HABÍA UNA VEZ

Déjame contarte un cuento. . . Esa frase nos encanta. De alguna manera nuestros cuerpos se relajan y nuestra anticipación aumenta. Déjame contarte un cuento, parece que eso es lo que dice Jesús, mientras busca imágenes vívidas que nos ayuden a amar la realidad misteriosa del Reino de Dios. Jesús explica que el Reino de Dios es como una semilla que crece. El sembrador que planta la semilla, aunque sabe que crece quizá no conoce de qué manera ocurre su plenitud. La fotografía moderna puede ayudarnos a registrar paso a paso en un periodo de tiempo el desarrollo de una semilla en una planta, pero aquellas personas contemporáneas de Jesús que lo escuchaban nunca pudieron ver dichas fotografías. Para esas personas que lo escuchaban, el crecimiento de la semilla, imperceptible pero inconfundible, parecía milagroso. Jesús aprovecha el conocimiento y asombro de su audiencia para ayudarles a tener una experiencia de lo que quiere comunicar: aunque no siempre podemos verlo o comprobarlo, Dios se manifiesta a nosotros en todo tiempo y lugar. El Reino de Dios está en todas partes, y no hay ningún lugar donde Dios no guíe nuestro crecimiento.

POTENCIAL DE CRECIMIENTO

A lo largo de los evangelios, Jesús nos cuenta muchas parábolas para ayudar a explicar el Reino de Dios. Ambas parábolas del día de hoy tomadas del Evangelio de Marcos incluyen semillas, por extraño que parezca. Las semillas son realmente una cosa rara para un reino. ¿Te puedes imaginar a un poderoso reino en cuyas banderas y estandartes reales tengan la imagen de una pequeña semilla? Sin embargo, Jesús la menciona de manera doble invitándonos primero a imaginar una semilla de grano y luego una semilla de mostaza. Jesús anhela que comprendamos el Reino de Dios está lleno de una fuerza inesperada. Un árbol marchito florece, una virgen tiene un hijo, un hombre muerto sale de su tumba. Nuestras Escrituras son un amplio catálogo de victorias inverosímiles. Caminamos por la fe, como san Pablo dice, y no por la vista, debemos creer que Dios transforma la debilidad en fuerza, la muerte en vida. Es muy posible que preferíamos victorias rápidas y demostrables en nuestras vidas, pero el estilo de Dios a menudo se asemeja a la forma delicada de las semillas.

ELEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Very few of us have ever seen an actual mustard seed or held one between our fingers. Yet Jesus' parable of the mustard seed captivates us today as we imagine an unlikely, tiny seed bursting into fullness. Today's readings are full of unlikely, unexpected fullness. The prophet Ezekiel praises the Lord who lowers the tallest trees and raises up the small ones, even making "the withered tree bloom." Believing in this transformational power of God, Saint Paul tells the Corinthians to live courageously; one day, the Lord will accept our fragile, earthly bodies and welcome us home to eternal health and strength in heaven. At some time or another, we have all felt small, outnumbered, discouraged, incomplete, friendless, or unsatisfied. Today's readings promise that God embraces our smallness and transforms us, little by little.

GROWTH POTENTIAL

Throughout the Gospels, Jesus tells many parables to help explain the kingdom of God. Both of today's parables from Mark's Gospel involve seeds, strangely enough. Seeds really are a bizarre emblem for a kingdom. Can you imagine a mighty kingdom whose royal banners boast a picture of a tiny seed? Jesus doubles down on the image, however, inviting us to picture first a seed of grain, and then a mustard seed. Jesus longs for us to understand that God's kingdom is full of unexpected strength. A withered tree blooms, a virgin bears a son, a dead man bursts out of his tomb. Our scriptures are a long catalog of unlikely victories. We walk by faith, as Saint Paul says, and not by sight—we must believe that God transforms all weakness into strength, all death into life. We may prefer swift, demonstrable victories in our lives, but God's style often resembles the gentle way of seeds.

BRIEF HISTORY FATHERS DAY



There are two stories of when the first Father's Day was celebrated. According to some accounts, the first Father's Day was celebrated in Washington state on June 19, 1910. A woman by the name of Sonora Smart Dodd came up with the idea of honoring and celebrating her father while listening to a Mother's Day sermon at church in 1909. She felt as though mothers were getting all the acclaim while fathers were equally deserving of a day of praise (She would probably be displeased that Mother's Day still gets the lion's share of attention).

Sonora's dad was quite a man. William Smart, a veteran of the Civil War, was left a widower when his wife died while giving birth to their sixth child. He went on to raise the six children by himself on their small farm in Washington. To show her appreciation for all the hard work and love William gave to her and her siblings, Sonora thought there should be a day to pay homage to him and other dads like him. She initially suggested June 5th, the anniversary of her father's death to be the designated day to celebrate Father's Day, but due to some bad planning, the celebration in Spokane, Washington was deferred to the third Sunday in June.

The other story of the first Father's Day in America happened all the way on the other side of the country in Fairmont, West Virginia on July 5, 1908. Grace Golden Clayton suggested to the minister of the local Methodist church that they hold services to celebrate fathers after a deadly mine explosion killed 361 men.

While Father's Day was celebrated locally in several communities across the country, unofficial support to make the celebration a national holiday began almost immediately. William Jennings Bryant was one of its staunchest proponents. In 1924, President Calvin "Silent Cal" Coolidge recommended that Father's Day become a national holiday. But no official action was taken.

In 1966, Lyndon B. Johnson, through an executive order, designated the third Sunday in June as the official day to celebrate Father's Day. However, it wasn't until 1972, during the Nixon administration, that Father's Day was officially recognized as a national holiday.
