PASTOR'S NOTES: I talked last week about that first line of the Gospel for the Sunday, "When Jesus heard of the death of John the Baptist, he withdrew in a boat to a deserted place by himself" (Mt 14:13). Jesus obviously felt he needed "alone time" with God after such a good man died in the manner he died. Of course Jesus did not get any quiet time instead he was faced with a hungry crowd and "his heart was moved with pity for them, and he cured their sick" (Mt 14:14). If someone is truly sick in your family or someone you care about is sick, there is a burden upon you as well. Jesus' merciful hand reached out to tend to them even though he had plans of being in a deserted place with God. In last week's gospel story there ends up being quite a commotion and he fed over 5,000 men not counting women and children from the five loaves and two fish his disciples brought to him. Now this week the story continues and we hear that Jesus sends his disciples ahead of him, he dismissed the crowds and "After doing so, he went up on the mountain by himself to pray. When it was evening he was there alone" (14:23). Stop and listen to the quiet Jesus must have have experienced in the evening, alone... I have been up on high places alone, nothing but the wind sounds, and your thoughts, but it makes a difference if I am actively trying to pray or talk to God. Are you comfortable with being alone with your thoughts and hopefully talking to God? I have to admit

that it always takes an effort to get me to that place, although once I get in that guiet place dedicated to God, it is very rewarding. Eucharistic adoration can be that quiet place or going to the church alone when nobody is with you. There is one place in the Rutland, ND area called "windy mound," a high place on the prairie that is inspiring. But the beauty of the prairie is that you can always be on top of the mountain in a sense. At the top of the mountain you can see quite far and experience the sky in a big way, and maybe experience yourself as small, a reality that one must accept. Elijah had that experience of being alone in the cave in the first reading 1 Kings19:9 ff. There is a few verses skipped in our reading from this Sunday, but I think they are very important. God asks Elijah in the quiet, "What are you doing here Elijah?" Isn't that a reflective question? "Tim, what are you doing here in Oakes and Forman?" What are you doing here on this earth? The quiet invites us to listen. Elijah found the Lord's voice in the guiet whispering sound. Such a voice can only be heard in the auiet, in a auiet church, maybe in the wilderness, on the wild prairie aravel road, in the field, on top of the mountain, and sometimes on the sea. Fr. William Sherman of the Farao Diocese (a priest who taught sociology at NDSU) used to say that the same kind of things that draw sailors to the big sea is what draws prairie people to live where they live. Things can get wild in a hurry in those places. One new arrival to ND called the prairie in the winter, "Cold, harsh, unforgiving and beautiful." You have to trust and maybe risk. Peter stepped out of his comfort zone when he stepped out of the boat, I am sure. People who take leadership or work in the church, often times, have to "survive the dangers of leadership" about which one author wrote. I think a key part of finding Jesus' voice is opening ourselves to being alone with God in the quiet as Jesus did. Fr. Tim
