Dear Parishioners,

Today's Gospel passage is John's depiction of Pentecost, where the disciples receive the Holy Spirit from the risen Jesus, "he breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit.'" At the core of this passage is the call to forgive. After receiving the Holy Spirit, the apostles are given the authority to forgive sins, or not, "Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained". This authority is given to the apostles so they may continue Jesus earthly ministry, announcing the Good News that the Kingdom of Heaven is near for those who repent of their sin, "As the Father has sent me, so I send you."

Repentance is key. It is not possible to be forgiven of sin if we have not acknowledged that we have sinned. "My sacrifice, O God is a contrite spirit; a contrite, humbled heart, O God, You will not scorn." (Psalm 51:19 NABRE) That is why Jesus added the direction, "whose sins you retain are retained." And that is why we are directed to an examination of conscience prior to the priest offering absolution. We must acknowledge the ways that we have separated ourselves from God. The peace that Jesus offers in this passage is the peace to be found when we are reconciled to God.

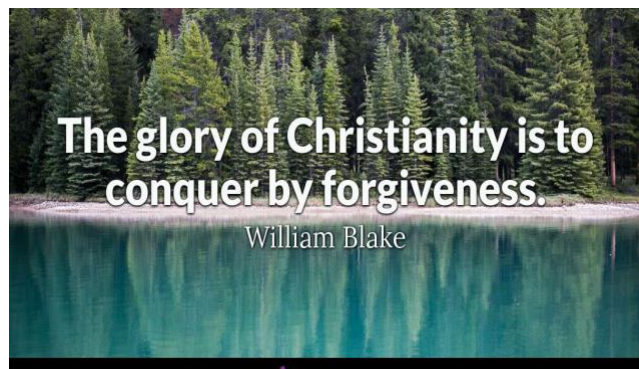

#### A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

When the time for Pentecost was fulfilled, they were all in one place together. And suddenly there came from the sky a noise like a strong driving wind, and it filled the entire house in which they were. Then there appeared to them tongues as of fire, which parted and came to rest on each one of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in different tongues, as the Spirit enabled them to proclaim.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven staying in Jerusalem. At this sound, they gathered in a large crowd, but they were confused because each one heard them speaking in his own language. They were astounded, and in amazement they asked, "Are not all these people who are speaking Galileans? Then how does each of us hear them in his native language? We are Parthians, Medes, and Elamites, inhabitants of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the districts of Libya near Cyrene, as well as travelers from Rome, both Jews and converts to Judaism, Cretans and Arabs, yet we hear them speaking in our own tongues of the mighty acts of God."
