Standards of Foreign Language Learning

Introduction

While a detailed course by course curriculum is not provided in this document, the national standards offer a guideline to ensure that content and language experience is provided in our classrooms. As our world continues to grow closer through commerce, travel, and technology, it is imperative that our students broaden their cultural insights and gain a better perspective of language and heritage. Government, business, and industry need people with world language skills; and in our part of the world, Spanish is the predominant second language. Therefore, that which follows will provide a broad framework for teachers of Spanish in our high schools.

Communication

Communication in Languages Other than English

Suggested Course Objectives and Content

Spanish I

Students begin to develop listening comprehension and speaking abilities needed for normal conversation. They will read simple, non-technical literature and emphasis will be placed on grammar in student writing. Students will begin to develop a sensitivity to the value systems and culture of Spanish-speakers. The themes of personal and family life, school, and social and community life will be explored.

Spanish II

Continuing to work toward a higher level of audio-lingual skill, students will imitate and repeat the target language. Students will begin to develop longer, more complex sentences, practice their speaking, and develop more complex reading skills and vocabulary development while cultural matter is being introduced. Students will focus on the topics of being a family member, a school member, and those things which interest them as teenagers.

Spanish III

This course will offer our students a study of advanced grammar and use of this in written essays, oral presentations, short stories and other literary works. Vocabulary units are extensive and further refinement of previously learned language skills are refined. Study in this course will be focused on rights and responsibilities, their future plans, environment and teen culture, and the humanities.

Spanish IV

The priority of this language course is to develop the students' communication skills by using the language in various situations, formal and informal. The course will continue to build on the students' knowledge of Spanish in the four critical skill areas of reading, writing, speaking and listening. Further, an appreciation for the culture, history, art, and literature of the Spanish-speaking world will be developed. Topics and themes will include social issues, science, globalization, communication and economy.
