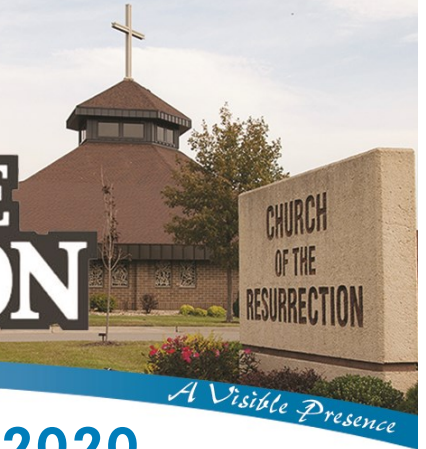

Tim McGraw, the country singer/songwriter, has a song out entitled, "Where the Green Grass Grows." In this song he takes the role of a long distance truck driver who is making his way back home dreaming about moving out into the country "where the green grass grows" to escape the trappings of city living and over the road truck driving. In the song he refers to eating fast food having had another supper in a sack which he calls a "ninety-nine cent heart attack."

Occasionally I patronize a fast food restaurant especially when they promote a new item on their menu. I always rationalize my presence there and the price I pay for those combo meals as it being a trial run and me being a part time food critic. But you know what? In the back of my mind I always know how it is going to make me feel after I gobble it all up. "Man, I shouldn't have done this." I've always wondered why things that taste so good, are always so bad for you?

It is not only the food offered at those establishments that is interesting but it is also those who feed us. Usually they are high school or college students who are just trying to make some money over the summer or throughout the year. Even though it is a good work experience, I am quite certain a good number of them will not make this a lifelong profession. This work doesn't necessarily offer them satisfaction but is a means to an end that is to be more fulfilling.

Now, before I move on, I want to make it clear that I am not demeaning those eating establishments nor is it my intention to belittle the food served or those who work there. Please don't take my Kentucky Fried Chicken away from me! I am merely attempting to make a connection with the scripture readings for this weekend which asks us the same questions, "What are you eating and who is feeding you?"

The prophet Isaiah is speaking out of pity for those who are in exile. Hopeless and under oppression, he reassures them if they partake of the Word of God and continue to follow His commands they will be satisfied. The Word and the Way of God is, according to Isaiah, water for the thirsty; grain for the hungry; wine and milk for the poor. Isaiah encourages them to eat what he has to offer, "Heed me, and you shall eat well, you shall delight in rich fare. Come to me heedfully, listen, that you may have life."

The Gospel also addresses both what we eat and who feeds us as Jesus speaks out of pity for those who are hungry. His disciples, aware of the vast crowds and their conditions, want to send them away. Jesus said to them, "There is no need for them to go away; give them some food yourselves." "But," they said to him, "five loaves and two fish are all we have here." As the Gospel continues, Jesus took the loaves and the fish, blessed and broke them and gave them to the disciples who in turn gave them to the crowd, feeding five thousand with an abundance left over. "**What we eat?**" is the "Bread of Life." "**Who feeds us?**" is none other than Jesus Christ and he does this through the hands of his disciples.

Unfortunately, and you know this as well as I do, the world is very much like a fast food restaurant. Dine in or drive through, we patronize the world with all of its allurements and we gobble them up like supper in a sack – another ninety-nine-cent heart attack. And, what about those people who feed this to us? Are they satisfied with what they are doing and with what they are feeding us?

Maybe we are like the disciples in the Gospel who are, at first, lost without the direction of Jesus and feeling inadequate to feed his people? They wondered just what they had to offer and then how they might attend to such a great crowd? Each of us has a vocation as a disciple of Jesus. The words Jesus speaks to His disciples apply to us today as Jesus said to them, "There is no need for them to go away; give them some food yourselves."

Today, people are still hungry. So, one by one let's give them what we ourselves already have and that is, "Jesus." That, my friends, is Evangelization. And, remember, to be fed by and to feed the Word of God and the Bread of Life to those who hunger for it is both truly amazing and fulfilling. Therein lies our satisfaction as God's beloved.
