The marble statue of Our Lady of Darnestown captures forever a moment in time between the Annunciation by Gabriel to Mary and the Visitation of Mary to Elizabeth. "During those days Mary set out and travelled to the hill country in

#### **PASTOR'S PAGE**

October is the month of the Holy Rosary. A parishioner thanked me for putting pamphlets in the vestibule on how to pray the rosary. We will have additional pamphlets and rosaries in the vestibule this month to encourage you and your families to pray the rosary together. The rosary is a source of power, peace, and patience. First, Mary is such a powerful intercessor for the Church, families, and individuals. Mary actually gave St. Dominic a rosary to be a weapon against heretics in the 1200s. Second, saying 10 Hail Mary's 5 times (if praying the whole 5-decade rosary) and meditating on the mysteries of the lives of Jesus and Mary bring us grace, peace and calmness. Third, praying the rosary is an excellent way to grow in patience; I especially recommend this when stuck in traffic(!).

An excellent activity in October is praying the rosary as a family. You can start with one decade together after dinner or pray all five decades (mysteries). What a wonderful tradition to start! Here are more insights on the rosary from catholicculture.org.

The Rosary is Christocentric setting forth the entire life of Jesus Christ, the passion, death, resurrection and glory. Of course, the Rosary honors and contemplates Mary too, and rightly so, for the same reason that the Liturgical Year does likewise: "Because of the mission she received from God, her life is most closely linked with the mysteries of Jesus Christ, and there is no one who has followed in the footsteps of the Incarnate Word more closely and with more merit than she"142 (Mediator Dei). Meditation on this cycle of Joyful, Sorrowful, Glorious and Luminous Mysteries makes the Rosary not only "a breviary or summary of the Gospel and of Christian life,"(Ingravescentibus malis) but also a compendium of the Liturgical Year. Therewith the Rosary stands revealed as a dynamic teacher and nurturer of Christian faith, morality, and spiritual perfection, fostering in various ways faith, hope, charity, and the other virtues, and mediating special graces, all to the end that we may become more and more like unto Christ. — Mariology, Juniper B. Carol, O.F.M.

haste to a town of Judah." (*Luke 1:39*) Mary's joy, peace and urgency are shown by the look in her eyes, by her hand held to her heart, and by her flowing veil, hair and tunic. An outdoor jewel in the setting of living plants and trees, the placement of the statue makes the image of the Mother of God clearly visible and easily approachable by all. As pilgrims on our way to church, we actually walk along with Mary; as we leave church and prepare our journey home, our eyes are drawn immediately and directly to Our Lady. ("Notre Dame de Darnestown" was sculpted by Angel Ramirez and was designed by Fr. Raymond Fecteau.)

SAINTS/WINDOWS: 19 October, Isaac Jogues (1607-1646), John de Brebeuf, Charles Garnier, Anthony Daniel, Gabriel Lallemant, Noel Chabanel, John de Lalande, and Rene Goupil were French Jesuit missionaries. They preached the gospel to the Hurons and the Iroquois in what is now part of Quebec Province and New York State. Father Jogues suffered torture and mutilation. After escaping from his captors he later returned to minister to the Iroquois. These Jesuits, priests and lay assistants, were martyred by the Iroquois between 1642 and 1649. The official seal of the Society of Jesus contains symbols for Christ crucified (upper panel). Ships that sailed to New France flew flags with a white cross on a blue field (lower panel).

SACRAMENTAL PREPARATION: Following the policy of the Archdiocese of Washington, the Sacramental Programs for Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist and Penance are parish and family based. For youth, Confirmation is a three-year program that begins in the sixth grade; Eucharist/Penance is a two-year program that begins in the first grade. Throughout this period of preparation, children are to be participating in a formal religious education program in our parish or in a Catholic school.
