GOSPEL COMMENTARY
“Joseph rose and took the child and his mother by night and departed for Egypt.”

Once again, Matthew tells us that Joseph, in response to his belief in God's will for him, acts to protect Mary and her son, Jesus. He hurriedly leaves Israel during the night to go to Egypt to protect Jesus from Herod. It was not safe to travel at night. The journey to Egypt took them through the Sinai desert and was dangerous and difficult. In Egypt, they were strangers in a strange land. They had no family or friends to support them. Joseph's care of Mary and Jesus, and their trust in Joseph, provide us with a magnificent example of how family is holy and a reflection of the love and unity of the Trinity. The holiness of a family is not indicated by how much each member of the family has, but by the fact each member of the family has each other, to love, to care for, to support, particularly in times of trial and tribulations. All who call themselves Catholic are called to be a holy family in the image of Joseph, Mary and Jesus.

AFTERTHOUGHTS

Again today we hear of Joseph's openness to God. In protecting his family, he listens as the angel tells him to flee ... and years later, he hears the angel say when it is safe to return. Joseph's witness gives us pause to consider: How open am I to the God who created him & me?


LORD, TEACH ME TO PRAY

DIOCESAN OUTREACH LINE

In response to the Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, the Diocese of Houma-Thibodaux has made the following provision for anyone who has been hurt or sexually abused by anyone who works for the church. The Diocese of Houma-Thibodaux has set up an Outreach Line for all victims/survivors of sexual abuse.

In continuing our commitment to support and healing, we invite and encourage people who have been hurt or sexually abused recently or in the past by clergy, religious or other employees of the Diocese of Houma-Thibodaux, to call our outreach line. The Outreach Line operates from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. daily Monday through Friday. A trained mental health professional responds to the line. SAINTS

January 4 Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton, Religious Memorial
St. Elizabeth was the first native-born American to be canonized by the Roman Catholic Church. She was the founder of the Sisters of Charity, the first American religious society.

January 5 Saint John Neumann, Bishop
Known for a lifetime of pastoral work, especially among poor German immigrants, Bishop John Neumann was the first American man to be named saint. During his seminary days, John had read with great interest the quarterly reports of the Missionary Society of St. Leopold containing accounts of the pioneering work being done in the United States. On the morning of February 8, 1836, he left his native home and made the trip across Europe on foot. Father John Neumann devoted himself to the pastoral care of all the outlying places in the parish of Buffalo for four years. From his headquarters near Buffalo, he made frequent journeys on foot in all kinds of weather to points ten or twenty miles distant, visiting the settlers on their scattered farms.

CATHOLIC KORNER

Last week we learned that being virtuous does not happen overnight and is something we choose to practice purposefully. This takes effort. A virtue allows us to be the best version of ourselves. The first virtue we will talk about is Faith. "Faith is the theological virtue by which we believe in God and believe all that he has said and revealed to us, and what the Holy Church proposes for our belief, because he is truth itself. By faith, 'man freely commits his entire self to God.' For this reason the believer seeks to know and do God's will." (CCC 1814) Gus Lloyd states that many today profess a lack of faith because they only will believe in concrete realities. Think of gravity – when someone jumps off a building they know they will plummet to the ground – but they cannot see gravity, but they believe and know it is there. So it is with the Christian and God. Faith is the realization of what is hoped for and evidence of things not seen. Hebrews 11:1. Faith is meant to be shared. How do we increase our faith? 1. Read scripture and good Catholic books 2. Pray 3. Love – love our neighbor – our friends – our family - yourself


Because Catholic Guilt Isn't Catholic by Dan Tarrant

CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING: CALL TO FAMILY, COMMUNITY, AND PARTICIPATION

The person is not only sacred but also social. We believe people have a right and a duty to participate in society, seeking together the common good and well-being of all, especially the poor and vulnerable. It is good to be alive. It is good to be human. It is good to be engaged in life.

The celebration of the Incarnation at Christmas is God's affirmation of the goodness of life, especially human life. It is a celebration of God's engagement in life here on earth and even in the struggles, questions, poverty and injustices of life. The readings from the four Christmas masses share this wonderful message to all people and especially the poor.

At the Vigil Mass, Isaiah tells us that "the Lord delights in you... so shall your God rejoice in you." In Acts, we are told that Israel, despite all her sins, has a savior. In Matthew's gospel, we listen to the long genealogy, which includes saints and sinners but at the same time leads to the birth of the child who will affirm the mercy of God and who will be called "Emmanuel," which means "god is with us." With the revelation of Jesus, the Christ, it is good to be alive. It is good to be human. It is good to be engaged in life.

At the Mass in the Night, Isaiah tells us that all the symbols of oppression (the yoke, the pole, the rod) will be smashed. A Prince of Peace will "confirm and sustain by judgment and justice." In the letter to Titus, we hope for "the appearance of the glory of our great God." In Luke's story of the birth, hope is revealed in the birth of a homeless child born in a place for animals. A liberating God is with us in our sinful world and so it is good. It is good to be human. It is good to be engaged in life.

At the Mass at Dawn, Isaiah announces "Your savior comes!" Therefore, we "shall be called the holy people." In the letter to Titus we are reminded that it is "because of his mercy" that we "become heirs in hope of eternal life." The shepherds travel to the child and experience the presence and fulfillment of the promise. God comes to us in a spirit of mercy, and so it is good to be alive. It is good to be human. It is good to be engaged in life.

At the Mass during the Day: Isaiah proclaims one who comes with joy and comfort. The letter to the Hebrews reminds us that this message is coming directly from the Son of God. "And the Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us, and we saw his glory. "No matter how bad things are, it is good to be alive. It is good to be human. It is good to be engaged in life.

God invites us to share this message to all who are in need, to all who experience poverty, and to all who are oppressed by injustice. With Jesus Christ it is good to be alive.

EUCCHARISTIC ADORATION

PEACE, LOVE, JOY AND FULFILLMENT

"At Christmas, when we look in the crib and at that beauty of the crèche, we're all drawn to the central image: baby Jesus and his face. And we can imagine what it was like for Joseph and Mary to see that face for the first time," Lucy Gatzka, coordinator for the daily adoration at Church of the Incarnation in Sarasota, FL says. She's constantly amazed at how drawn people are to the innocence and simplicity of a baby's face, especially Jesus' face at Christmas. "And that's what we do at adoration," she says. "We are in awe of what we see, and that awe is one of peace, love, joy and fulfillment. What we gaze upon is so simple and beautiful. There's no artificiality. We gaze upon the beauty of the living God. That's an echo of looking at the crib at Christmas, and it's a continuing gift throughout the year."
