# Go, make disciples

In the summer of 2017, Catholic bishops, priests, and lay leaders from around the country gathered for a convocation, called “The Joy of the Gospel in America,” an event that centered on the Church’s mission of evangelization. Afterwards, Bishop Michael Hoeppner of Crookston and I decided to bring some of what we experienced back to our home dioceses, and to hold our own “Convocation of Parish Leaders” for the Dioceses of Fargo and Crookston. This Convocation will take place on Nov. 30 and Dec. 1 in Fargo, and will involve priests and people from all of our parishes.

One of our priests recently reminded me of something I said at a public gathering: “If we aren’t evangelizing, we’re dead.” That might sound a little extreme, but I believe it is absolutely true. Jesus gave the Church explicit marching orders: “Go, make disciples of all nations.” If we refuse to accept this mission, how can we be the Church that Jesus calls us to be? The newly canonized Pope St. Paul VI wrote, “Evangelizing is in fact the grace and vocation proper to the Church, her deepest identity. She exists in order to evangelize.” And besides, we can no longer assume that the faith is being passed along through family tradition as it once was. People no longer automatically accept the faith of their parents and grandparents, and we as baptized Catholics must therefore step up and offer to others the gift we have received, not with imposition and aggression but with friendship, prayer, and invitation.

Some of our fellow Catholics might feel that evangelizing and witnessing to the faith are outside their comfort zone. The prospect of ringing doorbells and waving a bible in a stranger’s face isn’t very appealing to many of us. But that’s just a caricature of what we are and what we should be doing. The Catechism of the Catholic Church describes evangelization as “The proclamation of Christ and his Gospel by word and the testimony of life, in fulfillment of Christ’s command.” It’s true that we take a risk when we give witness to our faith in Christ, but the fact is that every follower of Christ is called to be an evangelist, in one way or another. Early in his pontificate, Pope Francis called upon all Catholics to be “missionary disciples,” believers who are ready and willing to be sent by Jesus into the world as his active followers and witnesses.

In the current time of scandal and crisis, when the credibility of the Church has been undermined by the sins of some of her leaders, the role of the laity is more important than ever. The baptized faithful must embrace their own role in the life and mission of the Church, which is to live fully as disciples of Jesus Christ, and to witness that faith to others in word and action. Each one of us, by virtue of our baptism, has a share in this mission and has the capacity to give the kind of witness that our world needs. One does not need a doctorate in theology to openly live the Catholic faith and to welcome others to share it. The Holy Spirit equips all of us for this mission with the outpouring of his gifts.

One of the most compelling marks of a vibrant Church is a spirit of joy. By this, I don't mean the passing enjoyment of earthly comfort. I mean the joy that emerges from our life in Christ. Faith that is joyfully lived has the capacity to attract and convince others of the truth, goodness, and beauty of Christ and his Gospel. Where the faith is lived joyfully, souls will come to know something of the joy that our Lord wants us to have, a joy that looks forward and already experiences a hint of the glory of heaven. A faith that is dour and pessimistic, on the other hand, will attract no one. It's true that we all have daily trials and even sufferings to get through, but Christian joy is not diminished by such things. It endures because it is founded on the person of Jesus, who saves us from all evil. Convinced of his grace, we can joyfully and confidently invite others to share in it.

As George Weigel has written: "Institutional maintenance Catholicism is finished. Purified, mission-driven Catholicism is the Church with a vital future." I believe he means that we cannot just keep things as they are, but we must launch more fully into the mission that Christ gave to his Church. Of course, no one would assume that a single event will turn everything around, but this Convocation aims to raise awareness among our leaders of the need for evangelization in their own parishes, as well as the fact that everyone has a part to play in the Church's mission. Hopefully, the participants will come away with a few concrete pointers and some strategies that they can use and share with others to build a culture of missionary discipleship in their own parishes. My hope and prayer is that those leaders who attend this Convocation will become a catalyst for a more vigorous sense of mission in all the parishes of our diocese.

The mission of the Church will always depend on prayer, especially the prayer of the Eucharist. Please pray for your priests and those from your parish who will attend this diocesan convocation. Without the prayer of the faithful, the mission of the Church will limp, but with your prayers, our Lord can accomplish great things among us. Pray also for those you know who are distant from the Church or those who have no relationship with the living God. Pray that God will send you to the person who needs to experience his love, to the person who is open to receiving his Gospel. And let us ask Mary, the Star of the New Evangelization, to lead all of us into the grace of Jesus, her Son.

# God is sending us, but to whom?

As missionary disciples, we are called to bring this question to prayer:

*Lord, who are you calling me to share my faith with?  
Holy Spirit, please help me to know when and how.*


As you read through the following list, think of people by name, if possible, that fit into these groups. This does not mean we are asking you to create a plan to reach out to every person on your list right now. It is here to help you brainstorm and wrestle with the question, “Lord, where should I/we begin?”

- Family member(s) and Friend(s)
- Coworker, former coworker
- Neighbor(s), person/family from your neighborhood
- Person you see working at the grocery store, gas station, coffee shop, somewhere else you frequent
- People you know from your child(ren)’s school, activities, sports, etc.
- People you know from organizations and activities in which you are involved
- Single people (young adults, single parents, widows/widowers, etc.)
- Families with young children
- Couples whose children are grown (“empty nesters”)
- The elderly
- New parishioners, people who have recently moved to your town, immigrants, ethnic minorities within your community
- People in our parishes that attend Mass with their Catholic spouses, but are not Catholic themselves
- People who have left or drifted from the Catholic Church
- People who have experienced crisis, illness, or death in their families
- The poor in your community
- Who else?..

# Growing as a Disciple

Learning to recognize the voice of God in your life and to discern his will can take place in many ways but the following can be seen as the basic pillars in the life of a disciple.

- **Prayer:** Consistent daily prayer
- **Sacraments:** Frequenting the sacraments of the Eucharist and Confession
- **Almsgiving:** Through the gifts of your time, talent, and treasure
- **Study:** In particular, spend time reading and praying with Sacred Scripture because, “In the sacred books, the Father who is in heaven comes lovingly to meet his children, and talks with them” (*Dei Verbum*, 21).
- **Community:** The life of discipleship is not meant to be lived in isolation. Gathering with others to pray, study, and for fellowship builds community within the parish family.

There are a growing number of resources that delve into the life of discipleship. If you are looking for a place to begin, the following three books are well-written, accessible to people at any stage of their faith journey, and lend themselves to group study format.

## Retreats: Places of Encounter

Part of the work of evangelization is offering people opportunities to encounter Jesus in a personal and profound way. One such opportunity is through attending retreats, which offer people the chance to step out of their ordinary routine, away from work, technology, and overall busyness to spend time in prayer with the Lord. There are several such ongoing opportunities in the Diocese of Fargo.

**Cursillo-** From the Cursillo website, “*Cursillo is a three-day learning, sharing, inspirational experience of living in a Christian community. The word "Cursillo" is Spanish, meaning "a short course." ... During the three days of a Cursillo weekend a person not only hears inspiring talks on what it really means to be a Christian, but actually experiences the joy of building and being part of a genuine Christian community.*

See the [Cursillo website](#) for upcoming retreat dates. Note that an application and a sponsor are required to attend. If you have any questions, contact the [Cursillo Secretariat](#).

**Welcome: CRHP 2.0**- Many people are unable to attend retreats due to distance and scheduling. One alternative is to offer a retreat at your parish. Welcome, which was formerly called Christ Renews His Parish, offers the retreat experience without leaving your community. Several years ago, the Dynamic Catholic Institute acquired Christ Renews His Parish and revised the program. The format is similar but now parishes receive more user-friendly leader guides, assistance from the Dynamic Catholic staff, and team formation materials. There is a one-time startup fee and then an smaller yearly renewal fee. A parish cluster, several parishes under one pastor, is able to purchase one set of rights, which can be then used in all of the parishes of the cluster.


**Other retreat opportunities:** The Office of Evangelization offers periodic directed Ignatian retreats for lay people. The Office of Catechesis offers an annual [catechist retreat](#) in the fall for those who work or volunteer in parish or school religious education programs. The Office of Youth and Young Adults offers summer retreats for middle schoolers, [SEARCH](#) for teens, as well as the opportunity for parishes to have a [NET team](#) visit your parish.

# The Kerygma

When evangelizing, we are sharing Jesus Christ with people, and in particular, we are sharing with them the message of the kerygma. The kerygma is the heart of the Gospel message, the basic points of the salvation story. In an article titled [\*The Content of the Kerygma—Good News for the World!\*](#), Marcel LeJeune, from [\*Catholic Missionary Disciples\*](#), laid out the basic points of the kerygma in several ways.

## Four Elements - A:

1. The loving plan of God for humanity
2. Sin and its consequences, especially separation from God;
3. God’s answer to our problem - in the sending of his Son for our salvation
4. The response this grace calls forth from every person: to repent, believe in Jesus, & be baptized

## Four Elements - B:


5. 1. God made us for relationship with Him.
6. 2. We sinned and then broke the relationship we were intended to have.
7. 3. Jesus (who is God and man) came to heal that relationship, through sacrificing his life, rising again, and giving us the Church.
8. 4. We have the opportunity to respond, by choosing to have Jesus be our Lord and Savior.

## Seven Elements of the Kerygma:

1. God loves you and has plan for your life.
2. Sin will destroy you.
3. Christ Jesus died to save you.
4. Repent and believe the Gospel.
5. Be baptized and receive the Holy Spirit.
6. Abide in Christ and his body the Church.
7. Go make disciples.

# Sharing Your Testimony

*The following section is adapted from the Young Disciples Apostolate training manual.*

A carefully prepared testimony, by the power of the Holy Spirit, can be an incredible tool for sharing your love and faith in Jesus Christ and his Family, the Church. We should desire to present the Gospel in such a clear, simple and attractive way that people will want to meet Jesus themselves, to change their lives so that they too can think, judge, act and hope like him. Your witness of faith does not need to be long or showy. The underlying aim is to share with others how you've encountered Jesus Christ and how this relationship has changed your life. This section contains some guidelines to help you prepare a simple and effective three-minute testimony that can be shared in a variety of situations.


- A. Remember, the forgiveness and life you have received in Baptism, which was strengthened in Confirmation and is nourished through the Eucharist. Anyone who has received these sacraments has these gifts. Some have not yet “opened” these gifts and so they might not be as readily apparent. Your testimony should encourage them to “open” these gifts, “to stir into flame the gifts that God has given” (2 Tm 1:6, NAB). When you are speaking to the unbaptized, know that the Holy Spirit can also work in their lives. He will place on their hearts a desire to receive all that our heavenly Father has intended for us to receive.
- B. Do not be concerned that your testimony be exciting; just that it be a true witness of what God has done in your life – which of course, will be interesting, because God is interesting. You don't have to be a converted drug-dealing, axe-murdering convict to have an effective testimony.
- C. Be realistic. Do not imply that Christ eliminates all the problems of life, but rather that he enables you to live them out with peace and confidence. He has clearly taught “apart from me you can do nothing” (Jn 15:5) and has reassured us, “I am with you always” (Mt 28:20).
- D. Ask the Lord to reveal how he has been present and at work in your life. Ask him to reveal his love for you and ask that he give you wisdom and guidance as you write (James 1:5-6)
- E. Follow a three-point outline:
  - (1) *Life before knowing Christ.*
  - (2) *How you came to know Christ (be specific).*
  - (3) *Life after you received Christ (changes He has made, what He means to you now).*
- F. Your testimony might focus on different themes depending on who you are sharing it with.
  - (1) *Personal Success or Happiness (your own past viewpoint and now from God's viewpoint),*
  - (2) *Life's Goals (past and present viewpoint)*
  - (3) *Relationships (How God has changed your approach),*
  - (4) *Life Crisis (How God saw you through),*
  - (5) *Purpose in Life (God's personal plan for you),*
  - (6) *Sacramental Life (the difference going to Mass on Sunday makes, daily Mass, regular Confession, Anointing of the Sick, Confirmation)*

# Charisms: Gifts to Build up the Church

In order to recognize how we are called to serve and to whom we are being sent, it is helpful to discern the charisms we have received. According to the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, charisms “are graces of the Holy Spirit which directly or indirectly benefit the Church, ordered as they are to her building up, to the good of men, and to the needs of the world” (CCC 799).

## What is Apologetics?

There are times when our family, friends, coworkers, people online, or others call into question various teachings of the Catholic Church. Apologetics, at its most basic level, is responding to those questions by explaining and defending the Catholic faith. Apologetics is *not* about winning arguments. Very few people, if any, are 'won' for Christ through trying to prove that you are right and the other person is wrong. At its heart, apologetics seeks to help people understand the truth, beauty, and goodness of what the Church teaches. There are various resources available to assist you in the task of apologetics.
