Spiritual Exercise for this week:

Let us pray

O my God, relying on your almighty power and infinite mercy and promises, I hope to obtain pardon for my sins, the help of your grace, and life everlasting, through the merits of Jesus Christ, my Lord and Redeemer.

As we discussed in our previous exercise, Faith is happiness in the mind. It brings to the mind of man the possibility of being with God forever in heaven, the beatific vision. Faith opens the door of our hearts to hope. **Faith** tells us that God is ready to assist us to attain what will make us truly happy. **Hope** is happiness in the heart. We are happy in our heart when we either possess the object of our love through our own efforts or through the assistance of someone else. Hope is a theological virtue meaning it has God as its object. We rely on God's goodness to possess God, Himself. So the divine goodness of God is both the cause and the ultimate object of our hope. We hope to attain the vision of God by our faith and trust in His goodness. Since the object of hope is good, then hope is a virtue in the will of man. Hope moves the will of man to the pursuit of God, Himself. When hope is based on faith and inspired by love, hope can certainly make us happy. What makes us happy is faith in God's goodness leading us to know that God is ready and willing to lead us to happiness.

However, sometimes our faith in God's goodness can falter leading us to sin. The two sins against hope are presumption and despair. Presumption is caused by pride. This happens when we hope to obtain heaven when we know that the way we are living offends God and does not repent. An example of this is "once saved always saved." This false belief is that as long as I accept Jesus as my personal Lord and Savior I can do whatever I want and I will still go to heaven. It is necessary to accept Jesus as our Lord and Savior and equally necessary is that we live like we have accepted Jesus as our Lord and Savior by trying to please Him and do what He asks of us. Jesus said to us in the Gospels "if you love me you will keep my commandments." We hope in God's mercy when we repent of our sins and trust that He understands that we are truly sorry for our sins and want to receive from Jesus the grace to never sin again. He loves us and wants to forgive us and help us to avoid sin in the future. As bad as presumption is a worse sin is the sin of despair. Despair is the false belief that we can commit a sin so bad or so many sins that God cannot forgive us. We lose both faith and hope in God's goodness. Saint Padre Pio once had a man in the confessional who was so very disturbed by the grave sins he had committed that Saint Padre Pio reminded the man of the infinite mercy of God and said to

him "my son God's mercy is infinitely greater than your malice." We can NEVER out sin God's love and mercy. He appeared to Saint Faustina to tell us of His greatest attribute: His mercy. She wrote down what He said about His great mercy in a book called the Diary of Divine Mercy.

God also gives us a gift of the Holy Spirit to help us to trust in His great goodness and love; this is the gift of fear of the Lord which helps to make our hope perfect. There are two kinds of the Fear of God. One is servile fear that turns to God only because he fears being punished by God. The Fear of God that is a gift of the Holy Spirit is filial fear that is we love God as a beloved son or daughter and we fear offending God because we know how much He loves us so we also love Him and do not want to do anything that offends Him. Scripture teaches us that the Fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom. The gift of wisdom begins with Faith because it is through faith that we know the truth about God and His goodness. Once we know the truth about God and His love for us we love Him in return by our actions. For the more we love God less we think of ourselves and fear punishment and the more we think of how we can love and please God. This gives us a greater knowledge of how truly awesome God is and we love Him more and, therefore, have more confidence that we will not only escape punishment but also possess God forever in heaven.

Let us examine how much we love and trust God. Do I allow the thoughts of my sins to discourage me and cause me to lose trust in God's goodness? Do I wonder sometimes if God has really forgiven me? Do I sometimes do something I know is wrong with the idea, "Well, I can always go to confession later?" When I do think this way do I confess the sin of presumption? Do I avoid telling sins to a priest in confession because I am ashamed of my sins? Is the real reason I am sorry for sins because I fear punishment or because I love God and am so sorry I offended Him? It is important to know that even if you are only afraid of punishment that is good enough to go to confession and have your sins forgiven, this is imperfect sorrow for sin but God is so good He forgives our sins even when we are confessing them because we are afraid of punishment. It is better, however, to confess our sins because we know how much God loves us and we are so sorry we have offended Him who has loved us so much. Let us give our sins, all of them to God, and trust in His love for us and seek to love Him more and more every day.

Let us conclude this exercise with a Divine Mercy Chaplet. Trusting in the great mercy of God which as Saint Padre Pio would say is "infinitely greater than our malice." JESUS I TRUST IN YOU!


Message from Fr. Vu:

Twenty-fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reading 1 SIR 27:30—28:7

Wrath and anger are hateful things, yet the sinner hugs them tight. The vengeful will suffer the LORD's vengeance, for he remembers their sins in detail. Forgive your neighbor's injustice; then when you pray, your own sins will be forgiven. Could anyone nourish anger against another and expect healing from the LORD? 
St. Barnabas Food Pantry
