REFLECTIONS ON CHOOSING POLITICAL CANDIDATES

SACREDNESS OF HUMAN LIFE

“In [Rejoice and Be Glad](#) [Gaudete et Exsultate], Pope Francis writes: The call to holiness requires a “firm and passionate” defense of “the innocent unborn.” “Equally sacred,” he further states, are “the lives of the poor, those already born, the destitute, the abandoned and the underprivileged, the vulnerable infirm and elderly exposed to covert euthanasia, the victims of human trafficking, new forms of slavery, and every form of rejection.”

APPLYING A CONSISTENT MORAL FRAMEWORK

“Pope Francis has continued to draw attention to important issues such as migration, xenophobia, racism, abortion, global conflict, and care for creation. In the United States and around the world, many challenges demand our attention.

The threat of abortion remains our preeminent priority because it directly attacks life itself, because it takes place within the sanctuary of the family, and because of the number of lives destroyed. At the same time, we cannot dismiss or ignore other serious threats to human life and dignity such as racism, the environmental crisis, poverty and the death penalty.”

PRUDENTIAL DISCERNMENT

“The Church’s teaching is clear that a good end does not justify an immoral means. As we all seek to advance the common good—by defending the inviolable sanctity of human life from the moment of conception until natural death, by promoting religious freedom, by defending marriage, by feeding the hungry and housing the homeless, by welcoming the immigrant and protecting the environment—it is important to recognize that not all possible courses of action are morally acceptable. We have a responsibility to discern carefully which public policies are morally sound. Catholics may choose different ways to respond to compelling social problems, but we cannot differ on our moral obligation to help build a more just and peaceful world through morally acceptable means, so that the weak and vulnerable are protected and human rights and dignity are defended.”

“Our commitment as people of faith to imitate Christ’s love and compassion should challenge us to serve as models of civil dialogue, especially in a context where discourse is eroding at all levels of society. Where we live, work, and worship, we strive to understand before seeking to be understood, to treat with respect those with whom we disagree, to dismantle stereotypes, and to build productive conversation in place of vitriol.”

Has the candidate demonstrated sufficient competency to hold such an elected position?

PASTOR'S NOTE

WE HAVE A NEW BISHOP!!!

If you did not yet hear the news or did not watch the Installation this past Monday, you can still go to www.dioceseofcleveland.org and watch the whole thing happen. It is very interesting how the whole thing works, especially at the beginning. I don't think we will ever hear such applause anywhere else in the world for a person immediately after that person sits down! When Bishop Edward Malesic sat down on the chair in the cathedral, a chair called the *cathedra*, he officially became our 12th bishop since our diocese was founded on April 23, 1847. (And we know for sure that one of those 12 bishops was only sitting in that chair for about 2.5 years! ☺) With the coming and going of each bishop we see different styles of leadership, different priorities, different job titles and different people carrying out the goals of the bishop.

When to his surprise and ours he was called to be the Archbishop of Philadelphia, Bishop Perez was diligently working on restructuring the diocesan government model, renovating Borromeo and St. Mary Seminaries, doing his own restructuring of diocesan offices, inviting missionary groups INTO our diocese and test-implementing two national-level initiatives for parish life and Hispanic ministry. Philly must have really needed someone like him! Though we will miss him and the life he was bringing to our diocese, imagine being Bishop Malesic and walking into all of Bishop Perez' unfinished work! He will need our prayers and support for sure! It seems he was carefully chosen for this work and so we can look forward with great anticipation to the decisions that he will make and to his visitation of all 185 parishes in the diocese just like his predecessor. (He already promised to do this!)

Finally, another reminder to #WAKEUPTHEVOTE; vote absentee or in-person in this election and encourage others to do the same. Only about 58% of people who could have voted did vote in the last election! Remember that including the future choices a candidate will have to make that they cannot foresee is also important.

Please see this week's insert on other important factors for voting from our Ohio Bishops' Conference and look forward to more materials like it in the weeks to come. Discerning our candidates and reminding ourselves of the critical Catholic values at play when we vote is second only to prayer in our ability to form a more just society.
