Are non-Catholics eligible to be named saints?

"The cause of beatification and canonization regards a Catholic who in life, in death and after death has enjoyed a reputation of holiness by living all the Christian virtues in an heroic manner" (Sanctorum Mater, 4.1). In this process, the Catholic Church not only investigates the heroic virtues of a candidate, but confirms miracles attributed to them after their death, and ultimately declares a person to be a saint in heaven and worthy of veneration.

Moreover, the process is ecclesial: it is executed by the Catholic Church for the holiness of its members. "By canonizing some of the faithful, i.e., by solemnly proclaiming that they practiced heroic virtue lived in fidelity to God's grace, the Church recognizes the power of the Spirit of holiness within her and sustains the hope of believers by proposing the saints to them as models and intercessors" (CCC 828).

While there are non-Catholic saints worthy of canonization, the Church does not presume to canonize members of other churches (should they even be presented for validation); rather, the Church favors candidates who are in the same full communion of faith as the Catholics whose understanding of saints look to them as intercessors. As Kenneth Woodward wrote in *Making Saints*, "Catholic saints make sense only within a world where the 'body of Christ' is more than just a metaphor."

2 | Welcome to St. Romuald Catholic Church

Words from the Pastor**+JMJ+**

In the time of Jesus, some people believed in resurrection and some didn't. Some things don't change, right? The Pharisees did believe. Of course, Jesus' disciples believed, as Jesus said "***I am*** the resurrection" in John 11:25. But the Sadducees did not believe in resurrection. So, they approach Jesus in today's reading to argue against any such resurrection of the dead. They came up with a clever argument to justify their disbelief. They ask Jesus a hypothetical question about the case of a woman who happens to have married seven brothers after the first six died suddenly after a brief marriage. The custom at the time was for a deceased man's brother to marry the widow, to receive the brother's estate, to provide her protection, and to allow for future children with her as a legacy of the family name. So the Sadducees ask, "In heaven, whose wife will she be and by whose side will she sit?" A first false flag for us is any suggestion of a *hypothetical situation*, as they tend mostly to be so unlikely as to border on a fantasy scenario. I give the Sadducees an "A" for being creative and clever for the sake of argument. Yet, their example doesn't fit at all into the radically changed circumstances of heaven! So, Jesus responds basically saying that they are comparing apples with oranges. They are imagining things in heaven to be just like how things are on earth. Two things so unlike each other, there is a 'world' of difference! Such comparing of two things/circumstances that are so radically different is a setup for confusion and misunderstanding. For example, imagine the case of a child who walked into a diner with her dad from a snow storm. She looked around the room, and watched one guy blowing on his cup of coffee ***to cool it off***, and then turned around and watched a man who just walked in blowing his nearly frozen hands ***to warm them up***. Which is it? The child was so confused: ***is breath warm or cold?*** One guy breathed on coffee to cool it off, and another blew on his hands to warm them up! But depending on the surrounding temperature, it is like apples and oranges! Or I remember being told by an electrician to watch out when we opened a wall outlet one time and I grabbed the black wire and commented, "Oh I remember on the lawn mower battery, red is always hot-live and black is negative-ground. ***AND***, he said ***'No***, not here with AC, watch out because black is hot-active and white is neutral' (& green ground!). Ah-oh! DC and AC are very different! Both cases are matters dealing with two different things or circumstances. Apples and oranges! And Jesus points out that relations on earth and relations in heaven are also incomparably different!

Or considering one's frame of reference, what seems impossible to one person can seem very possible to another with a more expansive outlook or different experiences! For example, once we accept that God has intervened in human history and opened new horizons, then a whole new range of experiences becomes possible; what might not fit before suddenly becomes suitable, and maybe even to be expected! The Sadducees are so caught up in their old-world 'blue blood' earthly concerns, to keep their inherited privilege and pass along their upper class prestige

within their family line, that they cannot imagine heaven's divine inclusivity and equality. Their concern to stay on top of society (by even arranging political marriage dynasties) ***blinds*** them to the heavenly-reset we call resurrection. With resurrection in heaven where all people before God are equally in a familial relationship to Him and one another, the Sadducees lose their earthly edge over others. For Jesus, resurrection and the experience of eternal life beyond earth meant that the need for protective exclusivity among an individual family, or the bond between generations was unnecessary within the new horizon of heavenly communion among God and His people. The concept of family is so broadened and bonds of relationship are so expanded that generational divides and family boundaries are overcome. Think of what we mean today by '***communion of saints***', and the heavenly sharing of all things in common. Or what Jesus means when he says in Matthew 23:9 "For ***you have one Father, who is in heaven.***" Or when he says in Matthew 12:48-49 "Who is My mother, and who are My brothers?..... ***Whoever does the will of My Father in heaven is My brother and sister and mother.***" Jesus is pointing out that in heaven we are all family to one another. We belong to each other, and dwell in heavenly peace with everyone, living in mutual fidelity to each other. There is no need in heaven of exclusive, protective institutions such as marriage or the nuclear family. What is needed on earth is surpassed in heaven! In heaven God provides the grace of equality and a mutual sharing in all things, a perfect communion with all.

Sadly, a way of describing the Sadducees' shortsighted vision of life, is that their denial, of belief in the resurrection means that they are stuck on/in earth. They cannot imagine heaven. We can hope and pray that they came to believe. But regardless, the reading invites us to remember and offer God thanks for the world of possibility Jesus opened for us along with the grace that we do believe!

Here are some daily questions to consider in our prayer time!

Sunday: What message or word from God stayed with me, that I can share or discuss with someone else in this coming week? Ask someone else what they heard?

Monday: Take some extra time today to pray for our country. Have you asked for God's guidance yourself? Have I trusted God enough? Reflect before you elect!

Tuesday: Arguments often only alienate people further. Can I approach someone I disagree with, and offer a listening ear before sharing my position with them?

Wednesday: Do I think of heaven every day? Here is a good question to ask before every word said or action done: Does this bring me closer to heaven or farther away?

Thursday: God takes the patient long-view of life. Do I think of eternity, or just tomorrow?

Friday: Perform some sacrifice or service today as a thanks offering for God's forgiveness.

Saturday: Have I read over the readings for Sunday's mass as a preparation? Can I go early enough to offer the rosary with others for peace in the world?


Thirty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

Ask and receive

Today begins National Vocation Awareness Week, during which Catholics celebrate and encourage vocations to the priesthood, diaconate, and consecrated life. It's important for every Catholic to participate in creating what the bishops call a "culture of vocations," and that includes praying for vocations and proposing vocations to young people. Many priests, sisters, and brothers have said that they first considered a vocation when someone simply asked them if they would consider it. Do you know a special young person who might answer the call if you asked them the question?

MONDAY, NOVEMBER 7
Lead the way

Many of us have an opinion on how the Catholic Church should be led. We all have our favorite popes, our liturgical gripes, our preferred spiritual authors, and our hot-button issues. If it were up to us, we would know in which direction to point the church. But what if it really *is* up to us? Is it possible this clarity and certainty in your vision is a call from the Holy Spirit to seek a role of service through leadership? Consider the gifts that qualify you to lead.

TODAY'S READINGS: Titus 1:1-9; Luke 17:1-6 (491). "For a bishop as God's steward must be . . . hospitable, a lover of goodness, temperate, holy, just, and self-controlled."

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 8
Vote, vote, vote!

Leadership is a responsibility that belongs to all of us. Even if we don't hold an office and title, we're tasked with choosing those who do. MEMORIAL OF LEO THE GREAT, POPE, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH

Believe and let believe

A few pope-saints are called "great" for significantly contributing to the growth of the faith, often by opposing heresy. Leo, in the fifth century, oversaw great development in the tenets of the Creed that we profess every Sunday morning, but which arose out of intense theological debate. If you ever feel the need to defend or justify your faith, wonderful, but don't become embroiled in arguments and defensiveness. Take a step beyond what you learned in religion class. Consult the *Catechism*; study reliable Internet sources, but do your homework—some websites that call themselves "Catholic" have a bias. Stand up for the faith, but know what you are standing for.

MEMORIAL OF MARTIN OF TOURS, BISHOP

Serve someone who has already served
Consider this cartoon in two panels: The first—"The Unknown Soldier"—depicts flowers and wreaths placed before a monument. The second panel—"The Known Soldier"—shows a homeless, suicidal veteran with PTSD begging, completely ignored. Saint Martin is the patron of the archdiocese for U.S. military chaplains. Martin shared his cloak with a beggar, only to discover in a dream that the beggar was Christ. Ever seen Christ begging at a traffic light? Be like the military chaplains, who soldiers see as fellow warriors. You, too, can minister to vets. Let's all fight for their honor.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 12
MEMORIAL OF JOSAPHAT, BISHOP, MARTYR
Division doesn't add up

Ukraine is in the news these days because of an East-West conflict being played out with Russia. Five centuries ago, the region was embroiled in another East-West conflict, this one between the western (Roman) and eastern (Orthodox) branches of Catholicism. Josaphat, an Eastern Rite bishop, is held up as a martyr for church unity because he died trying to bring part of the Orthodox Church into union with Rome. The unsung heroes of his story are some Jewish people who risked their lives to try to save Josaphat from the angry mob that killed him. Resist mob mentality wherever you encounter it—including in politics, the media, and online. Be a voice for unity, not division.

TODAY'S READINGS: 3 John 5-8; Luke 18:1-8 (496). "Will not God then secure the rights of his chosen ones who call out to him day and night?"
