Mark 10:46-52

A Letter from Fr. Pablo Bonello

Dear Parishioners,

St. Justin refers to the second part of the Mass, which is the Liturgy of the Eucharist. After the intercessions he mentions the gift of bread, wine and water, which will be changed into the Eucharist:

Then someone brings bread and a cup of water and wine mixed together to him who presides over the brethren. He takes them and offers praise and glory to the Father of the universe, through the name of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and for a considerable time he gives thanks (in Greek: eucharistian) that we have been judged worthy of these gifts. When he has concluded the prayers and thanksgivings, all present give voice to an acclamation by saying: 'Amen.' When he who presides has given thanks and the people have responded, those whom we call deacons give to those present the "eucharisted" bread, wine and water and take them to those who are absent.

I would like to highlight four things:

First, no offertory rite is described, the celebrant takes the gifts with spirit of worship and thanksgiving.

Second, Eucharistic Prayer: We don't find a text to be read: "(The celebrant) *for a considerable time he gives thanks (in Greek: eucharistian) that we have been judged worthy of these gifts.* The celebrant says a prayer according to his inspiration, again, of gratitude and praise because God has considered us *worthy of these gifts.*

Third, the participation of the Church: *When he has concluded the prayers and thanksgivings, all present give voice to an acclamation by saying: 'Amen.'* In the ancient Church the acclamation "Amen" was considered one of the main privileges of Christians. It should be kept in mind today. The Amen of the Eucharistic Prayer is our participation at the offering of the Eucharist, and exercise of baptismal priesthood.

Fourth, Communion: *those whom we call deacons give to those present the "eucharisted" bread, wine and water and take them to those who are absent.* The consecrated bread and wine (with water) are given for communion.

This is the basic structure of the Mass. As we can see, the Profession of Faith, the Our Father, the Rite of Peace, the song "Lamb of God" are not mentioned. They will be added later, until they will the order of Mass will be shaped towards the sixth and seventh centuries.

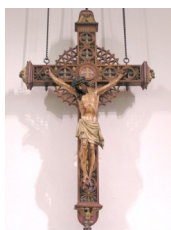
The text of St. Justin helps us to understand what is essential in the liturgy of the Mass: Word of God-Homily-Prayer-Separation of Gifts-Prayer-Communion.
