We're called to be generous, but we're also expected to plan for the future, provide for our families, and seriously accept the other responsibilities before us.

It is not necessary to respond to every particular need for which you receive an appeal, no matter how needy or worthy it may be. Choose a representative sampling of charities that you feel you can support, and discard the other appeals. Do so in good conscience. If, in the future, you find yourself to be in a situation where you can be even more generous, then by all means choose to do so.

Who are the Herodians? We hear about this added group of people called Herodians opposing Jesus in today's gospel. Of course, they are identified with the name Herod, and the Herod clan was known to be the Jewish political dynasty corruptly collaborating with the Roman Empire. So, I think of them as a public political group who always sought first to keep their own family candidates in local power over the Galilean and Judean cities and villages. The Pharisees (whose only authority is 'religious example &

teaching') bring the Herodians along to confront Jesus for the purpose of 'politicizing' anything Jesus says, thereby increasing the pressure to silence Jesus. Simply put, the Herodians are 'the muscle'. Understand them as 'the enforcers', and when the 'enforcers' show up, it spells 'trouble'. Think of it like this: if I get a call from the IRS, fine, I'll answer it, gather up documents and talk through the mistake. But when the IRS and the Federal Marshals show up, we are at a more serious level! Just the same with today's reading: the Pharisees and Jesus debate over religious matters a lot. They dispute with one another over interpreting words and offering credible faith witness. Regularly, Jesus exposes their hypocrisy, outlining the errors of their teaching and their showy practices. But when the Herodians come to the meeting, this is new territory. Like too many people in politics, the Herodians are not committed to any cause or lasting value beyond keeping themselves in power. Their only interest is catering to Caesar, and keeping themselves in government office. So, when 'Herodians' enter the picture, this is a 'bad omen' of things to come. The 'ganging up' of the 'good ole boys' Annas, Caiaphas, Herod and Pilate, will lead to Jesus' crucifixion. I am not saying this one encounter between Jesus and the Herodians alone set the 'cross walk' in motion, but it is certainly a whole new ballgame when the Herodians step onto the field.

Personally, I am more interested in what led the Pharisees to reach out to the Herodians. They are betraying their own religious principles by joining forces with Herodians. In Star Wars, we would call that 'going over to the dark side!' ***I don't expect any spiritual leadership from the Herodians*** (they feed on power, not purity), ***but the Pharisees know the Mosaic Covenant, and supposedly have a portion of God's Spirit in their hearts***. We have to ask ourselves, "What led to the Pharisees' desperation, for them to reach out to the Herodians and plot Jesus' death and elimination?" Why are the Pharisees ***so opposed*** to Jesus, not only to try to silence him but also to kill him? Jealousy, spite, anger, fear of being exposed as 'spiritual fakes', their own influence/power being threatened, or the possible revelation of their own past sins or current complicity in sin? I feel like more than just a theological disagreement leads to their corrupt alliance with the Herodians. A dispute over the interpretation of 'Sabbath Rest', does not justify ***calling in the 'hit-men' against Jesus***. But the Pharisees do just this! Their action tells me that the Pharisees have a lot of soul-searching to do. Unfortunately, they do not do it, and we end up at Calvary because of them. But as disciples of Jesus, we need to do 'soul-searching' too, as we might at times shut down God's prophetic spirit through selfish motives.

What can we learn from this episode? Jesus, as always, embodies wisdom and confronts the spiritual hypocrisy of the Pharisees and the political 'cheapness' (spiritual bankruptcy) of the Herodians. Jesus responds by demonstrating some creative 'street theater'! Being asked whether it is lawful to pay the Census Tax or not,

Jesus asks who has the coin it takes to 'pay it'? He says, "Show me the coin!" (***Notice that Jesus does not have such a coin on Him!***) The Pharisees expose themselves by producing the coin. They provide the currency Caesar expects when paying his tax! Then Jesus asks 'whose image is on it?' Of course, Caesar's! Caesar's preening pride takes every opportunity to have his picture and his name broadcast over/ on every public space, on buildings, signs, street titles, city names, even on the money people carry around in their pockets. (Sound familiar?) So, Jesus simply says, "***Caesar made that, give it back to him***". BUT, embodying spiritual wisdom, Jesus reminds everyone that while we give to Caesar what belongs to Him, ***keep in mind what belongs to God and make sure to give God His due!*** Truly, everything belongs to God, yet most pointedly, ***every human being*** (each of us!), ***bears the image of the living God in our souls***. Having been created in the 'image and likeness of God', ***we belong to God***. Caesar can make a coin, yet ***God makes every living being!*** Caesar's image is printed on cold, hard metal, yet God's image is imprinted upon every human being's heart. The image reveals the relation. My connection to Caesar is through a coin, but I am connected to God and each other human being through my heart/soul. The foundation of all Christian life and morality is the statement of Genesis 1:27 "God created mankind in his image; *in the image of God he created them*; male and female he created them." Our identity as children of God, begins by our bearing the image of God within us, and recognizing that every other human being bears that same unifying image. Understanding our identity, and acknowledging others' human dignity gives birth to compassion and guides all right conduct. Our spiritual allegiance is to God, no government. The modelling of our lives is on a 'golden-rule-standard'; the image of God, not Caesar's. So, when it comes to anything Caesar created, we will answer to Caesar, but when it comes to who God has created, ***we will answer to God!*** About Caesar's money, give it back to him, but be sure to ***give your heart only back to God!*** Keep in mind Jesus' words, "No one can serve two masters" (Matt 6:24) Our standard, our 'currency' image is God-given, and so 'saving' only happens through conversion to Him! As the letter to the Ephesians says, "Be renewed in the spirit of your minds, and putting on the new self, created in God's way in righteousness and holiness of truth" (4:23-24) Or also the letter to the Colossians, "Put on the new self, which is being renewed, for knowledge, in the image of its creator" (3:10). We give to God our creator by shining Christ in all creation to others!

Here are some daily questions to consider in our prayer time!

Sunday: Did I hear a message today that called me to change, or maybe confirmed me in a current decision or path? Keep praying about it.

Monday: What image or images rule our lives? What do we look up to, who do we imitate and what do we spend most of our free time doing? Is it godly?

Tuesday: Pray about what it means to be 'created in the image of God' Do I treat myself and others as bearing within the 'image of the living God'?

Wednesday: Do I use my material benefits and goods for 'God's purposes', or only for my own or for merely human ends?

Thursday: Am I careful about exerting any power I have over others? How about starting with myself, am I aware of my own power? Who/what has power over me?

Friday: Perform an act of sacrifice for the good of someone you have hurt in the past.

Saturday: For what am I going to mass to give God thanks for this weekend?

PRAYER AND SPIRITUALITY

A Word from Pope Francis:

"Here is the great novelty of Christianity: a God who, even though disappointed by our sins and our errors, does not go back on his word, he does not stop loving and above all does not take revenge! God loves, He doesn't take revenge! He loves, and waits to forgive us. Just like the Israelites in salvation history, God calls each of us to form a relationship, an alliance, with him. And, the urgency of responding to the call of the Lord with good fruits from His vineyard, helps us to understand what is new and unique in Christianity. This is not so much the sum of prescripts and moral norms, but it is first of all a proposal of love that God, through Jesus, made and continues to make through humanity. In the parable, the tenants mistreat and kill the servants when the master sends them to collect the fruits. The tenants assume a possessive attitude, refusing to hand over the crop. Even when the master sends his son, the tenants kill him in hopes of taking the son's inheritance. That is our human refusal and rejection of God's grace. But Jesus responds that the 'stone rejected by the builders becomes the cornerstone' of a new foundation. God's disappointment for the wicked behavior mankind is not the last word! Through the 'discarded stones' which are symbols of human situations of weakness and sin, God continues to circulate the 'new wine' of his vineyard, which is mercy. The only thing that can impede the "tenacious and tender" will of God is our own arrogance and presumption. His will is to keep on building, keep on growing. (Homily 10-8-2017)

Give a little back**

**MEMORIAL OF JOHN OF CAPISTRANO, PRIEST
Keep the margins in mind**

Mission San Juan Capistrano, of the returning swallows fame, was founded by Spanish settlers on All Saints' Day in 1776 and named for today's saint, Giovanni Capistrano, a 15th-century Italian "warrior priest" who led a Crusade at the age of 70! The Spanish settlers in the Americas were warriors in their own right, taking land and imposing conversions to Catholicism when necessary. At the same time many of the clergy in the missions that dot what is today the U.S. Southwest did their best to ease the harshest aspects of Spanish colonial domination. The church finds itself working within all kinds of social orders and regimes. May it stand with the vanquished and marginalized and for justice and mercy.

**MEMORIAL OF ANTHONY MARY CLARET, BISHOP
Weave a holy life**

Saint Anthony Mary Claret was a successful weaver before he entered the seminary. Born near Barcelona in 1807, he spent the rest of his life—as priest, then bishop—weaving together two strong elements of his personality: the mystic and the man of action. He was deeply prayerful and also a prolific author. He preached more than 10,000 sermons in his life, often to great gatherings of the poor who felt marginalized by the church. He stands as a great example of how to blend prayer and action in our own busy lives. What are the elements in your life that need to be woven together as a beautiful tapestry—your gift to God?

TODAY'S READINGS: *Romans 5:12, 15b, 17-19, 20b-21; Luke 12:35-38 (474).* "Blessed are those servants whom the master finds vigilant on his arrival."

Be ready for a pleasant surprise

In scripture and tradition we remember and celebrate the past—but in the present. What has been applies very much to how we live now. Say a quick prayer asking Jesus to send you the courage you need to face your own trials.

Clear the air

We spend a lot of time worrying about the weather. Nothing captures national attention like a brewing hurricane or a string of tornadoes or an earthquake. Weather programming is a fixture of any local news program, and one of our first questions on waking up in the morning is often, "What's the weather like today?" Not much has changed (except the technology) since Jesus' time. He pointed out that for all the attention folks paid to storm clouds in the west or wind from the south, they didn't seem to be able to tell right from wrong when dealing with one another. Before checking today's forecast, take a moment to examine the "climate" of your interpersonal relationships. Dispel the storm clouds and bring some sunshine to those nearest and dearest.

**FEAST OF SIMON AND JUDE, APOSTLES
Let your faith inform your citizenship**

The apostle Simon is called the "Zealot," a name that suggests he was zealous for the Law or possibly connected to the Zealot movement, which revolted against the Romans in A.D. 66. Perhaps we do better to admire Simon's zeal for God more than his alleged sympathies for violent change. In matters political, let the words of the Second Vatican Council's document on the church in the modern world be your guide: "The church . . . is not identified in any way with the political community nor bound to any political system," the Council wrote. "Christ . . . gave his church no proper mission in the political, economic, or social order. The purpose which he set before her is a religious one. But out of this religious mission itself comes a function, a light, and an energy which can serve to structure and consolidate the human community according to the divine law."

TODAY'S READINGS: *Ephesians 2:19-22; Luke 6:12-16 (666).* "Jesus went up to the mountain to pray."

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
