




Parent Handbook:

1. Attendance at Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation
2. Confession of serious sin at least once a year
3. Reception of Holy Communion at least once a year during the Easter season
4. Observance of the days of fast and abstinence
5. Providing for the needs of the Church

With great joy we welcome you and your child into our First Holy Communion Preparation Program! Communion is a sacrament in which those who have been Baptized receive the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist for the first time. This Sacrament will bring your children in further *communion* with the Holy Catholic Church as they will soon be able to partake at the feast of the supper of the lamb.

Some expectations this year include making their First Reconciliation, attend Mass regularly, attend all class sessions, learn their basic formal prayers, and show a desire to receive First Holy Communion.

The enclosed information in this packet will help explain the many components to our Communion Preparation Program. We hope you will take a few moments to review the important requirements needed by your youngster to receive the child in order to receive the Sacrament of First Holy Communion.

Parent commitment statement


Dear Parents,

Roles & Commitment to the Program

A sacrament of initiation The Eucharist is the ritual, sacramental action of giving thanks and praise to the Father. It is the sacrificial memorial of Christ and his body, the Church, and is the continuing presence of Christ in his Word and in his Spirit

The Role of Family in Preparation:

The Christian family is ordinarily the first experience of the Christian community and the primary environment for growth in faith. Because it is the 'church of the home,' the family provides a unique locus for catechesis. It is a place in which the Word of God is received and from which it is extended. Within the Christian family, parents are the primary educators in the faith and 'the first heralds of the faith with regard to their children'

Part of a Parish Community:

Through its faithful witness to the Gospels, the parish is called to help the children to understand the nature of what it means to be members of God's family – coming together in One Body, One Spirit to share the story of our faith through word, symbol and action. The entire parish are invited to walk this journey of preparation with your children through prayer and intention.

The Role of the Catechist (Religion Teacher):

At St. James, preparation for First Sacraments is first and foremost, family centered, calling upon the parent's responsibility accepted at the time of their children's Baptism to raise their children in the faith.

The catechist/religion teacher is a partner with the parent, offering opportunities in the classroom setting to enhance and reinforce lessons learned at home – the Domestic Church.

Workbook:

Children will be asked to bring their workbooks to class on a regular basis to help provide further conversation. We are using the 2nd Grade Finding God book, and for our make up class we will be using Faith Fusion. Each child will also take home a keepsake booklet on Reconciliation and the Mass. Please bring the Mass booklet to Mass each week to help them follow along.

2nd Grade Theme & Objective

- Jesus nourishes us, and strengthens God's life, grace, within us.
- To present Jesus as the model for Christian living, and to introduce the sacraments of Baptism, Penance and Eucharist.

An Overview of the Year

September – December: Classes begin/continue

- Beginning of year parent meeting – During class time.
- Students will be reviewing prayers from first grade.
- Students will be focusing on the Sacrament of Penance.
- Review the keepsake booklet on Penance.

February – First Reconciliation

- Takes place during **CLASS TIME**.
- Students will be focusing on learning more about the Eucharist and Mass
- Review the keepsake booklet on the Mass.
 - Bring the booklet with them to Mass each week to follow along

TBD – First Communion **detailed** parent meeting – During class time.

March – April: Continued preparation on the Eucharist

- Classes end in April
- Continue to work at home to further prepare for Holy Communion:
 - By going to Mass
 - Practicing prayers before bed or when you wake up
 - Watching Formed.org videos
 - Practicing how to receive Communion

May – First Holy Communion

- Each session is assigned a unique day to celebrate the sacrament
- This information is detailed and further outlined during the second parent meeting of the year.

Five steps in receiving the Sacrament of Penance

1. Review the Ten Commandments to remember what sins you have committed.
2. Be truly sorry for your sins.
3. Make up your mind not to sin again.
4. Tell your sins to the priest.
5. Remember the Penance (the prayers, sacrifice, or other instructions) the priest gives you and complete the penance as soon as you can.

How to go to confession — first Penance

Please rehearse with your child the steps for going to confession.

1. Make the Sign of the Cross upon entering the confessional.
2. In a serious, quiet voice say: “Bless me Father, for I have sinned, this is my first confession.” (After the first confession, you say, “my last confession was...)
3. Tell your sins to the priest. (Review the Ten Commandments and use the examination of conscience attached.)
4. Listen to the words of the priest. He will tell you what he wants you to do as a penance for your sins. Remember what he tells you to do or what prayers he wants you to say and how many times he wants you to say each prayer.
5. The priest may ask you to pray the Act of Contrition.
6. The priest will recite the prayer of forgiveness (Absolution) and will say, “Go in Peace”.
7. You reply, “Thank you, Father”.
8. Finally, go to your seat, kneel, and say your penance. Pray to Jesus for help to know the right things to do. Remember to ask yourself, “What would Jesus do?” when you are tempted to do something wrong.

*For the first confession, a priest will meet with each child face to-face and can help them through the process. Candidates need to know the process for future confessions.

*Msgr. Marchitelli will ask for the Act of Contrition to be recited as a group for First Confession only.

An Examination of Conscience

1. Have I used God's name in an unkind way or have I used curse words?
2. Have I missed Mass on Sunday or on Holy Days through my own fault?
3. Have I failed to do my homework and chores through my own fault?
4. Have I failed to pay attention at Mass or when saying my prayers?
5. Have I disobeyed or acted disrespectfully toward my parents, teachers, or other adults?
6. Have I acted disrespectfully toward my brothers, sisters, classmates, or others?
7. Have I been cruel (mean or hurtful) to anyone or any living thing?
8. Have I caused another person to sin?
9. Have I stolen or destroyed property that belongs to someone else?
10. Have I told lies, repeated gossip, or injured another person's character?
11. Have I been greedy, jealous, or unkind to others?
12. Have I allowed myself to become uncontrollably angry?
13. Have I cheated?
14. Have I argued with or purposely hurt anyone?
15. Have I refused to forgive or refused to tell a sin?
16. Do I make a point of "getting even" with people when they hurt me?
17. Have I been too proud to say, "I am sorry," when I am wrong?
18. Did I make my Easter duties?

Easter Duties: It is a Precept of the Church that the sacraments of Penance and Holy Eucharist must be received at least once a year between the first Sunday of Lent and Trinity Sunday; however, Catholics should receive Holy Communion often and go to confession regularly.



First Holy Communion/Eucharist Preparation

When a child who has not yet made First Communion attends Mass, they can still receive a blessing from the Priest or Deacon by crossing their arms like so:



Requirements for First Eucharist:

- Parents are required to attend the parent meetings.
- Students must receive First Reconciliation before Communion.
- Students are to attend Mass regularly.
- Students are to attend all practices.
- Students are to know their prayers, sacrament definitions, and the proper procedures for the reception of the Sacrament of Reconciliation and the Holy Eucharist.

Please make sure your child knows how to genuflect:

- Genuflection is an act of reverence or respect. One should genuflect when walking in front of the Tabernacle or when entering a church pew.
- To genuflect, one must kneel with the right knee all the way to the floor. While kneeling, one should make the Sign of the Cross with the right hand.
- **** For First Communion they will bow before the altar.**
- **Genuflection is important for them to learn for weekly and daily Mass.**

Reception of the Eucharist:

Will be taught to receive with hands. [Parents may teach at home to receive on tongue.]
Fasting an hour before receiving Jesus on Communion day.

Mass Attendance Is Required

Mass attendance is required for the reception of the Sacrament of Reconciliation and Eucharist. It is important for us to “take Mass attendance” because celebrating the Holy Mass is central to our faith as Catholics. It is ONLY during Mass that we receive Jesus in the Holy Eucharist. The Sacrament of First Holy Communion is **THE** celebration of Holy Mass, so it is also important that your child/family become as familiar with it as much as possible.

“The Eucharist is “the source and summit of the Christian life.”
– Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1324

Students will receive “Mass Envelopes” in the beginning of the year. Please keep these in a safe place, perhaps someone’s car! During the collection, the envelope is placed in the basket. Our counters set these envelopes aside for the Religious Education staff to take attendance.

These envelopes are not linked to the envelopes your family may already use or with WeShare. These are separate for the RE Office to keep track of.

Do you have to make a monetary offering? Short answer: No. But it is encouraged for our young people to become familiar with tithing and *why* Christians tithe.

I humbly implore you to make a point to go. I understand that things happen. We are extremely sensitive to that fact. If there are any questions or concerns surrounding this, a meeting should be scheduled with the DRE and Pastor.


- If you attend Mass at another parish for whatever reason, you **MUST** hand in a bulletin to us with the priest’s signature for proof of attendance.

Basic Required Prayers Checklist

Sign of the Cross

In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, Amen.

Our Father (Lord's Prayer)

Our Father, Who art in Heaven, hallowed be Thy Name. Thy Kingdom come. Thy Will be done, on earth, as it is in Heaven. Give us this day our daily bread and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Amen.

Hail Mary

Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee. Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

Glory Be (Doxology)

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit. As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

Act of Contrition

My God, I am sorry for my sins with all my heart. In choosing to do wrong and failing to do good, I have sinned against you, whom I should love above all things. I firmly intend, with your help, to do penance, to sin no more, and to avoid whatever leads me to sin. Our Savior Jesus Christ suffered and died for us. In His Name, my God, have mercy. Amen.

*It is recommended that you pray night with your children before they go to bed. A good practice to begin with your child is to pray The Act of Contrition together.
