Anointing of the Sick

This Sacrament should be celebrated when someone is acutely ill or going in for surgery or in danger of death.

Baptism

This Sacrament is celebrated after the parents and godparents have reflected on their commitment to live the faith, and have participated in a preparation process that is offered on the first Tuesday of the month at 7:00pm.

Marriage

At least six months advance notice is needed. Please contact the office to start the preparation process.

DECIDE

At the Passover meal, Jesus took bread and said: "This is My body." Then He took a cup of wine and said: "This is My blood, the blood of the covenant". Jesus means this literally. Despite losing many of His disciples because of this, Jesus insisted that His flesh was real food and His blood real drink.

Do you believe that Jesus gives us His body and blood in Holy Communion? The Lord does not want you to "straddle the issue", be lukewarm, or persist in doubt. If you believe in the Eucharistic Jesus, you will try to go to Mass and receive His body and blood daily or as often as possible. In Eucharistic love, you will make visits to church to be in the intimate presence of Jesus, the Blessed Sacrament. If you decide to live the "mystery of faith" in the body and blood of Jesus, you will center your life on Jesus, the Eucharist.

By grace decide once and for all to live and die for the Eucharistic Jesus.

TAKE IT, THIS IS MY BODY... THIS IS MY BLOOD!

Passover includes the partaking of unleavened bread and bitter herbs and the drinking of red wine. The celebration commemorates the exodus or liberation of the Israelites from slavery of Egypt. The unleavened bread recalls the manna given and eaten during their sojourn in the desert. The bitter herbs are a remembrance of their hardship and suffering during their slavery and exile. And the red wine is in memory of their crossing of the Red Sea.

At the Last Supper, however, Jesus eats the Passover with his disciples in view of his passion, death, and resurrection. The bread is now Jesus' body broken and given to the disciples and to humankind: "Take it; this is my body." The red wine is now Jesus' blood poured out for the redemption of the world: "This is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed for many."

We celebrate today the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ. At Mass, the bread and wine are substantially changed by the power of the Spirit into the Body and Blood of Christ

When we celebrate the Eucharist, we are encountering and experiencing Jesus himself. "Christ has given us this memorial of his passion to bring us its saving power until the end of time. At the end of the celebration of the Eucharist, we are sent out to bring to others what we have received, to share Jesus with others, to be Jesus to the world around us.

As we eat his body which he gave for us, we grow in strength. As we drink his blood which he poured out for us, we are washed clean.

CORPUS CHRISTI

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ is also known as the Solemnity of Corpus Christi, which translates from Latin to "Body of Christ." This feast originated in France in the mid thirteenth century and was extended to the whole Church by Pope Urban IV in 1264. This feast is celebrated on the Thursday following the Trinity Sunday or, as in the USA, on the Sunday following that feast.

This feast calls us to focus on two manifestations of the Body of Christ, the Holy Eucharist and the Church. The primary purpose of this feast is to focus our attention on the Eucharist. The opening prayer at Mass calls our attention to Jesus' suffering and death and our worship of Him, especially in the Eucharist.

At every Mass our attention is called to the Eucharist and the Real Presence of Christ in it. The secondary focus of this feast is upon the Body of Christ as it is present in the Church. The Church is called the Body of Christ because of the intimate communion which Jesus shares with his disciples. He expresses this in the gospels by using the metaphor of a body in which He is the head. This image helps keep in focus both the unity and the diversity of the Church.

Universal:

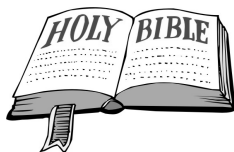
That immigrants and refugees may find welcome and respect in the countries to which they come.

Question of the Week

Liturgy of the Word

Today's first two readings focus on the blood of sacrifice, and even the Gospel dwells longer on Jesus' words over the cup. Often when we think of Eucharist we think of the bread, the Body of Christ. As we listen to God's holy word proclaimed today, it might be good to focus on the blood of sacrifice and the Blood of Christ. What is the significance for you of the Blood of the New Covenant? Do you consume the Precious Blood at Communion? Why or why not?
