"Thus it is written that the Christ would suffer and rise from the dead on the third day and that repentance, for the forgiveness of sins, would be preached in his name to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things." – Luke 24:47-48

Have you ever had the feeling that our world is lost? That it has no direction? That the people that we've elected or those that are in charge seem out of touch with some of the biblical principles we, as Christians, try to live?
