

***Due to a car accident, my adult son is now impaired in mobility and speech. Can I, his father, accompany him in confession?***

If a penitent needs assistance in communicating to the priest, an interpreter may accompany this person into the confessional. A willing penitent can use the service of an interpreter if the priest, for example, doesn't have signing skills or know the penitent's language (Code of Canon Law, 983.2). (Your question suggests the priest wouldn't understand the penitent without assistance, or he's unable to write anything in advance to present to the priest.)

The interpreter who has knowledge of the sins from confession is always strictly obliged to secrecy. This obligation applies to the sins expressed and to specific counsel and penance given by the confessor. Any interpreter who betrays a penitent may be "punished with a just penalty, not excluding excommunication" (Canon 1388.2). For the confessor, "this secret, which admits of no exceptions, is called the 'sacramental seal,' because what the penitent has made known to the priest remains 'sealed' by the sacrament" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1467).

"Only those who have the use of reason are capable of committing mortal sin. Nevertheless...persons with intellectual disabilities often are conscious of committing acts that are sinful to some degree and may experience a sense of guilt and sorrow" (Guidelines for the Celebration of the Sacraments With Persons With Disabilities, 28). If the individual is capable of having a sense of contrition, even if the sin cannot be described precisely in words, the person may enjoy sacramental absolution. —Fr. Byron Miller, CSSR



### GOSPEL MEDITATION


August 19, 2018 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time

In this Sunday's Gospel, the conflict escalates in the Bread of Life Discourse. Confusion is mounting in the crowd. "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" Their minds were thinking literally, not mystically. Jesus doesn't seem to help, however, and only drives his point home with more emphasis. "Unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you." Jesus would later institute the Eucharist at the Last Supper. There he would definitively establish the sacramental reality in which bread and wine become substantially his own Body and Blood. We celebrate this sacrament in the Mass.

Perhaps we do not always understand what we receive. "My flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink." What is the essence of food and drink? Food nourishes our bodies, providing essential calories for our survival. Water is used throughout the body to cushion joints, regulate body temperature, and protect sensitive tissues like the brain. When we receive the Eucharist, we receive the spiritual equivalent of these essential elements. Like water, the Eucharist strengthens the sanctifying grace moving through us. "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him." The Eucharist connects us intimately to Jesus and confirms our union with him. That is why we abstain from the Eucharist while in a state of mortal sin. It would be a contradiction and deep disrespect to these words of Jesus. To receive the Body and Blood of Jesus is not a right but a gift we receive with deep humility.

As we receive the Bread of Life, grace strengthens our love, separates us from sin -- even wiping away venial sins -- unifies us with the universal Church, and helps commit us to humble service. Together we are nourished for our mission in the world!

What used to be a matter of consuming enough calories for survival has become a national epidemic of obesity. A lot of what appears in our diets isn't even useful for nutrition, and some of it's downright harmful. One thing's for sure: Eucharist is the one meal we can't do without. Better than smart food, it's the table where wisdom is served.

**MEMORIAL OF BERNARD, ABBOT, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH**

**A consummate teacher**

Some people just have a way with words. Bernard of Clairvaux (1090-1153) was one such man. Through his writing and his teachings, he stands out as one of the major spiritual leaders of the Catholic faith. Here's a quote from Bernard that you might meditate on today: "If you should see a starving man standing with mouth open to the wind, inhaling draughts of air as if in hope of gratifying his hunger, you would think him a lunatic. But it is no less foolish to imagine that the soul can be satisfied with worldly things which only inflate it without feeding it."

**MEMORIAL OF PIUS X, POPE**

**Commune more often**

Because he was the first pope to live in the modern age of technology, we know more about Pope Saint Pius X than many others. His life and ministry make a fascinating story, but today remember him as a leader who stressed simplicity and poverty. "I was born poor, I lived poor, and I shall die poor." He is likewise remembered as the pope who encouraged frequent Communion rather than once or twice a year as was common. His change in practice also encouraged frequent celebration of the sacrament of Penance in preparation for receiving the Eucharist. Participate in these sacraments together soon.

**MEMORIAL OF THE QUEENSHIP OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY**

**Our most gracious advocate**

The mother that bore the child Jesus and reared him into adulthood was, in turn, borne up into heaven by the power of the child. There she was deemed Queen, so that she might share the inheritance of Christ with her people. We cry out to her in the antiphon, "Hail Holy Queen, mother of mercy, our life, our sweetness, and our hope." In doing so, we name her by her unique kingdoms, not of land but of virtues. For our share in these virtues we may ask her, who has always concerned herself in our salvation, to intercede on our behalf.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Ezra 34:1-11; Matthew 20:1-16 (421).* "I will give you what is just."

**Thursday, Aug 23, 2018**

**MEMORIAL OF ROSE OF LIMA, VIRGIN**

**Flower power**

Given her beauty, Rose of Lima (1586-1617) could have had her pick of marriage partners, but she preferred to live a simple life of prayer and live in a small hut set in her family's garden. To help her parents financially, she sold the beautiful flowers she cultivated. Aware of the many poor people in Lima, she opened a room in her family's home to anyone who needed her care, asking nothing in return. Great crowds gathered at her death, and her coffin was carried through the city. Rose was the first saint from the Western Hemisphere, and her feast day is widely celebrated in South America with processions filled with flowers. What beautiful creation can you cultivate in the garden of your own life?

TODAY'S READINGS: *Ezra 36:23-28; Matthew 22:1-14 (422).* "Go therefore into the main streets, and invite everyone you find to the wedding banquet."

**FEAST OF BARTHOLOMEW, APOSTLE**

**Just one of the gang**

In every crowd there are leaders and there are followers. There are characters who stick out and those who simply blend in. Bartholomew was one of those invisible ones. He was so transparent in the gospel accounts that he is also identified as Nathanael. All that we know about his ministry and martyrdom is legend, some of it even based on non-Christian stories. We do know for sure that he was one of the 12 apostles chosen by Jesus. And that is enough. We don't have to be famous to get into heaven, just faithful like Bartholomew.

TODAY'S READINGS: *Revelation 21:9b-14; John 1:45-51 (629).* "Nathanael said, 'Can anything good come out of Nazareth?' Philip replied, 'Come and see.'"

**MEMORIAL OF JOSEPH CALASANZ, PRIEST**

**Just doing his Job**

The work of a teacher can be hard. Take the example of Saint Joseph Calasanz (1556-1648), whose great mission in life was educating the urban poor for free, with special attention to the abandoned and homeless children of Rome. He even founded a religious order devoted to this task. By 1611 his school had 1,200 students. But then one of the members of his own community led a revolt against him that resulted in his false arrest and being forced from office. Joseph went through this experience without complaint. Picking up on this fact, Cardinal Prospero Lambertini, who would become Pope Benedict XIV, said Calasanz was a "perpetual miracle of fortitude and another Job." Next time you find yourself in a position to teach someone, remember the great dedication and patience of Joseph Calasanz.
