As you mourn the loss of your dear loved one please know that you are not alone. The parish family of Saint Aidan, the priests, staff and faithful, walk with you through this valley of darkness. As members of the Body of Christ we share the pain of your loss. At the same time, however, we seek to bring to your broken heart the light, consolation and peace of the risen Lord.

One of the chief ways that the Church aims to be present to you during this difficult time is through the funeral rites, particularly the Holy Mass. The funeral rites afford us the opportunity to celebrate with you the life of your dear loved one and to prayerfully thank Almighty God for the gift of that life which has now been returned to God, the author of life.

The funeral rites also assist the living as we mourn the dead. In fact, the General Introduction of the Order for Christian Funerals states: “While proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus Christ and witnessing to Christian hope in the resurrection, the funeral rites also recall to all who take part in them God’s mercy and judgment and meet the human need to turn always to God in times of crisis.”

To help you enter more fully into the funeral rites please find enclosed the Saint Aidan Parish Funeral Guidelines. As always, the priest and staff of Saint Aidan are here to be of assistance to you. Hope in the Resurrection

As a Church, we confidently proclaim that God has created each person for eternal life. By his death and resurrection, Jesus Christ, the Son of God, has set us free from the chains of sin and death. As a Christian community, we come together to share in the funeral rites of the Church, confident that death is not the end. The rites celebrate the mystery of our life, death and resurrection in Christ. Through Baptism we enter into this mystery. We live our lives in the hope of sharing eternal life with God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit when we complete our passage through death. For Christians, death in Christ results in life in greater abundance. This new life, like a seed, was planted in us at Baptism, flowered during our lifetime, and at death yields a rich harvest. With this in mind, and praying with you in this time of grief and loss, we present the funeral guidelines for Saint Aidan Parish.

About the Funeral Rites of the Church

Normally, the Rite of Christian Burial is celebrated for baptized Catholics but the Catholic Church also permits the rites to be celebrated for unbaptized children (of Christian families) as well as baptized members of non-Catholic communities of faith.

While the Catholic Church continues to encourage the ancient custom of burying the body of a deceased person, cremation is permitted. Where cremation is to take place, the following are the options for a funeral liturgy:

1. The body may be brought to the church for the funeral Mass and then cremation follows.
2. Cremation may take place and the funeral Mass is celebrated in the presence of the cremains. Prior to cremation, a service of prayer and Scripture reading may take place in the funeral home

Please note that it is the Church's expectation that out of respect for the remains of the deceased, the ashes of cremated persons should be buried or entombed in a timely fashion. It is against Church law for cremains to be placed on a mantle at home or spread anywhere. The Church will only bury someone as long as there is complete assurance that the cremains will be buried or interred.

Pastoral care is our focus in the case of a person who dies as a result of suicide. While the Catholic Church would never condone such action, neither does it pass judgement on such a person. It is quite possible that the person committing suicide was not in full possession of their rational faculties at the time of the act. Nor are we able to determine precisely the emotional or faith disposition of the person at the moment of death. Therefore, it is the normal pastoral response to provide for such persons all the appropriate rites of Christian burial.

The Rite of Christian Burial provides several options for prayerful celebrations. While the traditional practice is the celebration of a funeral Mass, circumstances may dictate a preference for a service of Scripture and prayer in the funeral home (and/or at the cemetery). This might be appropriate where the family or loved ones are not of the Catholic faith, or where the deceased was not an active Catholic. If there are questions regarding options for the celebration of the Funeral Rites, please contact one of the priests at St. Aidan.

Please note that if the deceased regularly participated in the celebration of the Eucharist, he/she should not be deprived of the funeral Mass simply because few (if any) relatives and/or friends might attend. The number of mourners should not be the determining factor in whether or not a funeral Mass is celebrated.

Planning and Sharing in the Funeral Liturgy

It is difficult to plan a funeral liturgy while you are grieving the death of a loved one. Yet, it can be important that we involve family or friends in the celebration of the rites. This type of participation is entirely optional. The following are places within the funeral liturgy when the involvements of family or friends are possible.

Sprinkling with Holy Water and Placing the Pall

After family and friends have gathered at the entrance of the church, the priest greets the congregation and sprinkles the body with holy water as a reminder of our baptism. Family members or friends may wish to place the pall, a large white cloth reminding us of the garment we received at baptism, over the casket at this time. Then the procession to the front of the church begins and family and friends take their seat.

Liturgy of the Word

Family or friends are encouraged to choose readings from scripture, one from the Old Testament and one from the New Testament. Family members or friends may wish to proclaim these readings. If not, a trained lector from our parish will be assigned. If a person chooses to read, he/she should be given the reading in order to prepare to proclaim the Word at the funeral liturgy.

Presenting the Gifts at the Altar

There are two gifts-bread and wine-that are presented following the General Intercessions. Two family members or friends may bring these gifts to the altar.

Reflection at the Funeral Home, at the Church, or at the Cemetery

This is an opportunity for a family member or friend to reflect on the person we are going to bury. It is limited to ONE PERSON, a maximum of five minutes, and the presiding priest may ask to review it. It should be remembered that we are celebrating a Christian funeral so stories, jokes, etc., should have an appropriate tone.

Music

The Music Director will contact you concerning special hymns which may be requested by the family or by the deceased in his/her own preparation of the funeral liturgy. Please remember that the Mass is a public act of worship of the church, therefore the hymns should reflect the idea of resurrection and hope. No secular or “popular” music is permitted. Please reserve this type of music for a special time outside of the church.

Symbols of the Liturgy

Paschal (Easter) Candle

The Paschal candle reminds us of Christ’s undying presence among us, of his victory over sin and death, and of our share in that victory by virtue of the Sacraments. It recalls the great Easter Vigil, the night when the Church awaits the Lord’s passing over from death to eternal life and new light for the living and the dead is lit and blessed. The candle also reminds us of our baptism, when we received the Light of Christ. During the funeral rites in the church, the Paschal candle is placed near the coffin.

Holy Water

Several times during the funeral rites, the body is sprinkled with holy water. Blessed water (holy water) reminds us of the saving waters of Baptism. The water calls to mind the deceased's own baptism into Christ's death and resurrection as well as initiation into the community of faith.

Pall

A pall (large white cloth) is placed over the coffin when it is received at the church. The pall is a reminder of our baptismal garment, when we "put on Christ." The pall also signifies that all are equal in the eyes of God.

Incense

Incense is used during the funeral rites as a sign of honor to the body of the deceased, which through baptism became a temple of the Holy Spirit.

Incense is also used as a sign of the community's prayers for the deceased rising to the throne of God.

Book of the Gospels or Bible

A Book of the Gospels or a Bible may be placed on the coffin as a sign that Christians live by the Word of God and that fidelity to the Word leads to eternal life.

Cross

A cross may be placed on the coffin as a reminder that the Christian is marked by the cross in baptism. Also, through Jesus' suffering and death on the cross, we are brought to the victory of his resurrection.

Fresh Flowers

Fresh flowers, when used in moderation, are appropriate to the church environment during the funeral liturgy. The family may wish to order flowers for the funeral liturgy to be placed in the sanctuary of the church. The flowers are to remain in church after the liturgy.

Other Christian Symbols and Non-Christian Symbols

Only Christian symbols may rest on or be placed near the coffin during the funeral liturgy. Any other symbols such as national flags, flags or insignia of associations, and sports or other kinds of memorabilia, have no place in the funeral liturgy.

Special Needs and Other Questions

If family and friends have special needs, requests, or questions that are not addressed above, please contact your funeral director. All local funeral directors are very conscientious in providing parish leaders with necessary information.

A reading from the Second Book of Maccabees

12:43-46

In doing this he acted in a very excellent and noble way, inasmuch as he had the resurrection of the dead in view; for if he were not expecting the fallen to rise again, it would have been useless and foolish to pray for them in death. But if he did this with a view of the splendid reward that awaits those who had gone to rest in godliness, it was a holy and pious thought.

Thus, he made atonement for the dead that they might be freed from this sin.

A reading from the Book of Ecclesiastes

3:1-11

There is an appointed time for everything, and a time for every affair under the heavens.

A time to give birth, and a time to die; a time to plant, and a time to uproot the plant.

A time to weep, and a time to laugh; a time to mourn, and a time to dance.

A time to scatter stones, and a time to gather them; a time to embrace and a time to be far from embraces.

A time to seek, and a time to lose; a time to keep, and a time to cast away.

A time to rend, and a time to sew, a time to be silent, and a time to speak.

A time to love, and a time to hate; a time of war and a time of peace.

D-1 (longer form)

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

10:34-43

Peter proceeded to address the people in these words:

“In truth, I see that God shows no partiality. Rather, in every nation whoever fears him and acts uprightly is acceptable to him. You know the word that he sent to the Israelites as he proclaimed peace through Jesus Christ, who is Lord of all, what has happened all over Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John preached, how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the holy Spirit and power. He went about doing good and healing all those oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses of all that he did both in the country of the Jews and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree. This man God raised on the third day and granted that he be visible, not to all the people, but to us, the witnesses chosen by God in advance, who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commissioned us to preach to the people and testify that he is the one appointed by God as judge of the living and the dead. To him all the prophets bear witness, that everyone who believes in him will receive forgiveness of sins through his name.”

D-1 (shorter form)

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Peter proceeded to address the people in these words:

You know the word that he sent to the Israelites as he proclaimed peace through Jesus Christ, who is Lord of all. A reading from the Letter of Paul to the Romans

5:5-11

For Christ, while we were still helpless, yet died at the appointed time for the ungodly. Indeed, only with difficulty does one die for a just person, though perhaps for a good person one might even find courage to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us. How much more then, since we are now justified by his blood, will we be saved through him from the wrath. Indeed, if, while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son, how much more, once reconciled, will we be saved by his life. Not only that, but we also boast of God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation.

D-3

A reading from the Letter of Paul to the Romans

5:17-21

If, by the transgression of one person, death came to reign through that one, how much more will those who receive the abundance of grace and of the gift of justification come to reign in life through the one person Jesus Christ.

In conclusion, just as through one transgression condemnation came upon all, so through one righteous act acquittal and life came to all. For just as through the disobedience of one person the many were made sinners, so through the obedience of one of the many will be made righteous. The law entered in so that transgression might increase but, where sin increased, grace overflowed all the more, so that, as sin reigned in death, grace also might reign through justification for eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.

D-4 (longer form)

A reading from the Letter of Paul to the Romans

6:3-9

Are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death?

We were indeed buried with him through baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life. For if we have grown into union with him through a death like his, we shall also be united with him in the resurrection.

We know that our old self was crucified with him, so that our sinful body might be done away with, that we might no longer be in slavery to sin. For a dead person has been absolved from sin. If, then, we have died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with him. We know that Christ, raised from the dead, dies no more; death no longer has power over him.

D-4 (shorter form)

A reading from the Letter of Paul to the Romans

6:3-4, 8-9

Are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were indeed buried with him through baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life. If, then, we have died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with him. We know that Christ, raised from the dead, dies no more; death no longer has power over him.

D-5

A reading from the Letter of Paul to the Romans

8:14-23

Those who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you received a spirit of adoption, through which we cry, *Abba*, "Father!" The Spirit itself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ, if only we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.

I consider that the sufferings of this present time are as nothing compared with the glory to be revealed for us. For creation awaits with eager expectation the revelation of the children of God; for creation was made subject to futility, not of its own accord but because of the one who subjected it, in hope that creation itself would be set free from slavery to corruption and share in the glorious freedom of the children of God. We know that all creation is groaning in labor pains even until now; and not only that, but we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, we also groan within ourselves as we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies.

D-6

A reading from the Letter of Paul to the Romans

8:31b-35, 37-39

If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son but handed him over for us all, how will he not also give us everything else along with him? Who will bring a charge against God's chosen ones? It is God who acquits us. Who will condemn? It is Christ Jesus who died, rather, was raised, who also is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us.

What will separate us from the love of Christ? Will anguish, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or the sword? No, in all these things we conquer overwhelmingly through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor present things, nor future things, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

D-7

A reading from the Letter of Paul to the Romans

14:7-9, 10b-12

None of us lives for oneself, and no one dies for oneself. For if we live, we live for the Lord, and if we die, we die for the Lord; so then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's. For this is why Christ died and came to life, that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living. For we shall all stand before the judgment seat of God; for it is written:

“As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bend before me, and every tongue shall give praise to God.”

So then each of us shall give an account of himself to God.

D-8 (longer form)

A reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians

Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. For since death came through a human being, the resurrection of the dead came also through a human being. For just as in Adam all die, so too in Christ shall all be brought to life, but each one in proper order: Christ the firstfruits; then, at his coming, those who belong to Christ; then comes the end, when he hands over the kingdom to his God and Father. For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. The last enemy to be destroyed is death, for “he subjected everything under his feet.” But when it says that everything has been subjected, it is clear that it excludes the One who subjected everything to him. When everything is subjected to him, then the Son himself will also be subjected to the One who subjected everything to him, so that God may be all in all.

D-8 (shorter form)

A reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians

15:20-23

Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. For since death came through a human being, the resurrection of the dead came also through a human being. For just as in Adam all die, so too in Christ shall all be brought to life, but each one in proper order: Christ the firstfruits; then, at his coming, those who belong to Christ.

D-9

A reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians

15:51-57

Behold, I tell you a mystery. We shall not all fall asleep, but we will all be changed, in an instant, in the blink of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, the dead will be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed. For that which is corruptible must clothe itself with incorruptibility, and that which is mortal must clothe itself with immortality. And when that which is corruptible clothes itself with incorruptibility and that which is mortal clothes itself with immortality, then the word that is written shall come about:

“Death is swallowed up in victory.
Where, O death, is your victory?
Where, O death, is your sting?”

The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

D-10

A reading from the Second Letter of Paul to the Corinthians 4:14 – 5:1

We know that the one who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus and place us with you in his presence. Everything indeed is for you, so that the grace bestowed in abundance on more and more people may cause the thanksgiving to overflow for the glory of God.

Therefore, we are not discouraged; rather, although our outer self is wasting away, our inner self is being renewed day by day. For this momentary light affliction is producing for us an eternal weight of glory beyond all comparison, as we look not to what is seen but to what is unseen; for what is seen is transitory, but what is unseen is eternal.

For all we know that if our earthly dwelling, a tent, should be destroyed, we have a building from God, a dwelling not made with hands, eternal in heaven.

D-11

A reading from the Second Letter of Paul to the Corinthians 5:1, 6-10

We know that if our earthly dwelling, a tent, should be destroyed, we have a building from God, a dwelling not made with hands, eternal in heaven.

So, we are always courageous, although we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord, for we walk by faith, not by sight. Yet we are courageous, and we would rather leave the body and go home to the Lord. Therefore, we aspire to please him, whether we are at home or away. For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each one may receive recompense, according to what he did in the body, whether good or evil.

D-12

A reading from the Letter of Paul to the Philippians

3:20-21

Our citizenship is in heaven, and from it we also await a savior, the Lord Jesus Christ. He will change our lowly body to conform with his glorified body by the power that enables him also to bring all things into subjection to himself.

D-13

A reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Thessalonians

4:13-18

We do not want you to be unaware, brothers [and sisters], about those who have fallen asleep, so that you may not grieve like the rest, who have no hope. For if we believe that Jesus died and rose, so too will God, through Jesus, bring with him those who have fallen asleep. Indeed, we tell you this, on the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will surely not precede those who have fallen asleep. For the Lord himself, with a word of command, with the voice of an archangel and with the trumpet of God, will come down from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. Thus, we shall always be with the Lord. Therefore, console one another with these words.

D-14

A reading from the Second Letter of Paul to Timothy

2:8-13

Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David; such is my gospel, for which I am suffering, even to the point of chains, like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore, I bear with everything for the sake of those who are chosen, so that they too may obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, together with eternal glory. This saying is trustworthy:

If we have died with him
 we shall also live with him;
if we persevere
 we shall also reign with him.
But if we deny him
 he will deny us.
If we are unfaithful
 he remains faithful,
 for he cannot deny himself.

D-15

A reading from the First Letter of John

3:1-2
