THE YEAR OF ST. JOSEPH
(Terror of Demons)

Pope Francis has declared the year **2021** to be a special “*Year of St. Joseph*.” In his official litany, St. Joseph is called “*terror of demons*” and “*patron of the dying,*” and “*protector of the universal Church.*”

Indulgences Offered!

What’s an *indulgence*? An indulgence is the remission of the temporal punishment due to sin. In the Sacrament of Confession, Jesus offers us forgiveness of our **eternal** punishment due to our sin. But, **temporal** (temporary) punishment may remain. We need to be purified of that in this life, or in Purgatory. During this Year of St. Joseph, the Church has given us special opportunities to gain a *plenary* (which means a full or total) indulgence:

A Man of Faith: Saint Joseph, an authentic man of faith, invites us to rediscover our filial relationship with the Father: to renew our devotion to prayer, to dispose ourselves to listen and correspond with profound discernment to God’s will. To gain the plenary indulgence: Contemplate the Lord’s Prayer for at least 30 minutes or participate in a Spiritual Retreat of at least one day which involves a meditation on Saint Joseph.

A Just Man: The virtue of justice, practiced by Saint Joseph in an exemplary manner and spurs us to rediscover the value of silence, prudence and integrity in carrying out our duties, is full adherence to divine law,—which is the law of mercy. To gain the plenary indulgence: Fulfill a corporal or spiritual work of mercy after the example of St. Joseph.

Guardian of the Holy Family: Saint Joseph was the guardian of the Holy Family, spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the legal father of Jesus, and inspires all Christian families to recreate the same atmosphere of intimate communion, love and prayer that was lived by the Holy Family. To gain the plenary indulgence: Recite the Holy Rosary as a family or an engaged couple.

Worker of Nazareth: Pope Pius XII instituted the Feast of Saint Joseph the Worker so that “the dignity of work be recognized by all, and that it inspires social life and laws, based on the fair distribution of rights and duties.” To gain the plenary indulgence: Daily entrust your life to the protection of Saint Joseph and invoke his intercession, so that those in search of work may find employment and the work of all people may be more dignified.

Comfort of the Afflicted: Pope Francis said that the flight of the Holy Family to Egypt “shows us that God is there where man is in danger, where man suffers, where he runs away, where he experiences rejection and abandonment”. To gain the plenary indulgence: Recite the Litany to Saint Joseph or some other prayer to Saint Joseph, for the persecuted Church and for the relief of all Christians who suffer any form of persecution.

Patron of the Universal Church: this year celebrates the 150th anniversary of St. Joseph being named patron of the Universal Church. To gain the plenary indulgence: Recite a legitimately approved prayer or act of piety in honor of Saint Joseph. The Handbook of Indulgences contains two prayers (the Litany of St. Joseph and “*To you, O Blessed Joseph*”; they can be downloaded from www.fargodiocese.org/st-joseph) and mentions a third (the *Little Office of St. Joseph*).

Hope of the Sick: St. Joseph is comforter of the sick and patron of a happy death. To gain the plenary indulgence: The elderly, the sick, the suffering and all those who for legitimate reasons are unable to leave their house, and who with a soul detached from any sin and with the intention to fulfil, as soon as possible, the customary conditions in their own home or wherever the impediment detains them, shall recite an act of piety in honor of Saint Joseph, faithfully offering to God their suffering and the hardships of their life.

Requirements to Gain A Plenary Indulgence:

- Perform one of the devotions listed above
- Receive Holy Communion (20 days before or after the devotion is performed)
- Go to Confession (20 days before or after the devotion is performed)
- Say prayers for the Pope’s intentions (an Our Father, Hail Mary and Glory Be)
- Have the interior disposition of complete detachment from sin, even venial sin

Also of Note:

- * Only one plenary indulgence can be gained per day
- * The plenary indulgence is applied only to the person himself or to a soul in Purgatory
- * One sacramental Confession suffices for several plenary indulgences, but a separate Holy Communion and a separate set of prayers for the Pope’s intentions are required for each plenary indulgence.
