Mark 6:7-13



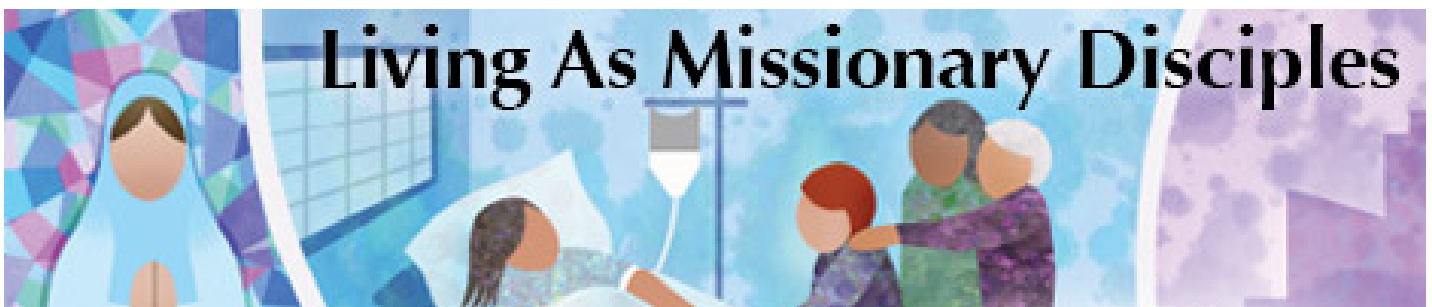

TAKING THE GOSPEL HOME

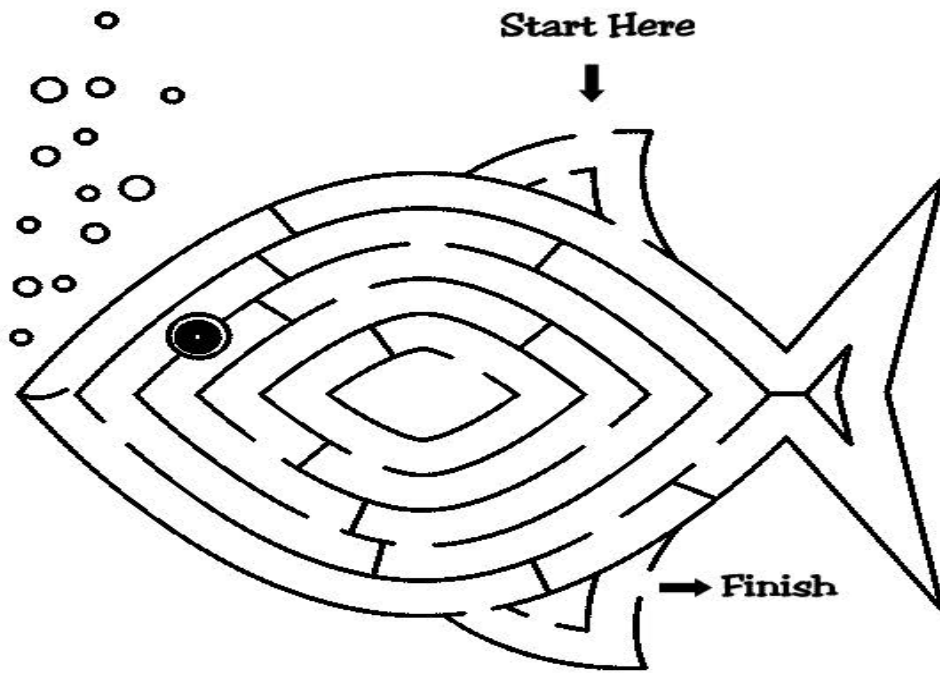
In today's Gospel, Jesus sends his disciples out on a kind of internship. They are not yet fully formed or fully trained. They still have a lot to learn. But they can still do some good work, and this internship will become part of their learning. Jesus is a very good teacher. He does this same thing with us. We may not consider ourselves fully formed or fully trained missionaries, but still He sends us out into the world to spread the Good News by our example, but the way we live our lives, by the way we treat people, and by our words. We are missionary disciples of Jesus Christ today.

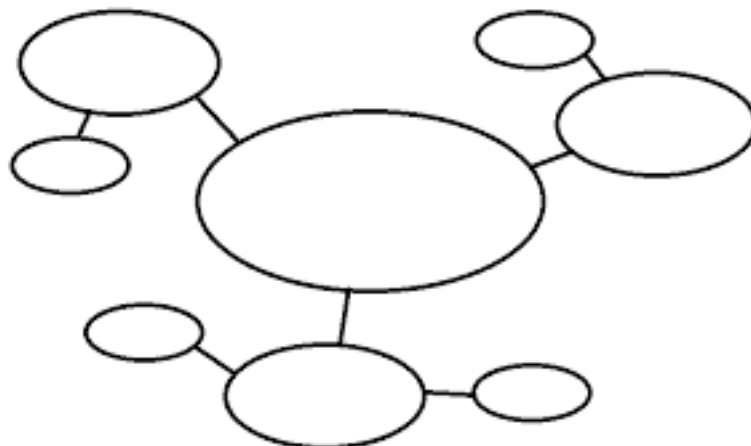

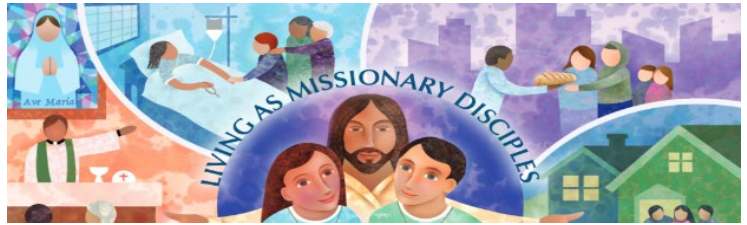
Jesus' Disciples were called to be Fishers of People

THE CHURCH TEACHES WHAT IS A MISSIONARY DISCIPLE?



From *Joy of the Gospel*, an evangelizing church with missionary disciples is described as:

“The Church which “goes forth” is a community of missionary disciples who **take the first step**, who **are involved and supportive**, who **bear fruit** and **rejoice**.

An evangelizing community knows that the Lord has taken the initiative, he has loved us first (cf. 1 Jn 4:19), and therefore **we can move forward, boldly take the initiative, go out to others, seek those who have fallen away, stand at the crossroads and welcome the outcast**. Such a community has an endless desire to show mercy, the fruit of its own experience of the power of the Father’s infinite mercy.

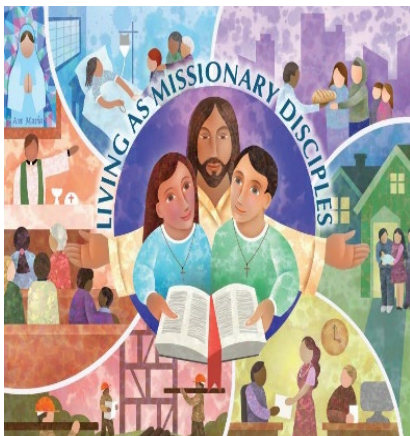
Let us try a little harder to take the first step and to become involved. Jesus washed the feet of his disciples. The Lord gets involved and he involves his own, as he kneels to wash their feet. He tells his disciples: “You will be blessed if you do this” (Jn 13:17).

An evangelizing community gets **involved by word and deed in people’s daily lives; it bridges distances, it is willing to abase itself if necessary, and it embraces human life, touching the suffering flesh of Christ in others. Evangelizers thus take on the “smell of the sheep” and the sheep are willing to hear their voice.**

An evangelizing community is also **supportive, standing by people at every step of the way**, no matter how difficult or lengthy this may prove to be. It is familiar with patient expectation and apostolic endurance...

Finally an evangelizing community is filled with joy; it knows how to rejoice always. It **celebrates every small victory, every step forward in the work of evangelization.**

Evangelization with joy becomes beauty in the liturgy, as part of our daily concern to spread goodness. The Church evangelizes and is herself evangelized through the beauty of the liturgy, which is both a celebration of the task of evangelization and the source of her renewed self-giving. (EG, 24)
