From the Pastor's Desk

Merry Christmas! On behalf of Fr. Dreese, Deacon Pete and the Staff here at St. Nicholas, I would like to extend to one and all a Blessed and Merry Christmas. May the good Lord whose birth we celebrate bestow his abundant blessings of this holy occasion upon you and your families. May your hearts and homes be filled with peace and joy as we celebrate our Savior's birth.

Although we are celebrating Christmas in an unusual way this year and many families are unable to gather for this festive holy day, we do wish to extend a word of welcome to all who may be visiting this weekend. Hopefully many of our college students and family members can return home for the holidays. We are glad you are here to participate with us in our celebration of the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ. Although difficult at times we do need to continue to pray as a community of faith, seeking God's abundant blessings on us.

This weekend we also celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family: Jesus, Mary and Joseph. As we look to the Holy Family of Nazareth, we give thought to the family in general. In our Catholic tradition we place special importance on the family. This importance is expressed in our Catholic view that the family is referred to as "the Domestic Church." As the "Domestic Church" the family is able in a unique and profound way to reveal and proclaim the inner reality of the Triune God: *a communion of persons; a communion of love; a communion from which life flows*. In this communion of persons, we learn the important lessons of love and faithfulness. It is within the *Domestic Church* that the Catholic Christian faith is powerfully shared and takes lasting root. This is highlighted in the Blessing of Parents at the Baptism of their children; "Parents *are the first teachers of their children in the ways of faith. May they be the best of teachers.*" The Family, the *Domestic Church* holds a place of great importance in the life of the Church. The most important lessons in life are learned in the family: faith hope and love.

The great lesson of the Holy Family that we need to be aware of and learn from is the presence of Jesus Christ. Without the presence of Jesus Christ there is no Holy Family. It is as simple as that. It is right in front of us: in plain sight. Jesus Christ is the center of the Holy Family. Everything revolves and makes sense with Jesus Christ at the center.

This is true for us today. Jesus Christ must be at the center of Christian Marriage and the Christian Family. If Christ is not at the center of marriage/family then something less will take the place. This in turn becomes secondary and diminishes marriage and family.

Jesus Christ gives meaning and purpose to Christian Marriage and Family. Jesus Christ is the perfect model of faithful love. Faithful love is essential for married life. Without faithful love marriage and family life cannot survive and will be prone to fail.

Faithful love is not easy. All we need to do is look to the crucifix. Faithful love implies self-sacrifice. Self-sacrifice is the way of making a gift of one's life for one's spouse and family. Marriage and family life cannot survive without sacrifice. If there is an unwillingness to make sacrifices for one's spouse and children, marriage and family life cannot survive. Pope Saint John Paul II called this the "*Law of the Gift*". We find true meaning in life when we make a gift of our life to others. This is most profoundly expressed in marriage and family.

Christian Marriage and family life are wonderful. It is difficult. Just the same, in a broken sinful world the good, the holy and innocent always suffers. Holiness is not welcomed. When marriage and family life find its meaning and purpose in

God it will always be attacked. This attack on marriage and family life is something that is very present today. An attack on marriage is subtle and ongoing today. In our secularist society leaning toward socialist ideals, marriage is a real problem: a problem that most people do not perceive or understand.

In fact, marriage has been a problem for communist societies going all the way back to Karl Marx and Friedrich Engels in the early 1800s. Marx and Engels called communism "the most radical rupture" in traditional values and relations. It was nothing short of a fundamental transformation of society and human nature. In order to transform human nature, they realized that they had to take down the most basic things: God, private property, marriage and family. Indeed, Marx showed his opposition to traditional marriage by breaking his own vows to his wife. On his part, Engels disregarded marriage by not marrying at all. He had several mistresses, all of whom would have married, but he refused. Marx and Engels had no regard for monogamous marriage. They preferred an arrangement to something akin to a social marriage, or a "party marriage" (modeled by communist party principles) or more unashamedly "open marriage".

Why such a contempt for marriage? In the communist mindset the *state* is the focus and of ultimate importance. The state is the ultimate authority. This atheistic view means that the influence of God and religion must be eliminated in the general population. To achieve this monogamous marriage must be abolished as well. Traditional marriage and the primacy of parental authority over their children are supported by Religion and the Natural Law. This stands in opposition to the state. The state claims absolute authority over everyone with no opposition. Therefore God, natural law (morality), marriage and family must be abolished.

Furthermore, everyone in the socialist state must be equal. There is no right to private property or the inheritance of property. Everything is to be held in common (by the state). When it comes to marriage, the spouses are not exclusive to each other (this is an erroneous anthropology or understanding of human nature). Spouses are to be communal (social marriage). This is a direct reflection of the promiscuous behaviors of many of the communist leaders. However, open marriages became problematic for many since it violated the natural law written in their hearts. Many abandoned the communist party because of this.

There is so much more that can be said here. Most of these thoughts are inspired from the well documented book "*Takedown*" "*From Communists to Progressives; How the Left Has Sabotaged Family and Marriage*" by Paul Kengor. A key point to be taken from this book is the destructive nature of the godless society of communism and socialism. The challenge becomes very clear of the importance of Christian Marriage and Family life. If God is taken out of the picture there is a loss of meaning and purpose for marriage. Furthermore, without God, there is no meaning, purpose or morality when it comes to human sexuality. This is evident in some of the most abhorrent behavior of many of the communist/Marxist leaders. There is a firm conviction that in the absence of God marriage and family life loses its true meaning, grows weak and self-destructs. Look around our world today!

Marx and Engels desired to abolish traditional marriage and family life because it is within marriage and family life the most important lessons in life are learned and lived. It is within the family that we find the religious principle of the primacy of the persons. In the Marxist mindset there is no primacy of human persons, only the state has primacy. The state cannot teach the principles of Faith, Hope and Love which contribute to human

flourishing. These principles are divine in origin and strengthen human beings, marriage and family life. Strong families are the cornerstone for good societies. For Marx and Engels this was a threat to their ideal socialist society where all live is service to the state. Strong families declare that persons are more important. This principle flows from the biblical teaching that human beings are created in the *Image and Likeness of God*. We are not created in the image and likeness of the state: yet many people fall to this erroneous meaning and purpose of life.

We live in a society where we witness the weakening of marriage and family life. God has been pushed aside in the lives of so many. Traditional marriage is defined by God and supported by the natural law written in the human heart. We live in a society that rejects the natural law and says we have the right to redefine marriage as we please. We live in a social climate that Marx, Engels and company would consider prime time to push their agenda: eliminate God and religion, abolish marriage, family, and private property. In a very real way, we are living in serious times and we need to pay attention.

This is an important time for all people of faith, especially all Christians. We must pray and work to strengthen and live our Catholic faith, Christian Marriage and Family life with boldness and courage. We can only do that when Jesus Christ is at the center of our lives, our marriages and our families. We must remember during these difficult times that Jesus Christ is always the “Way, the Truth and the Life.” Jesus Christ alone gives us the true meaning and purpose for our lives. He is the perfect model of faith, love and hope. We cannot fall for the erroneous idea that civil society has the authority to define or even redefine our lives, our marriages and families. Only the author of creation has that authority: God.

This is wonderfully revealed to us in the life of the Child born in that lowly town of Bethlehem and who’s Holy Family we celebrate. Jesus, Mary and Joseph; pray for us! May the blessings of Christmas and the Holy Family be yours.
