From the Pastor's Desk

Today we celebrate Gaudete Sunday: Rejoice Sunday. We rejoice that the Lord is near. In our anticipation we prepare ourselves for the coming of our God. This is the great joy of the Advent season and of our lives. Hopefully it is a joy for all people. Yet I sometimes wonder if anyone is taking this season and attitude seriously. I wonder if anyone is truly waiting in joyful expectation for the Lord. There is a great deal of hustle and bustle with the preparations for Christmas. With this fast pace comes the temptation for impatience, frustration and various manifestations of anger. These are all contrary to the faith filled expression of Joy. Despite all the demands and pressures, the Christian should be able to navigate this time with Joy, knowing that our salvation is near at hand. We cannot forsake the Joy of being followers of Jesus Christ. Joy is a manifestation of faith in the one who is greater than this entire world and who fulfills the deepest desire of the human heart: Our Lord Jesus Christ and the salvation he brings to those who have faith in him. Joy is rooted in this faith. Joy, or our lack of it, needs to be contemplated during our Advent season.

Last week I encouraged the reading of the Gospel according to Matthew. As I set about this noble task, I found myself beginning with a smirk. It is the same old story, once we make the conscious effort to "read the Bible" we get hit with a section like we find at the beginning of St. Matthew: the dreaded genealogy. If there is anything that will stop us dead in our tracks, it's a genealogy. This usually causes many to abandon this noble venture. It is especially noted when anyone wants to start reading the Bible cover to cover it begins with Genesis. After reading a couple of interesting stories we find ourselves in the middle of a genealogy. (There are many other "dry" sections in the Scriptures along the way.) We usually do not find these very interesting. In fact, it is an easy excuse to abandon our attempt at reading the bible.

In the Liturgical Year there are two occasions when the Church uses the genealogy of Jesus according to Matthew. The first occurrence is on Tuesday, December 17, the first day in the octave leading up to Christmas. The second occasion is for the Vigil Mass on Christmas Eve. On Christmas Eve most parishes opt out of reading this passage for the Vigil mass since, by itself, it bewilders those who have come to celebrate Christmas. Since parishioners usually attend only one liturgy for Christmas, they usually never notice a sequence in the gospels that takes place in the four progressive liturgies for Christmas. Hearing the genealogy of Jesus instead of the story of his birth at the Vigil mass would leave most people bewildered. The reading of the genealogy would begin to make some sense if the congregation also attended two further masses for Christmas. After the genealogy of Jesus at the Vigil there follows a progression of readings that are intended to cause an extended time for deeper meditation into the Mystery of the Incarnation. This is easily noted if one were to look at the progression of masses for the celebration of Christmas: The Vigil Mass, the Mass at Night, the Mass at Dawn and the Mass for Christmas day.

Considering this progression of liturgies, we are reminded that the Celebration of Christmas, along with Easter, is primarily a great religious moment in history. This Sacred Time is not a break or a vacation from the Liturgy, but rather a plunging deeper into the Sacred Mystery of the Incarnation in prayer and worship. Since Advent is a time for prayerful expectation and

preparation for Christmas, it would not make sense to shorten our prayer and worship on Christmas Day. To accentuate this, we have the various liturgies for Christmas so that the Church may plunge deeper into this great feast of our Salvation: The Birth of the Son of God. Christmas is first and foremost a Sacred Day. We don't need to be reminded of this point, but all too often the sacredness of this day gets overshadowed by the secular observance of the day. This is something to consider especially as we come to worship.

Getting back to the genealogy of Jesus according to Matthew, it is helpful to consult a biblical commentary to help our understanding and to gain insights. One thing that we can note from just reading through the genealogy is the name of King David. David is mentioned four times (significant) in the genealogy. Along with Jesus he is given a title. David is called "the king" and Jesus is called "the Messiah." David is first mentioned at the end of the first sequence of "fourteen generations", and Jesus is named at the end of the third sequence of "fourteen generations". In Hebrew letters are used for numerical values. In this case the name "David" has the numerical value of 14; (d+v+d equals 14). In this sense it is symbolic that he is named at the end of the first "fourteen generations". David then begins the second sequence of "fourteen generations" which leads up to the Babylonian Exile and the appearance of the end of the line of Davidic kings. At the end of the third "fourteenth generation" we find Jesus who, in Matthew, indicates that he is the "thrice Davidic-Son of David." Following along the three groupings of generations we have the establishment of David as King, the fall of the kingdom, and finally the restoration of the Covenant with David and the fulfillment of the Davidic kingdom. Pope Francis, in one of his weekday homilies during Advent said, "When God restores his creation it is always better". We get this sense of "the better" with the birth of Jesus, who is Son of David and Son of God. Looking at the history captured in the genealogy we see that something better is on the horizon. God has come to restore his creation.

We also notice the mention of four women named in the genealogy. This is something that would not be done in Jewish genealogies. Nevertheless, Matthew mentions four women. Three of these women are of questionable moral character. One of these women was Ruth who was a good and virtuous woman. In the genealogy of Jesus there are sinners; women as well as many of the kings. These are all part of the family tree. The women mentioned are all Gentiles. They are welcomed and integrated into God's Chosen people; the House of Israel. Thus, we can say that not only were there sinners in Jesus' family tree, there was Gentile blood flowing in the royal line of David. It can be said that we see a foundation for the universal mission of Jesus' kingdom, who will bring salvation to Jews and Gentiles, saints and sinners alike.

This bloodline leads all the way down to Joseph. We can say that this is where the line stops. Matthew then tells us that Joseph is the "husband of Mary." He does not tell us that he is the father of Jesus. We also note that during the Eucharistic Prayer at mass we mention Blessed Joseph the "spouse of Mary", not father of Jesus. God is the father of Jesus. Matthew is telling us that Joseph supplies the connection with the line of David. Later, in a dream, Joseph is told by an Angel not to be afraid to welcome Mary (with child) into his home.

Lastly, we can look at the succession of the three groupings of "fourteen generations". We see the rise of King

David, the greatest king of Israel. It is to David that God promises in a covenant that his kingdom will never end. We then see in the second fourteen generations the line of kings, who were both good and corrupt, all the way to the fall of the kingdom and the Babylonian Exile. In the last fourteen generations we see the return to Jerusalem and a seemingly dead line of the House of David until the birth of Jesus. During this time Jerusalem was ruled by the Babylonians, Persians, Greeks and lastly the Romans of Jesus' day. Although ruled by foreign powers the genealogy continues. Then, suddenly, from the "root of Jesse" a shoot shall sprout, and a bud will blossom. That which seemed to be dead and gone new hope springs forth. The birth of Jesus Christ signifies New Life.

The genealogy of Jesus is rather long and tedious. But it is filled with the history of God's people. At first glance we can easily get lost and impatient with the whole genealogy thing. Nevertheless, God is working through human history and we need to be patient and watchful. For those who hang in there and "keep watch through the night" God will reveal many things, especially his desire and plan for the salvation of all people. This is the Good News of the Gospels revealing God's desire for all humanity to be gathered in His eternal kingdom. God comes to us and gathers us in His Son, our Lord Jesus Christ.
