Lenten Regulations: Fast and Abstinence

The Church's simple formula for observing Lent: prayer, fasting and almsgiving. These are the three things that we do to strengthen our relationship with the Lord and prepare for Easter. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence from meat for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence. For members of the Latin Catholic Church, the norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal. Two smaller meals may also be taken, but not to equal a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding upon members of the Latin Catholic Church from age 14 onwards.

Lenten Pilgrimage as shaped by the Catechumenate

Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults ~ Period of Purification and Enlightenment

The period of Purification and Enlightenment coincides with the season of Lent and is the final period preceding the initiation of the elect into the Catholic Church at the Easter Vigil.

Rite of Sending ~ Rite of Election

Traditionally, on the First Sunday of Lent Catechumens are sent forth for the *Rite of Election* and Candidates are sent forth for the *Rite of Recognition* at the Cathedral of Our Lady of Lourdes by the Bishop. This gives the parish the opportunity to rejoice in the decision to receive the sacraments of initiation and to assure the Catechumens and Candidates the community's ongoing support. This year the Rite of Election will take place the first Sunday of Lent, February 20th, and will be held at St. Peter.

Scrutinies

The *Scrutinies*, which are solemnly celebrated on the Third, Fourth and Fifth Sundays of Lent, are special rites in which the Catechumens and Candidates are normally present. These ancient rites are a time to examine and scrutinize the areas of our lives where we are tempted, or seriously sin, *in what we do and what we fail to do*. It is a time to pray for the Elect, asking God to protect them.

As the Catechumens and Candidates continue this period of education and formation through the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA), we too are all called to conversion. It is a reminder that the call to holiness is never ending and as Christians we are always under construction, always in need of renewal.
