We pray that the victory of Christ's cross and resurrection may extend to us today, and give us the strength to get through these trying times.

This Sunday, April 19, is Divine Mercy Sunday. This was a day instituted by Pope St. John Paul II to celebrate the mystery of God's merciful love, particularly as revealed to St. Faustina, a Polish nun who had visions of Jesus in the 1930s. One of the devotions introduced through the visions of St. Faustina is the Divine Mercy Chaplet. I've included a guide for how to say this prayer on the next page. The hour that Jesus gave His life for us on the cross, 3 p.m., is a traditional time to offer this prayer. It's a simple, but powerful prayer that can be said using a regular Rosary.

Catechism Corner

The institution of the Eucharist (continued)

“Do this in memory of me”

1341 The command of Jesus to repeat his actions and words "until he comes" does not only ask us to remember Jesus and what he did. It is directed at the liturgical celebration, by the apostles and their successors, of the memorial of Christ, of his life, of his death, of his Resurrection, and of his intercession in the presence of the Father.

1342 From the beginning the Church has been faithful to the Lord's command. of the Church of Jerusalem it is written:

They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers.... Day by day, attending the temple together and breaking bread in their homes, they partook of food with glad and generous hearts.

How to Pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet

Optional Opening Prayers:

You expired, Jesus, but the source of life gushed forth for souls, and the ocean of mercy opened up for the whole world.

O Fount of Life, unfathomable Divine Mercy, envelop the whole world and empty Yourself out upon us.

(Repeat 3 times:) O Blood and Water, which gushed forth from the Heart of Jesus as a fountain of Mercy for us, I trust in You!



Our Father, Hail Mary and the Apostle's Creed

(On each large "Our Father" bead of the rosary, pray:)

Eternal Father, I offer you the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your Dearly Beloved Son, Our Lord, Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.



(On each of the 10 small "Hail Mary" beads, pray:)

For the sake of His sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

(Repeat these prayers for all five decades.)

Concluding prayer *(Repeat 3 times)*

Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

Optional Closing Prayer

Eternal God, in whom mercy is endless and the treasury of compassion inexhaustible, look kindly upon us and increase Your mercy in us, that in difficult moments we might not despair nor become despondent, but with great confidence submit ourselves to Your holy will, which is Love and Mercy itself. Amen.
