***1 Corinthians 10:13 states, "God... will not let you be tried beyond your strength; but with the trial he will also provide a way out..." My brother committed suicide, and I wonder why he wasn't "able to bear it." Please help me to understand.***

The death of a family member is never easy to deal with. I pray for your peace and your brother's eternal rest.

We can't be sure what your brother was thinking when he ended his life, but we can be certain God was with him. God remains faithful to his covenant and will never disappoint the hope and trust of his children. Does this mean your brother failed to trust in God? We don't know that. Only God and your brother know the extent of his condition and suffering.

When we recall Jesus' lament from the cross—"My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" (Matthew 27:46; Psalm 22:2)—we see that in his darkest moment, his Father was with him. In the same way, God was present in the worst of your brother's trials. Why he was nevertheless unable to bear them is a question we may never have the answer to on this side of heaven. It's important to remember that the Church has great compassion for those who commit suicide. To leave your brother in God's merciful hands is to act with the conviction of our faith.

## Words from the Pastor

News of John's arrest comes to Jesus, and Jesus says "Let's Roll!" Okay, it doesn't happen just like that, but pretty close. Tragically, John's arrest only troubles King Herod even more and leads eventually to Herod executing John. So John leaves the public stage. And Jesus knows 'his hour has come'. As John fades from the scene, Jesus ramps up his ministry and mission. First step, is the roll-out of the announcement 'The Kingdom is at hand'. Then, the second step is Jesus organizing his team by electing His closest co-workers, the Twelve apostles (like the selection of His cabinet!) Jesus' organization of troops begins in our reading today of the "Call-Story" of Peter, Andrew, James and John! Two set of brothers (like a call-one-get-another too, or two!!) By Jesus calling all brothers in this one episode, He is already a third of the way to the perfect number twelve for his hand-picked partners in ministry. This also begins his pattern of later sending out on mission his apostles/disciples in His 'two-by-two' style. Every 'Call-Story' I read in the gospels, makes me reflect upon how I answer Christ's call. We do have the 'big call' of our 'state in life', whether marriage, family and children are God's plan for us, or living singly in consecrated, religious life, or in Holy Orders. But we also have the daily call to serve God in whatever our state, through our constant decisions and minute to minute choices that constitute our Christian lifestyle. If we refer to ourselves as Christian, that means we are to 'represent' Christ. And we reflect Christ, or don't, by the faithfulness we exhibit in every thought, word and action we express. Our conduct silently says something about our beliefs.

Recently I have been reading the Constitutions and Norms of the Jesuit Religious Order, (I do not personally know any Jesuits, but our Holy Father Francis is a member of the Jesuits, so I wanted to read the foundational and formational materials that guide his living of the Gospel). One of the many guiding principles in their constitutions is this: "The more universal the good is, the more it is divine." Their Constitutions speak of the familiarity with God of "members (Jesuits) for *their own* spiritual progress/edification **and that of the rest of people** among whom they happen to be" (Const 585). Always mindful one's own need of salvation, and cooperating with God bringing it about, **but also always assisting others to come to 'salvation' themselves**, the Constitutions are filled with **concern for one's neighbor**. Being just as concerned about a neighbor or as one is about oneself, and the effect we have on others is vital to Jesuit missions. Such phrases as "the good of **all** souls" and "what may impede or promote the **good of all** souls" appear all over the Constitutions. The Jesuit founder St Ignatius emphasized the love of God expressed in **one's love of neighbor**. Just like St Francis Assisi's command to 'go preach, and consider it a failure of witness if you have to use words', St Ignatius says it this way, "By one's upright life, strive to edify those with whom one deals no less, but rather **even more by good deeds than by words**" (Const 637) I bring this up because we need examples, and we look for models on which to pattern our lives. Pope Francis says as much when he reminds us to serve Christ with the '**credibility of witness**', and by '**loving people into the Truth**'. So Jesus invites 12 partners into his mission to be further examples of living in his Company. Watch as the apostles embody the Kingdom of God to the world. But with human models we easily enough

have breakdowns. Often we look to the Early Church as an example in itself of how to best embody following Jesus. But, notice today, St Paul in our second reading correcting the poor example among the Early Church that fell into rivalry and competition. He mentions church members fighting over whether it is best to be taught by Paul, Apollos or Cephas. In Christ, **we all lose** when anyone is put over another. Or **anyone put down, puts all of us down!** Paul reminds them, "You were not baptized into Paul. Was Paul crucified for you? No, it is only Jesus!" (1 Cor 11:12-13) We do need worthy apostle-examples: holy men and women who consistently portray what it means to be as Christ like as humanly possible. But we never want our **models to mistake their holiness as their own creation** instead of it being the grace of God's spirit within them. St Paul offers us wisdom by offering the rule in 1 Corinthians 11:1 "Imitate me, as I imitate Christ." Christ is the standard, and only His Way is to be followed. All **Christian** Ministry is His, and His alone is the Glory! A humble Christian attitude is simply to say, "If You see Christ in me, follow me, and if not, stay with Christ--- Yet, love me enough to call me back to Christ, too!" We all need daily examination and periodic review of our lives and witness.

A final note: When the apostles leave their previous way of life and employment of fishing, notice that their following Christ does not wipe out their previous skill sets and experiences. Jesus wants them to keep their acquired skills and apply them to new purposes, as when he says, "You once were fishermen, now you will **fish for men!**" They still use what they know, just now, for new purposes. We will see Jesus tell Peter 'go fish' again when he has him go to the sea, cast a line and draw a fish from the sea, opening its mouth to retrieve two coins to pay the Temple Tax for them in Matthew 17:24-27 or consider all the many times they still sail their boats to move around Galilee and Judea, crossing the Sea of Galilee. We too need to keep handy our life's experiences and skills and allow God to use them for new purposes!

Here are some daily questions to consider in our prayer time!

**Sunday:** Did any word or phrase stay in my mind after mass today? What do I remember of the readings or message to carry with me into the week as a challenge?

**Monday:** Have I ever felt God call me strongly to do something? Is He now? What is it?

**Tuesday:** Peter and Andrew left behind their boats and nets. Has my following Jesus led me to leave anything behind for a greater work or greater good?

**Wednesday:** Do I consider myself a messenger or missionary for Jesus? Do my actions or my words lead others to know that I am a faithful Christian?

**Thursday:** What practices do I routinely take up to make sure my following of Jesus keeps current and I remain open to doing His will?

**Friday:** Perform some act of kindness or work of mercy today for someone anonymously.

**Saturday:** Have I reread the mass gospel or epistle for this weekend? What am I especially thankful for to offer God at Mass this weekend?

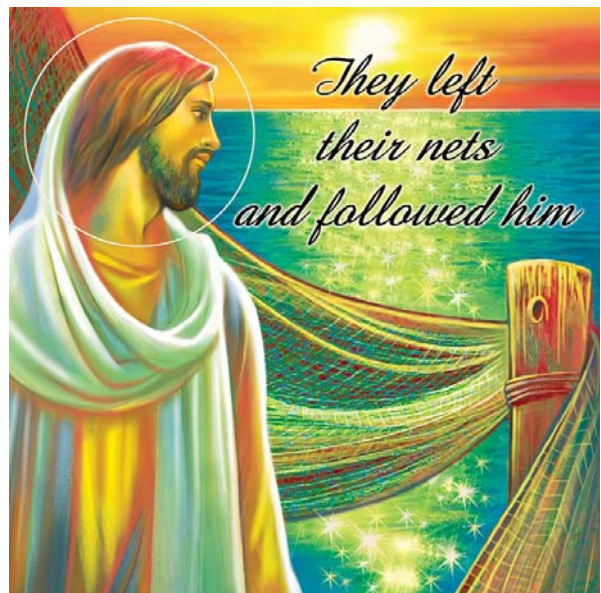

De Sales is considered patron of Catholic writers and journalists because he made innovative use of the new technology, developing flyers and booklets widely used in spiritual direction and religious education. To this day Catholic journalists look to him as a model and inspiration, and the St. Francis de Sales Award is the highest award the Catholic Press Association presents. If you have a knack for the communication arts, consider a career in religious journalism. Perhaps you are called to be the Francis de Sales of the internet generation!

### **Make history by collaborating**

Saint Paul would agree that faith isn't a matter of words but of how we live. In 1963 the Catholic theologian Yves Congar wrote an essay in which he observed how unity is fostered more by personal contacts than formal decrees. Congar dreamed of a research center in which Catholic, Orthodox, Anglican, and Protestant students would publish great church histories—but only after all of them could sign his or her name to each volume. How different would history sound if written by collaborators rather than partisans?

They were revered followers of Jesus' way and remained loyal and trustworthy friends to Paul even during the most difficult times. Friendship is the primary Christian relationship. Jesus calls his disciples—including you—his friends. How have you acknowledged this friendship?

Saint Angela Merici didn't set out to form a typical religious community of women. An orphan herself, she began by giving religious instruction to the poor children of her neighbors. Before long, other women were attracted to join her. By the time she was 50, she began a community of women called the Ursulines, who embraced virginity, poverty, and obedience. But they took no formal vows. They didn't formally congregate as a religious community either, but stayed at home to evangelize their family, friends, and neighbors. Evangelism can begin with even the tiniest seed. With whom will you share a bit of the Good News today?

Thomas Aquinas was born in 1225 at his family's castle near Naples, Italy. Despite many social and political opportunities, he chose to join the Dominican friars when he was 19—much to his family's dismay and anger. Thomas went on to become one of the greatest of Christian scholars, known for bringing together ancient philosophies with Christian theology and systematizing the whole of the church's wisdom and teachings. Pray for spiritual aid today using Thomas' own prayer: "Grant me, O Lord my God, a mind to know you, a heart to seek you, wisdom to find you, conduct pleasing to you, faithful perseverance in waiting for you, and a hope of finally embracing you."
