

Questions that you may have:

When does early voting end? Early voting ends on Friday, **October 30th**. Election day and the last day to vote is Tuesday, **November 3rd**.

If I requested an **absentee ballot**, but I have not received it, can I vote in person? **Yes**. The process of switching from an absentee ballot to an in-person ballot will take a few minutes at the polling place. Voters must sign a document to cancel their absentee ballot, and poll workers have to call the county elections office to confirm that the absentee ballot hasn't already been returned. The process takes less time if voters bring their absentee ballots with them to be canceled at the polling place.

If I am a senior citizen or I have a disability, **do I have to stand in line** to vote in person? **No**. Georgia law requires polling places to be fully accessible and equipped with poll workers that are trained to take care of the need of all voters. Such voters should tell a poll officer if he or she wants to move to the front on the line.

Photo ID requirements: A photo ID is required to vote in person.

Acceptable forms of identification:

A Georgia driver's license, ***even if expired***

Any state or federal issued photo ID, including a free Voter ID Card issued by your county registrar's office or by the Georgia Department of Driver Services

Valid U.S. passport

Valid employee photo ID from any branch, department, agency or entity of the U. S. Government, Georgia, or any county, municipality, board, authority or other entity of the state

Valid U.S. military photo ID

Valid tribal photo ID

If I don't have **transportation to the poll**, what resources are available? Neighborhood Assistance Corporation of America (NACA) has a fleet of 100 vans and will provide transportation. Tips for voting day:

- Make a plan to vote - verify your polling location in advance and determine what day you will go to vote, arrange your transportation in advance.
- Be prepared for a long wait- take a chair, water and a snack (Seniors, ask a poll worker to direct you to the senior citizen waiting area.)
- Dress comfortably- in layers if necessary to adjust to warming or cooling temperatures.

Amendments on the ballot:

House Resolution 164, Act No. 597.

This is about the government creating a fee for a specific act then using that fee for something else. Environmentalists are upset the money has not been used for its intended purpose of cleaning landfills. A YES vote for House Resolution 164, Act No. 597 would require the government to use the fees for the purpose they were created. A NO vote would allow the government to continue to use the fees for other purposes.

House Resolution 1023, Act No. 596.

This amendment is about our ability to sue the state if they create laws we think are unconstitutional. A YES vote on House Resolution 1023, Act No. 596, gives citizens of the state the right to sue the government.. A No vote would mean that citizens would continue to be unable to sue state government.

House Bill 344, Act No. 149

This bill would prevent the government from collecting property taxes on property owned by non profits who provide interest-free financing to those purchasing the home the nonprofit owns. A Yes vote would allow non profits that provide low income housing to spend more of their funds on building or repairing more homes instead of spending the money on property taxes.
