Dear parishioners,

The apostles were practicing civil disobedience. They had been told not to preach about Jesus anymore. They decided that doing what Jesus had commanded them was of greater significance than a civil order.

We seem to have it backwards today. Our culture is disobeying God and trying to make moral what is legal. The two are not the same.

Look at abortion, capital punishment, or euthanasia. A person's life is the most precious gift he/she has. No one may take another's life. Somehow a group of people in our country think that legal makes right. It doesn't. God's law always trumps civil law.

The commandments were given to us for our growth and protection. The sixth commandment forbids sex outside of marriage--mostly to protect the right of a child to a stable home. Extramarital sex is looked upon as the norm in the entertainment industry. Sexuality is pedaled to sell products. What God gave to us as a sacred share in creation has been cheapened beyond the ability to recognize its sacredness.

Rutgers University has done a study on divorce and discovered that cohabitation is the single greatest predictor of divorce. Even couples who call themselves Catholic have bought into their "right" to live together before marriage. They are blind to God's law believing that living together will help them know each other and will strengthen their marriage. Rutgers has shown that nothing is farther from the truth. Sometimes the real reason is instant gratification. Having to wait is just too much to ask!

Seeing the apostles so much value Jesus' command gives us cause to evaluate our own conduct. Am I doing what God wants or what I want?
