

DEAR PARISHIONERS,

During this holiday season, most of us make concerted efforts to be with immediate and extended family at one time or another. Unfortunately, the pandemic is prohibiting those efforts. Although those types of gatherings may be absent from our Christmas experience this year, we might do well to reflect upon the significance of family life nonetheless. Perhaps this year's **absence** of family may, as they say, **make the heart grow fonder** of family?

Consider the readings and the feast day of the Holy Family may help us focus on the intergenerational significance of family. The first and second readings from Genesis and Hebrews mention the importance of descendants and heirs of faith traditions as they mention our faith ancestors, Abraham and Sarah. Then the gospel of Luke mentions the notion of the fulfillment of a sacred promise recognized by the devout elderly of the community namely, Simeon and Anna.

It seems as though extended families, those including great grandparents, grandparents, parents, uncles, aunts and children is a place in which faith, hope and love reside. It is a place where legacies can be handed on, laughter can be shared and legends can be remembered and retold. At extended family gatherings it seems as though the generation gap closes and we all become united. The incarnation seems to make the most sense in this togetherness.

Family dynamics as well as family systems certainly have changed because of a variety of influences in our culture and time. Even the film industry regarding Christmas movies has picked up on these changes over the years and given us images of families that seem to be polar opposites.

If you can recall in 1971, "The Homecoming – A Christmas Story," revolved around the Walton's family Christmas on Walton's Mountain. Set during the depression era in 1933 this extended rural family, including grandparents (**Zeb**ulon and Esther), prepared to celebrate Christmas together as they waited for the father (John Walton) to make it home in a terrible snow storm. In the movie you would see the family gathered around the table bowing their heads in prayer.

In 1989 (18 years later) "Christmas Vacation" came out featuring the Griswolds. This is a family in the suburbs of Chicago preparing to celebrate Christmas. Remember the ominous doorbell ringing upon the arrival of the two sets of peculiar grandparents? Later on, crazy cousin Eddie and his family show up unexpectedly. They too, gather at the table to bow their heads in prayer with the curmudgeon Uncle Lewis and confused Aunt Bethany who leads them all in the pledge of allegiance.

Our families fit into those categories from the refreshingly sincere to the slightly insane. Somewhere in there is the grace of God that helps us experience the true meaning of the incarnation. Also, somewhere in there the grace of God keeps us from wanting to destroy each other.

I would assume our families are somewhere between the Walton's and the Griswold's. In them we discover the living presence of God, the hope of our future and the light of the world. So, let's pray for our families and be accepting of them no matter where they are on the spectrum of normalcy.

I found the following tribute to families which, I think, helps us appreciate the complexity and uniqueness of family life. A Tribute to our Ancestors by Roy Stockdill called "Rhyming Relations: Genealogy in Verse."

THEY did not choose us, nor we them; we never knew them, nor they us; yet we are inextricably bound together for all eternity and there is no law in the universe, no metamorphosis physical or spiritual, that can ever alter this inalienable truth.

OFTEN, we may wish for different ones and feel moved to deny the ones we have, but this is as futile as it is foolish to invent spurious ones, for our deception will surely be unmasked, if not by others, ultimately by our own conscience.

WE owe everything, our very existence, to our ancestors, and yet we know next to nothing of them because mostly their lives were so humbly recorded. It is good we seek to expand our knowledge of their lives so we may better understand our own.

THEY made us, body and soul, and we must accept without complaint or rancor what they were and what we are, for nothing and no-one can ever change this fact and it is barren folly to dwell obsessively upon it.

WE recognize that the legacy of genetic inheritance is a double-edged sword. We should be grateful for those gifts of personality and disposition our ancestors bestowed upon us which we find beneficial and not rail against those traits we find less appealing, for it is surely in our own hands to change them.

WE should take pride in our ancestors and their achievements wherever possible, whether highborn or low, rich or poor, prince or pauper, and not seek arbitrarily to revile or condemn them for acts of which we know nothing of the causes.

WE must learn from them, from their mistakes as well as their successes; from their tragedies as well as their triumphs; from their sins as well as their virtues; from their hopes as well as their fears.

POSTERITY and history are irrevocably intertwined in the present. No coherent vision of the future can exist without an affinity for the past and cognizance of the lives of our forebears. REMEMBER that we, too, are the ancestors of those yet unborn and we should seek to leave for them a heritage of which they can be as proud as we are of that which our forebears bequeathed to us. WE bless and thank our ancestors for the legacy of the good things they gave us, forgive them their errors and pray that we will endeavor to use wisely the knowledge which they handed down to us.

Jesus, Mary and Joseph, Holy Family of God, pray for us.
