Dear St. Charles Parishioner:

This is Fourth of July weekend; traditionally our mid-summer holiday as well as our national birthday. Two hundred forty-four years ago, our patriot ancestors pledged “their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honor” in crafting a document declaring our independence from England. But brave words were not enough; there followed seven years of struggle in the Revolutionary War. With our freedom secured, a republican form of government was proposed and then achieved by democratic means. We know the names of those heroes: Washington, Adams, Jefferson, Madison... The list could go on. We call them the Founding Fathers.

They were not perfect; few people are. A wise observer once put it this way “every saint has a past...and every sinner has a future.” *But they are our history.* It is sad today that their monuments and statues are being vandalized, defaced, torn down, or demolished. The objection seems to be that people of the seventeenth, eighteenth, and nineteenth centuries did not have the values and the understanding of the twenty-first century; therefore, the memories of them should be erased. That seems an unfair and an unjust way to judge those who went before us.

I am seventy years old and I have seen, in my life, some major changes in society. I think it is honest to say that, in 2020, we are a more tolerant, more accepting, less prejudiced, and more compassionate people than we were fifty years ago. True, we have not yet overcome all the barriers and boundaries that may divide us. But our history should not be destroyed, it should be used to educate: *“this is what people believed back then, but we know better now.”* Another wise person once wrote, *“those who do not learn from history are doomed to repeat it.”*

Where do we draw the line? How long before there is a demand to go through our libraries and find those books with unpopular, outmoded, and outdated beliefs? When will we start the book-burning? Sad to say, but unless saner heads prevail, *just maybe it could happen here!*
