THE GOSPEL TODAY

Mark 9:38-48

John said to him, 'Teacher, we saw someone casting out demons in your name, and we tried to stop him, because he was not following us.' But Jesus said, 'Do not stop him; for no one who does a deed of power in my name will be able soon afterwards to speak evil of me. Whoever is not against us is for us. For truly I tell you, whoever gives you a cup of water to drink because you bear the name of Christ will by no means lose the reward.

'If any of you put a stumbling-block before one of these little ones who believe in me, it would be better for you if a great millstone were hung around your neck and you were thrown into the sea. If your hand causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life maimed than to have two hands and to go to hell, to the unquenchable fire. And if your foot causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life lame than to have two feet and to be thrown into hell. And if your eye causes you to stumble, tear it out; it is better for you to enter the kingdom of God with one eye than to have two eyes and to be thrown into hell, where their worm never dies, and the fire is never quenched.

TAKING THE GOSPEL HOME

This Gospel could have been written today. It describes a reality that we see played out every day in many ways. It seems to happen in many groups, families, teams, clubs, institutions, or communities. It happens in society at large-- there are in-groups and out-groups, people are seen as either insiders or outsiders.


This pitting of insiders against outsiders can be deadly. It breeds suspicion, fear and division. It is harmful and destructive.

Jesus doesn't buy into the division; instead, he gives the disciples a lesson in tolerance. Perhaps He also was telling them to be careful not to limit God's spirit. The Spirit and mission of God were not to be the exclusive property of the Twelve, but were to be shared with many. "Whoever is not against us is for us."

In essence, Jesus is making a statement about the importance of thinking inclusively and acting inclusively in ministry, in relationships and in community. Be aware of the presence of God all around you! Be open to those who can teach you and challenge you to look at things differently. Look for God in those you might consider to be "outside your circle."

As we remain steadfast in responding to the impact of the pandemic upon our communities of faith and the healing and reconciliation for Indigenous Peoples across the land, your prayers, gestures of kindness and generosity are invaluable, heartfelt and true sources of consolation, comfort and renewed encouragement in the pursuit of the Church's pastoral mission.

We will have more to say on this important work in the days and weeks ahead, particularly as the Plenary Assembly of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops meets for its annual meeting next week. In the meantime, to ensure that the Church's operational, spiritual, and programming needs are met, we will be proceeding with the annual Collection for the Needs of the Church in Canada on 25 and 26 September 2021.

This annual charitable initiative assists the Bishops in their ministry of accompanying, teaching, guiding, sanctifying and caring for the Church in Canada. We appreciate any commitments that you are able to make.

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

ST. VINCENT DE PAUL**




