CALLED TO BE SAINTS

Last weekend we celebrated All Saints Day. Since the early centuries, the Church has reserved this one day to remember, collectively, both those saints officially named, as well as the vast number...surely the greater part...known only to God. And we are reminded how we are all called to be saints.

Most saints don't set out to become a saint; instead they live a devoted Catholic life and spend their time serving God and helping people in need. Eventually, their good deeds are recognized after their death, and the Pope canonizes them.

It is important to remember that those who have become saints did so not necessarily because of any great deeds they performed, but rather because their love of God and neighbor shone in their daily lives.

We tend to think that we can never imitate or measure up to most of the saints. We look at the saints who died for their faith—the martyrs, those who founded religious orders or established new types of service in the Church, the missionaries of old who left their homes and all that was familiar to them and headed off to serve God, which required immense sacrifices.


In the Beatitudes, Jesus summarized the virtues and attitudes implied by faithful discipleship required of saints. While these “blessings” do not exactly describe the traditional criteria for sanctity, we know that when we stand in the presence of such people or read their stories, we feel closer to Jesus. We think of St. Mother Teresa, Dorothy Day and others who embodied these qualities.

But it is also possible to recognize people we personally know who embody these qualities: someone who stands out because of her gentleness or forgiveness; someone who retains a spirit of joy in the midst of sorrows; someone who doesn't mind risking disapproval for taking an unpopular stand; someone we always count on to provide an example that is loving, brave and true; someone we can always count on to lift us up when we are down. These people also represent the face of holiness in our time.

It is not likely they will be canonized, nor have churches named in their honor. Yet, they, too may be counted among the great “cloud of witnesses” recognized on the Feast of All Saints.
