The Priest: A Gift from the Sacred Heart of Jesus

In 2010, at the end of the Year for Priests, Pope Benedict made these observations about the priest; he said: "The priest is a gift from the heart of Christ, a gift for the Church and for the world. From the heart of the Son of God, overflowing with love, all the goods of the Church spring forth ... One of those goods is the vocations of those men who, conquered by the Lord Jesus, leave everything behind to dedicate themselves completely to the Christian community, following the example of the Good Shepherd ... [The priest is formed by] the same charity of Christ, that love which compelled Him to give His life for His friends and to forgive His enemies ... Therefore, priests are the primary builders of the civilization of love."

The priest ministers *in persona Christi* (in the person of Christ) but he has also his own personality which he must try to conform and surrender to Christ. When he celebrates the holy Mass, and speaks the words of consecration, viz. *This is My Body*, suddenly, he sees Christ looking back at him from the Sacred Host; He seems to be saying: *Have you truly given up everything and followed Me?* And the priest must make that commitment once more to lay down his life for Christ, Whom he holds in his hands as food for the people. This conforming oneself to the Sacred Heart of Jesus is an ongoing process that only ends in death. In the meanwhile the priest either fails, or succeeds, but struggles to be faithful to the vocation that he received – also as a gift from the Heart of Christ.

Pope Benedict's comments invites all of us – both priest and people – to contemplate on how such a gift should be received. Should it be evaluated; compared, measured and weighed against previous gifts, or our own rigid ideas of how a priest should be? Or should it truly be received, graciously, as a gift? Priests come in all shapes and sizes. We got big priests, little priests, fat priests, skinny priests, loud priests, quiet priests, liberal priests, conservative priests, modern priests, traditional priests, native priests, foreign priests, but in as much as they make Christ present for the community, each one is a gift, and if the giver is Christ, but the gift isn't exactly measuring up to our expectations, it's good to consider "why this gift at this time; what need is the Lord fulfilling for me with this gift?" The priest does the same as he moves from one parish to another, viz. "Why this flock? Why now?"

July 3rd: Feast of Saint Thomas the Apostle

"And after eight days, again His disciples were within, and Thomas with them. Then came Jesus, the doors being shut, and stood in the midst, and said, Peace be unto you. Then saith He to Thomas, Reach hither thy finger, and behold my hands; and reach hither thy hand, and put it into my side: and be not faithless, but believing. Thomas answered and said unto Him, My Lord and my God." He saw and touched the man, and acknowledged the God whom he neither saw nor touched; but by the means of what he saw and touched, he now put far away from him every doubt, and believed the other.

June 29th: The Feast of Saints Peter & Paul

This day has been made Holy by the passion of the apostles Peter and Paul. For their voice has gone forth to all the world, and to the ends of the earth their message. Both apostles share the same feast day, for these two were one; and even though they suffered on different days, they were as one. Peter went first, and Paul followed. And so we celebrate

this day made holy for us by the apostles' blood. Let us embrace what they believed, their life, their labors, their sufferings, their preaching and their confession of faith. But most of all, let us celebrate Christ. For Peter exclaimed, *"Lord to whom shall we go? You have the words of Eternal Life; and we believe and are convinced that you are the Christ, the Son of the living God."*

Saint Peter

Saint Peter, the first of the apostles and a fervent lover of Christ, merited to hear these words: *I say to you that you are Peter*, for he had said: *You are the Christ, the Son of the living God*. Then Christ said: *And I say to you that you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my Church*. On this rock I will build the faith that you now confess, and on your words: *You are Christ, the Son of the living God, I will build my Church*. For you are Peter, and the name Peter comes from *petra*, the word for "rock," and not vice versa. "Peter" comes, therefore, from *petra*, just as "Christian" comes from Christ.

As you are aware, Jesus chose his disciples before His passion and called them apostles; and among these almost everywhere Peter alone deserved to represent the entire Church. And because of that role which he alone had, he merited to hear the words: *To you I shall give the keys of the kingdom of Heaven*. For it was not one man who received the keys, but the entire Church considered as one. Now insofar as he represented the unity and universality of the Church, Peter's preeminence is clear from the words: *To you I give*, for what was given was given to all. For the fact that it was the Church that received the keys of the kingdom of God is clear from what the Lord says elsewhere to all the apostles: *Receive the Holy Spirit, adding immediately, whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven, and whose sins you retain, they are retained*. Rightly then did the Lord after His resurrection entrust Peter with the feeding of His sheep. Yet he was not the only disciple to merit the feeding of the Lord's sheep; but Christ in speaking only to one suggests the unity of all; and so He speaks to Peter, because Peter is first among the apostles. Therefore, do not be disheartened, Peter; reply once, reply twice, reply a third time. The triple confession of your love is to regain what was lost three times by your fear. You must loose three times what you bound three times; untie by love that which your fear bounds. Once, and again, and a third time did the Lord entrust His sheep to Peter.

Saint Paul

The Apostle Paul is one of the great missionaries of the early church. Paul, then known as Saul, vowed to wipe out belief in Jesus Christ. After a vision he was converted to do the work of Jesus. Paul authored many of the books in the New Testament. He endured repeated attacks on his life, sickness, and rejection to bring the message of God's grace and forgiveness to Gentiles. Paul spoke before Jews, Greeks, and Romans. Paul is known as the apostle to the Gentiles. He defended God's Word before kings and emperors of this world. By the end of his life, thanks to Paul's journeys, much of the Mediterranean world had been reached with the gospel.
