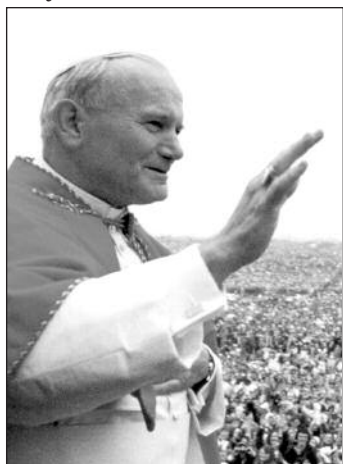

In the Book of Genesis, we hear the wonderful story, telling us how God, in His great love, created the world. When the heavens and earth and all their array were completed, God looked at everything He had made, and found it very good. Since on the seventh day God was finished with the work He had been doing, He rested on the seventh day. So God blessed the seventh day and made it holy.



Several years ago, Pope John Paul II commented on this aspect of creation: "The divine rest on the seventh day does not allude to an *inactive* God, but emphasizes the fullness of what has been accomplished. It speaks, as it were, of God lingering before the 'very good' work which his hand has wrought in order to cast upon it a gaze full of joyous delight." (Apostolic Letter *Dies Domini*)

This is the essence of the third commandment given by God at Mount Sinai. The Hebrews were told: "Remember the Sabbath day in order to keep it holy." Just as God "rested" to savor the beauty of creation, the Hebrews were to rest once a week so that they, too, could remember and celebrate the marvels which God had brought about.

Because creation was brought to its fulfillment by Christ's resurrection, it seemed natural for the members of the early Church to see Sunday, the day of resurrection, as the new *Dies Domini*, the new Day of the Lord. And so, even in our own day, we are called to keep holy the Lord's day. We are called, weekly, to remember and celebrate all the marvels which God has done, but especially giving us his Son, Jesus Christ, to be our savior.

Next January, we invite you to come to Oklahoma City for the **45th Annual Southwest Liturgical Conference Study Week**. Our theme will be "*Dies Domini*: Sunday, the Day of the Lord." We invite you to explore what it means today to "Keep Holy the Lord's Day."

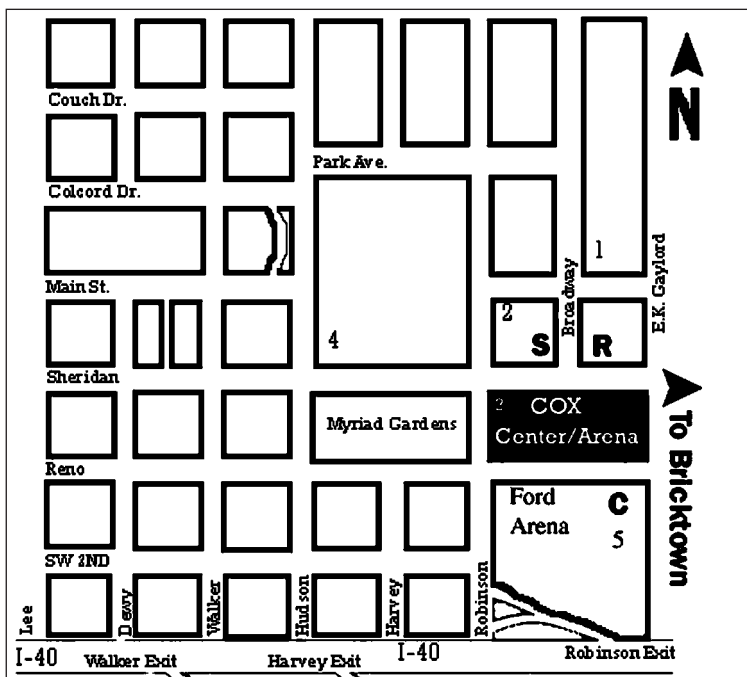
