Did Adam and Eve repent of their sin, and if so, were they forgiven?

Genesis 1—3 is written primarily to convey truths about God: God is good, loving, and provident; humankind was ungrateful to God and introduced evil into the world. However, despite humanity's sinfulness, there is still hope because of God's goodness and mercy. The Garden of Eden story is focused more on the loss of original holiness and the consequences of original sin than on repentance.

So while the Bible doesn't state that Adam and Eve sought repentance, we can know with certainty that God offered them forgiveness, and we can imagine that they probably repented. God restores humanity after the Fall through Christ's redemptive act and offers all of us forgiveness (see the Catechism of the Catholic Church, 410).

Christians believe that "the world has been established and kept in being by the Creator's love; has fallen into slavery to sin but has been set free by Christ, crucified and risen to break the power of the evil one" (CCC 421). Creation, therefore, already involves a re-creation in Christ, the eternal Word of the Father. Christ, the "New Adam," who amends for the disobedience of Adam, becomes the point toward which creation's history is directed.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church asks: Why did God not prevent the first man from sinning? "St. Leo the Great responds, 'Christ's inexpressible grace gave us blessings better than those the demon's envy had taken away.'...And the Exsultet sings, 'O happy fault, ...which gained for us so great a Redeemer!'" (CCC 412).

"He who fights with monsters should look to it that he himself does not become a monster." German Philosopher Nietzsche wrote this warning in a collection of proverbs titled "Beyond Good & Evil". He is echoing what Jesus is saying in the gospel today, **"Do not be afraid of those who kill only the body but cannot kill the soul; rather, be afraid of the one who can destroy both soul and body in Gehenna"** (Matthew 10:28). We

may complain most about our bodily, physical hurts, but what is so much worse is what wounds us for eternity: that is, what 'wounds' or 'kills' our souls. Evil's insidious effect is the 'turning', hardening or 'deadening' of hearts. What effect does 'evil' have on us? How are we to respond when evil is done to us? Jesus says 'Do good to those who hate you. Bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you' (Luke 6:28). So how do we respond? God is all good, and we are created in God's image and follow Christ's example, so we must do good! Whatever anyone else does or not, offers no defense for my response. **I am to do good regardless of them**, AND whether any good action of mine is received, recognized, rewarded or not! **And we can count on the not!** Often evil only knows itself, giving back the same, selfishly only perpetuating the ongoing downward fall of itself & everyone/everything it touches. What Jesus and Nietzsche are both saying is that when we look upon evil or struggle with evil, it happens easily enough that we fall under its influence or take up its means, without realizing it! This corrupting reaction amounts to the childish response "They did it to me first!" as if that justifies us saying/doing anything. For example, if someone publicly cries about 'viciousness' or 'meanness' from opponents, that person needs to examine that he or she is not engaging in similar 'degradation' reactively or proactively. Jesus is saying that with an attack, the physical blow or any physical loss is nothing compared to the possible 'loss of trust' or 'embittering of heart' that can happen to the person's soul in response. The greatest effect of the evil is the wounding or corrupting of our souls in reaction to the sin. And that is an evil that we have power to play a part in or not! Even in extreme circumstances, the noble person who is guided by God's grace, finds a way to counteract evil actions **without descending into similar means**. I am reminded of George Washington's reaction to reports of US soldiers preparing to summarily execute some German mercenaries in the Revolutionary War, and he gave the charge, "Absolutely Not!" He wrote **"Treat them with humanity, and let them have no reason to complain of our copying the brutal example of the British Army** in their treatment of our unfortunate brethren who have fallen into their hands" (Order after Battle of Trenton" Dec. 26, 1776). So we must take extra care when confronting sin and evil, whether in ourselves or anywhere. We begin with ourselves. We need to first keep pure our souls, and to purify our intention before acting, even and especially in response to offenses against us. We check ourselves first asking, "What am I about to do, and why I am about to do it?" I need to watch my own soul closely. Monks used to call this **'custody of the heart'**, similar to 'custody of the eyes'. 'Watch what you are watching' and be aware of your influences! The idea was to examine oneself closely and be aware of what was rolling or racing around in one's own mind. If we know what is being stirred up in our own heart,

we can be more aware of what is motivating us to act, feel or speak. Truly this is freedom, that we are as aware as possible of what is moving and influencing us. And St Paul tells us in 2 Corinthians 3:17 "Where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom." Take the example of a wasp, if I am inconvenienced or threatened, and come out stinging, is that free? Or is that just a childish reaction? The ancient Roman poet Horace wrote "Anger is a momentary madness, so control your passion **or it will control you**" (Book I, epistle ii, line 62).

This point of watching oneself and keeping proper control of oneself, is what Jesus meant when he said, "remove the wooden beam from your eye first; then you will see clearly to remove the splinter from your brother's eye" (Matthew 7:5). **I need to check myself first**, before speaking or acting. Is evil motivating me? If I am good, I need to act out of good: act out of love and from God, not out of any selfish gain or for my personal status. An example is given of a good warrior who met his enemy on the battlefield, and as they approached each other, the enemy spit in his face, and the noble warrior turned around and walked away, to fight another day. **He didn't fight that day**, because he realized that if he conquered his opponent right after that spitting humiliation, people would always question whether he defeated his enemy **based on the noble cause** of war defending innocence, **or** simply **because he was angry** and retaliated killing him only because of the insult! The good warrior's nobility reveals the difference. This is why Jesus told his followers that their 'righteousness' had to surpass the Pharisees. Jesus said in Luke 6:33 "And if you do good only to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? Even sinners do the same." **God desires that good overcome evil freely**, and of its own growth and flourishing. Pure goodness is not forced, coerced or imposed. Again, "Where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom" and as Jesus himself taught, the "Truth sets free" (John 8:32). God desires our freedom. God's will is that we freely love others and freely forgive others. In John 10:18, Jesus described this operation of pure goodness in the sacrifice of 'good shepherding' or 'shepherding good'. He described it as the *freedom of laying down one's life and taking up again one's life for others*. **That is the authority of goodness: Service!** Of itself, Goodness freely gives, it freely forgives and so, it freely lives!

Here are some daily questions to consider in our prayer time!

- Sunday:** What grace or message do I feel God gave me at Mass today? In what ways can I share it or use it to bear fruit with others this coming week?
- Monday:** Going back to work, how can I practice what I received from prayer and Mass Sunday?
- Tuesday:** How do I care for my soul? Do I give my soul the proper maintenance and protection needed to keep my faith and nurture its goodness?
- Wednesday:** Pray for an enemy. Specifically ask the Holy Spirit in prayer how you can break through and let go of bad feeling toward them and not be dragged down into negativity.
- Thursday:** God takes care of sparrows. Do I trust God to care for details out of my hands or beyond me? Practice surrendering your will and anxiety each morning to Jesus!
- Friday:** Meditate upon a crucifix, and pray for guidance to offer penance for someone's good.
- Saturday:** For what am I especially grateful to God for and will offer as thanksgiving at Mass?

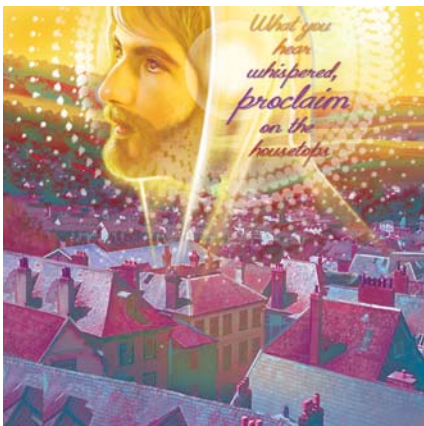

Count to ten . . . blessings

During those dark moments in your life when you are sure God has forsaken you, follow this simple practice endorsed by Jesus: Count your blessings. Think about all that you've been given, the love and mercy that God has shown you and others.

Did you demand explanations for those gifts? Wonder at their fairness or equity? Our suffering may never make sense, but it will be redeemed, in fact it has been redeemed many times over. God's love is stronger than sorrow and death. Abide in that love.

MONDAY, JUNE 26

Drop the judgmental mask

Matthew's gospel quotes Jesus as saying, "Stop judging, that you may not be judged." While you have to make some judgments every day, Jesus forbids judging a person's character, worth, intentions, or standing before God on the basis of what you see. Jesus used the word *hypocrite*, which comes from the Greek word for "actor," someone who wears a mask. The gospel asks that you unmask yourself, be real, and leave it to God to judge.

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 12:1-9; Matthew 7:1-5 (371). "You hypocrite, remove the wooden beam from your eye first; then you will see clearly to remove the splinter from your brother's eye."

TUESDAY, JUNE 27

MEMORIAL OF CYRIL OF ALEXANDRIA, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH

Can you bear to see the divine?

Cyril of Alexandria (c. 375-444) was a divisive and headstrong leader for much of his life and no great role model for saintly living. He did, however, make one lasting contribution to the teachings of the church. Another bishop, Nestorius, had argued that it was impossible that God could ever become fully human in the weak and vulnerable form of an infant. He argued that Christ's divinity must have come later. Cyril defended Christ's dual nature from the beginning—fully human and fully divine—and defended Mary's title as *Theotokos*, "the bearer of God." The next opportunity you have to gaze upon the face of an infant, see if you can catch a glimpse of the divine. Ask God to give you a touch of the innocence and trust you see reflected in that infant's gaze.

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 13:2, 5-18; Matthew 7:6, 12-14 (372). "A scribe approached and said, 'Teacher, I will follow you wherever you go.'"

WEDNESDAY, JUNE 28

MEMORIAL OF IRENAEUS, BISHOP, MARTYR

Christ's love is no secret

Irenaeus (second century), a Father of the church, was mentored by people who knew the first disciples, which might explain the confidence he felt to write five treatises on detecting and debunking heresies. Irenaeus tamed the threat of Gnosticism by his sure efforts to "strip the fox," as he put it, so that no one could mistake the Gnostic's claims of secret spiritual knowledge for the real and accessible message of Christ. Irenaeus wrote of God: "He cannot be seen or described in . . . all his greatness . . . Yet he is certainly not unknown. Through his Word the whole creation learns that

there is one God . . . who holds all things together and gives them their being."

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 15:1-12, 17-18; Matthew 7:15-20 (373). "Beware of false prophets, who come to you in sheep's clothing."

THURSDAY, JUNE 29

SOLEMNITY OF PETER AND PAUL, APOSTLES

Give thanks for the odd couple

Peter and Paul might not have appreciated sharing a feast day. We mean to honor two giants of Christianity, without whom we might not have the church at all. But two more different men would be hard to find. Peter was a Galilean fisherman, impulsive, bull-headed, and rough around the edges. Paul was an educated man of the world, a Pharisee from outside Israel in territory that is now Turkey. These two met rarely and agreed even less frequently. But we value what they taught us about holding the center of orthodoxy (Peter) and pushing the frontier of the Holy Spirit (Paul).

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 12:1-11; 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 17-18; Matthew 16:13-19 (591). "Jesus said to them, 'But who do you say that I am?'"

FRIDAY, JUNE 30

MEMORIAL OF THE FIRST MARTYRS OF THE CHURCH OF ROME

Don't get burned by prejudice

"Nero fiddled while Rome burned," goes the old saying. Some blamed him for failing to fight the fire in a kind of ultimate urban renewal project. Nero himself pointed the finger at Rome's Christians and used the fire as an excuse to persecute them. Not everyone really believed the Christians were responsible, yet many were eager to denounce them for the tired old reason of prejudice. Prejudice still exacts its price in a world that doesn't always care for the truth. Don't fall for it.

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 17:1, 9-10, 15-22; Matthew 8:1-4 (375). "Lord, if you wish, you can make me clean."

SATURDAY, JULY 1

MEMORIALS OF JUNÍPERO SERRA, PRIEST; BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

Be a fool for Christ

Blessed Junípero Serra (1713-84) is one of those figures from church history who can start an argument. He followed a calling to bring the gospel to Native Americans in 18th-century California. Some say he opposed the Spanish colonial authorities' mistreatment of the natives; critics think he was part of the problem. Whatever else can be said of him, he gave himself completely for the missions and the people they served. Every Christian is part of the mission of Christ and his church. A member of the Spanish military said of Serra, "There is no mischief he will not attempt if exasperated." How can you be a missionary in your own way? What mischief can you make for the sake of God?

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 18:1-15; Matthew 8:5-17 (376). "You may go; as you have believed, let it be done for you."

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
