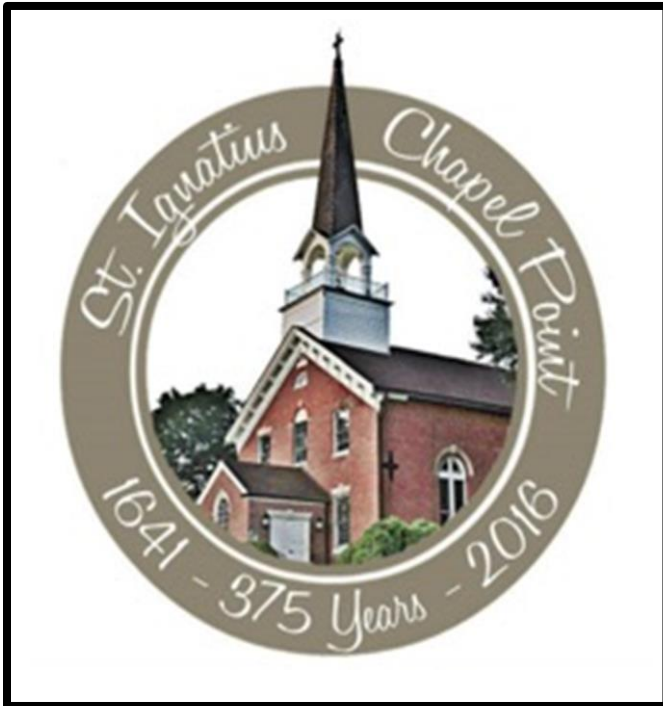

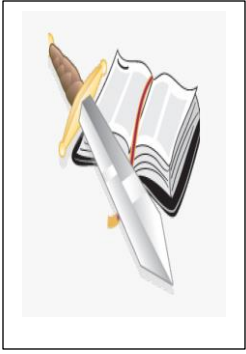

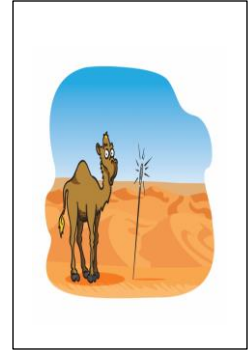
Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults: If you would like to learn about becoming a Catholic, please contact the Religious Education Office. Classes begin at the end of the summer.

What is an ethic of Life? Most Christian and certainly Catholic moral reasoning begin from Biblical and traditional understandings of the nature of God and humans. From there we use the very broad two great Commandments and the somewhat more specific 10 commandments. We understand and specify using our God given powers of reason in a context of faith to arrive at norms for specific situations. All of that really takes hold in our awareness of God and creation.

It is not enough to say the Fifth Commandment says you shall not kill or that the Ninth says you shall not covet your neighbor's wife. We have some tendencies to be jailhouse lawyers, looking for wiggle room. What we need to do is have a sense of God's creation and justice to hold us to a high standard and focus. Christian morality is not just a list of rules, it is a way of perceiving God's call throughout our lives.

When we sit and watch the magnificent sunsets over the Port Tobacco or Big Sky of Montana filled with stars, we seldom see the vastness of oceans. We cannot help but feel that we are part of something much greater than ourselves. As Christians we do not feel oppressed by our smallness, but rather grateful to be a part favored to exist in a world which we could not and did not make. We might also be humbled by the responsibility that we have towards God's creation. It is not a question of determining how to justify what we want to do but how we can do what we are called to do.

In a country which has placed a premium on individual independence, we can easily forget that freedom for Christians allows us to do as we should, not merely assert what we feel at the moment. Existentialism – most associated with atheistic philosophers, suggests that it is not what we decide, but that we decide. We merely need to decide and not be pushed around by external norms. Now we have that odd understanding of life and morality appearing as a principle that appeals to incompatible political extremes. As noted in a prior column "My Body my choice" has become the rallying cry for supporters of abortion and for refusing vaccination protection. The only time my body my choice is the slam dunk justification for any action would be when someone selflessly risks his own life to save another from immanent peril.

If we are ever to be guided by an ethic of life, we must first appreciate the gift that life is, not just to ourselves but to others and to be committed to preserving and improving the conditions for life to thrive.

Mass attendance and Covid Back in June the regional bishops eliminated the dispensation from attending Mass, which had been in effect in the worst of the pandemic. They did however state the obvious, about the obligation to participate in the Eucharist in person. "This obligation does not apply to those who are ill; those who have reason to believe that they were recently exposed to the coronavirus, another serious or contagious illness; those who are confined to their home, a hospital, or nursing facility; or those with serious underlying health conditions." If you are exhibiting sign which may suggest a viral infection, or you are awaiting Covid test results, you should absent yourself, so that you will not be the occasion of illness to others. Covid is most certainly not gone from Charles County, I am aware of more local people who are infected than was the case at the peak. Please help us to put an end to this illness.
