This is not to deny that there are many men who have been good father figures. There are men who have been instrumental by their positive influence in the lives of young people. This is something that has been the experience in the lives of so many. These individual cases also need to be acknowledged in their individual cases. I was blessed with a good father. I was also blessed with many men in my life who have been good *father figures*. I am sure that this is the case for many. We pray a prayer of thanksgiving and blessing for them as well. This goes for all those women who have also good been mother figures for so many young people.

The above thoughts come from a well-intended and grateful heart. However, it could also be interpreted as offensive to some individuals. There is a great deal of confusion in our so-called intellectual and sophisticated society when it comes to the roles of mothers and fathers, males and females. In trying to say something good and gracious about mothers and fathers someone will find some kind of fault with it. There is the thought that since this is not the experience of everyone it is not allowed to be acknowledged or said. If it is said it could be offensive. There appears to be a new moral code based upon the norm that no one is to be offended. Therefore, thankfulness for the blessings in your life is not publicly allowed because it could be offensive to those who do not share such blessings. We live in contentious times.

News flash: no one who ever lived, or ever will live, will be exempt from something offensive. Everyone at one time or another will be offended by something. It could happen once in a lifetime (like that could happen) or it could be a daily event (more likely). It is a fact of life: Every human being will at one time or another will be offended. This is not a sufficient reason for us not to acknowledge and express our thankfulness for the good things we have in this life; especially for our parents: a father and mother.

Ironically, for all who are so blessed with good parents and good adult role models, the possibly of being offended by those who protest is low. There is a reason for those who are so blessed are not offended. Those who are aware of their blessings in life have grateful hearts and minds. Grateful people tend to see the good and positive things in life and not the negatives. Conversely, it seems that those who stand for total neutrality so that no one will be offended tend to see only the negatives. They need see and identify negative things in order to have something to protest. They

believe that their protest puts them in a positive light: also known as virtue signaling. They are the enlightened who champion the cause for equality in all things so that no one will be offended. Again, sorry no one escapes the experience of being offended in this life. Remember, it's an imperfect world.

We recently became aware of such ideology emerging this past Mother's Day. This year we heard how the acknowledgement and celebration of Mother's Day was offensive to some people. So, something had to be changed so that no one would be offended. The first attack was on language. Thus, we were introduced to the new terminology where "Mother's Day" was to be replaced with "Birthing Person's Day". This change would be more inclusive for everyone: not limiting this to women. In fact, such terminology, "birthing person", has also been written into some Executive Orders from the White House for legislation. Such terminology would have been unthinkable twenty years ago. We should rejoice since we live in an enlightened society.

One thing that is lacking in our society today is wisdom. There is so much work going into trying to cover every unique situation when it comes to male and female or gender preference, that so much silliness is surfacing. To even challenge this is considered offensive and needs to be stopped.

Nevertheless, there is something that promotes equality. Human lives matter! This is very simple. It is objective, absolute and true. It is the great equalizer. Secondly, the categories of male and female are objective, absolute and true. Trying to accommodate all the variations on these only causes confusion, disorder. The so-called 56 gender preferences are subjective, relative and chaotic. In such a situation, as we find ourselves in today, we do not know what is what. No one knows anything for sure. This chaos is disordered and ultimately unknowable or unreasonable. Notice well; with pronouns no one really knows how to address another person or even to relate to one another. To enter into this discussion is to find oneself in a minefield.

Personally, this is a manifestation of a godless society. When human ideologies are the measure of what is good and evil, it is founded on shifting sands. I had previously mentioned this and I think it is good to mention it again. One of my favored authors is Anthony Esolen. In a recent article he talks about a statement made by a young person. "*If I have to choose between my feelings or experiences and the Bible, it's impossible for me to choose the Bible.*" Such a statement is shocking. Discounting the possible idea that it was intended to shock, if sincere it puts a finger of where people are today. People prefer to trust their own feelings and ideas over the Word of God. In other words, and I often repeat this as well, it is "*my will over God's will.*" I know what's best for me. Even better than God knows.

We all know that people do not want to be told what to think or do. We all have an ego. We do not want to risk being subservient or vulnerable to anyone. This tends to be true of our relationship with others, unless however, the other is someone who is beloved and trusted. Then we might be a little relenting. Here we see the key. It is a matter of love and trust. We live in a world that strongly leans toward selfishness and is less trusting and friendly. This taints all our relationships. Unfortunately, this also taints our relationship with God and his Holy Word. We find it difficult to trust God and His will for our lives since we gage this relationship according to our experience and relationships with others. We find reasons not to trust God and His Word with the same caution we have with others. We find it difficult to trust God and His Word as coming to us from his loving heart with our best interest at heart.

If we are looking for something objective, absolute and

true, we must look to Jesus Christ. Jesus, the Word of God in the flesh, is “the Way, the Truth and the Life.” No other human being can make this claim. Any human being who tries to make that claim is a dictator. Dictators are oppressors. They impose their ideologies on others. These ideologies are subjective. They all fail sooner or later. When they are imposed, they cause turmoil, conflict and ultimately prove to be destructive. Jesus was not a dictator: he was the humble servant to all. He never imposed Ideologies. Jesus’ life and teachings were an invitation to the fullness of life. As the Incarnate love of God, Jesus did not impose God’s Love; He revealed it. In Jesus the Word of God is proclaimed and his loving friendship is offered. We are free to accept or not. Just the same Jesus stated... “*Blessed is he who takes no offense in me.*” (Matt 11:6)

Circling back, simply put, Happy Father’s Day to all our dads.
