

Dear People of Divine Savior and our Cherished Visitors: Today's Gospel passage is about the raising of Lazarus from the dead. This is a typical love story. Lazarus' sisters acknowledge that Jesus loved him. Two sentences later the Gospel states that Jesus loved not only Lazarus but his two sisters as well. For some reason Jesus delays in going to where the three lived. When he got there, Martha forgot about her love for Jesus when she expressed that had Jesus been there, Lazarus would not have died. Guilt trip! Like the true lover that He is, Jesus leads Martha to a deeper understanding of Himself. She begins with resorting twice to head knowledge in saying that she knows whatever Jesus asks of God will come about. After Jesus reassures her that Lazarus will rise, she says she knows that. Taking her deeper in her awareness of who Jesus really is, He says that he is the resurrection and the life. Martha becomes more heart-felt when she says she believes this about Jesus. Whoops, she takes a step back in saying that Jesus is coming into the world when He is standing right in front of her. As we reflect on how intimately we are aware of who Jesus is, we can easily identify with Martha. We say we know that God loves us. Our goal in life is to believe in the depths of our being that Jesus is the Son of God whose Spirit, in light of second reading, dwells with us. St. Paul says "if only' the Spirit of God dwells in you." Does He or doesn't He? It is an on-going process by which we come to accept deep in our being that the Spirit truly dwells within. We might ask, how can this be when we sin? But God does not extract His love or His Spirit from us when we sin. The more we focus on God's constant Presence within and among us, the more likely we are to transform our lives and become more loving and less focused on sin, imitating the very nature of God. One sign of our deepening belief in God's love is to allow the Spirit, referencing our first reading, to open the graves within us, acknowledge that we have sinned, but allow the Spirit help us realize ever more fully that God focuses on His love for us, a love that does not change because of our sin. We often say that pride is a major sin. It surely is when we get to thinking that our sins can in any control God's view of us or His way of relating with us. Back to our Gospel. Given the lack of love within the people at Lazarus' grave, Jesus becomes perturbed and deeply troubled. In His humanity, Jesus felt like any of us does. The key is what He did about those unpleasant feelings. He stepped toward the grave and with the confidence He had in His identity as the Son of God, He ignored the information about the number of days Lazarus had been dead and commands that the stone be removed, and, acting out His identity, commanded Lazarus to come out. We pray that we, too, acting out our identity as God's beloved people, will who draw one another from all forms of emotional and spiritual death, and help to unwrap one another from our guilt, shame and anything else that hinders our being the person that God created us to be. And be alive!

Reflection from Fr. Marcel —The Gospel narrative for this Sunday recounts another sign, or miracle, found in John's Gospel, the raising of Lazarus. The reading invites us to reflect upon what it means to call Jesus the Resurrection and the life. Jesus reminds us in John 10:10; that he came that we may have life and have it in abundance. The Gospel also calls us to reflect on Baptism as a dying and rising with Jesus. In Baptism we die to sin's power over us, rising as children of God. In Baptism we also join ourselves with Christ, who conquered death once and for all so that we who believe in him; may have eternal life. With Martha and Mary, we are called to profess our belief that Jesus is indeed the Resurrection and the life. As we journey together as one parish family during this time of uncertainty; may we remain resolute, firm, steadfast and unmovable in our faith and trust in the Divine Savior. May we also believe that we shall live to tell the story. In addition, Pope Francis reminds us: "*As Christians we should respond to the pandemic of the virus with the universality of prayer, of compassion and tenderness.*" He also encouraged everyone: "*Let us remain united. Let us make our closeness felt to those who are alone and to those who are most stricken.*" May we remember in our prayers all who have contracted the coronavirus; that God's healing Spirit will ease their symptoms and restore them to health and for an end to the pandemic; that God will guide and inspire everyone working to curtail the virus and help them to employ proper hygiene.
