

DEAR PARISHIONERS,

"In the desert prepare the way of the Lord! Make straight in the wasteland a highway for our God!" (Isaiah 40:3)

In the readings for the second weekend of Advent we are encouraged to look at the significance of what it means to both repent and experience conversion in our lives. From the prophet Isaiah we hear it is necessary for the people who have been in exile to repent from their sinfulness and drastically change their ways so the glory of the Lord can be revealed to all peoples.

Preparing the way of the Lord or a highway for our God is compared to some major excavation and reconstruction to the landscape. Isaiah speaks of filling in valleys, laying low the mountains and hills, making the rugged land plain and the rough country a broad valley. It is all about repentance and conversion.

From the second letter of Peter we hear the day of the Lord will come like a thief and when he does come so will major destruction upon this land to make way for a new heaven and a new earth. The images used in the scripture include flames in a blaze and elements melting. So, this letter is reminding us to seek repentance as it closes with the last line, "Therefore, beloved, since you await these things, be eager to be found without spot or blemish before him, at peace." It is all about repentance and conversion.

The Gospel speaks of John the Baptist crying out to those who listen to prepare. He is preaching for a repentance that leads to forgiveness of sins and makes ready the way of the Lord, clearing Him a straight path through the desert. It is all about repentance and conversion.

On one occasion, one which is more pointed to the message of today, my parents and the rest of my family were forced to experience a sense of conversion or change. This occasion even uses the images provided for us in the scripture reading of Isaiah and the Gospel of John.

I remember when a new road was built along our farm property, the Bellevue-Cascade Road in 1983-84. Preparing the way of this concrete road included major excavation and reconstruction to the landscape. Isaiah speaks of filling in valleys and laying low the mountains and hills, making a rugged land plain and rough country a broad valley is exactly what happened around our homestead. Our farm was intimately connected to this project because we had to sacrifice some of our property to this end.

The thoughts of a new hard surfaced road were overwhelmingly positive and my parents saw the great benefits it would bring to us and to those around us. Just the whole aspect of avoiding a gravel road was very pleasing to us. We just knew it was the right thing to do.

However, we were not completely ready for the pain we experienced as preparations were made for this road. We were forced to change some of our ways. We had to forfeit some property for this progress as we saw what we knew and remembered as the old gravel road was transformed. Large earth moving equipment was brought in, our land was moved around, dynamite was used to blast rock, water channels were rerouted and trees were removed.

Forced by time, we prepared for the ultimate coming of this road by taking on these changes. Today a healthy growth of vegetation covers the scars created by the conversion of the old road to the new. We really enjoy the new road but it sure was a difficult and demanding change.

John the Baptist preached a demanding religion. When he spoke of repenting, he meant it as a major change in life. The first step in the religion he preached was repentance, to become aware of one's sins and then to publicly acknowledge the need for God's forgiveness. The second step was conversion to actually start living in a different way.

The difficult way of John the Baptist's repentance and the comforting way of Isaiah's smooth road are all part of our life of faith. During this Advent season, as we await in joyful expectation of Christmas time, we also need to live in preparation for the ultimate coming of the Lord at the end of time by taking on changes. We must let the power of God guide us and show us when we need to repent. Then we must change and grow in grace.
