KNOW YOUR FAITH

EMBER DAYS are three days set apart for fasting, abstinence, and prayer during each of the four seasons of the year. The purpose of their introduction was to thank God for the gifts of nature, to teach men to make use of them in moderation, and to assist the needy. Possibly occasioned by the agricultural feasts of ancient Rome, these seasons [embertides] came to be observed by Christians for the sanctification of the different seasons of the year. The Ember Days are known in Latin as the *quattuor anni tempora* (the "four seasons of the year"), or formerly as the *jejunia quattuor temporum* ("fasts of the four seasons"). Each season has an individual flavor, arising from the Liturgical season or feast or the time of year it falls. In addition, the original harvest focus meant focusing on different harvests for each quarter. Advent was the olive crop, Lent (the last of the Ember Days) gave thanks for the gift of light and rebirth, wheat for Pentecost, and September was the grape harvest. This week we observe the autumnal Ember Days, which always fall on the week after Holy Cross Day [September 14th, the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross]. Ember Friday this week is an obligatory day of abstinence for all members of the Ordinariate.

So the servant fell on his knees, imploring him, 'Lord, have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' And out of pity for him the lord of that servant released him and forgave him the debt. But that same servant, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat he said, 'Pay what you owe.' So his fellow servant fell down and besought him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' He refused and went and put him in prison till he should pay the debt. When his fellow servants saw what had taken place, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. Then his lord summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked servant! I forgave you all that debt because you besought me; and should not you have had mercy on your fellow servant, as I had mercy on you?' And in anger his lord delivered him to the jailers, till he should pay all his debt. So also my heavenly Father will do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother from your heart."

SISTINE CHAPEL CHOIR TO PERFORM

Wednesday, September 20, 2017 at 6 pm
In the Upper Church of the Basilica Shrine
Free and open to the public.

Seating is first come first served.
Sponsored by the Catholic Arts Council, the Sistine Chapel Choir will be performing in the U.S. for the first time in more than three decades. This group of 30 boys and 22 men is considered the most prominent Catholic ensemble and oldest choir in the world. Affectionately known as the "Pope's Choir," they will sing a repertoire of classical sacred music in the magnificent Great Upper Church of the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception [400 Michigan Avenue NE, Washington DC 20017]. The Shrine is easily accessible by car with free parking available; it is also accessible via Metrorail, on the Red Line at Brookland/CUA.

THE KOREAN MARTYRS

Christianity was first introduced to Korea during the late Joseon Dynasty period. In 1603, Yi Gwang-jeong, Korean diplomat, returned from Beijing carrying several theological books written by Matteo Ricci, a Jesuit missionary to China. He began disseminating the information in the books and the first seeds of Christianity were sown. Evangelization was difficult because Korea refused all contact with the outside world except for taking taxes to Beijing annually. Nonetheless, when a Chinese priest managed to enter secretly a dozen years later, he found 4,000 Catholics, none of whom had ever seen a priest. Seven years later there were 10,000 Catholics. In 1758 King Yeongjo of Joseon officially outlawed Catholicism as an evil practice. Roman Catholicism was again introduced in 1785 by Yi Seung-hun.

During the terrible persecutions that occurred in the 19th century (in 1839, 1866, and



1867), one hundred and three members of the Christian community gave their lives as martyrs. Outstanding among these witnesses to the faith were the Korean priest, Andrew Kim Taegon, and the lay apostle, Paul Chong Hasang.

Andrew Kim Taegon was the first Korean-born Catholic priest and is the patron saint of Korea. Kim's parents were converts and his father was martyred for practising Christianity. After being baptized at age 15, Kim studied at a seminary in the Portuguese colony of Macau.

He also spent time in study in the Philippines,

where today he is also venerated. He was ordained a priest in Shanghai after nine years (1844) by the French bishop Jean-Joseph-Jean-Baptiste Ferréol. He then returned to Korea to preach and evangelize. During the Joseon Dynasty, Christianity was suppressed and many Christians were persecuted and executed. Catholics had to covertly practise their faith. Kim was one of several thousand Christians who were executed during this time. In 1846, at the age of 25, he was tortured and beheaded near Seoul on the Han River.
