A SURVEY OF THE BIBLE – PHILEMON

The Letter to Philemon is the briefest of Paul's epistles, only 334 words in the Greek text. The letter is addressed to three specific individuals, one of them Philemon, who Paul addresses as "our beloved." From the letter it appears that a slave named Onesimus had robbed or in some other way wronged his master Philemon and had escaped. Paul writes to Philemon petitioning that he welcome Onesimus back, not as a slave but as a brother in Christ.

The epistle may be divided as follows: prayer of thanksgiving for Philemon (verses 1-7); petitioning for Onesimus (verses 8-16); promise to Philemon (verses 17-25).

NOTEABLE SAINTS OF THE WEEK

St. Athanasius, Bishop and Doctor (d. 373), Born of a Christian family in Alexandria, Egypt, and given a classical education, Athanasius became secretary to Alexander, the bishop of Alexandria, entered the priesthood and was eventually named bishop himself. Athanasius led a tumultuous but dedicated life of service to the Church. He accompanied Bishop Alexander to the Council of Nicaea. He was the great champion of the faith against the widespread heresy of Arianism, the teaching by Arius that Jesus was not truly divine. For this he suffered many hardships and was exiled several times. The vigor of his writings earned him the title of doctor of the Church. May 2.

Sts. Philip and James, Apostles (James d. 62), Philip was born at Bethsaida. At first a disciple of John the Baptist, he became a follower of Christ. James, son of Alphaeus, a relative of Jesus was the leader of the Church in Jerusalem. He led an austere life and suffered martyrdom in the year 62. Saints Philip and James are the Patron Saints of Uruguay. May 3.
