

KNOW YOUR FAITH

FRANCIS XAVIER SEELOS, (January 11, 1819 – October 4, 1867) was a German Redemptorist missionary to the United States. Seelos was born in Bavaria in 1819, one of 12 children born to Mang Seelos and Franziska Schwarzenbach. Having expressed a desire for the priesthood since childhood, he entered the diocesan seminary in September 1842.

While in seminary, Seelos felt called to work as a missionary in the United States. He was accepted by the Redemptorists, and sailed from Le Havre, France, to New York in 1843. On December 22, 1844, Seelos was ordained a priest in the Redemptorist Church of St. James in Baltimore, Maryland.

He worked first at St. Philomena's [Pittsburgh] as curate to St. John Neumann, the Redemptorist Superior of the time. Fr. Seelos was soon named Superior and Novice Master, as well as pastor of the parish. In 1854, he was named pastor of two parishes in Baltimore and Cumberland, Maryland; in 1862 he added a parish in Annapolis to his responsibilities. From 1863 until 1866, he dedicated himself to the life of an itinerant missionary, preaching in English and German in the states of Connecticut, Illinois, Michigan, Missouri, New Jersey, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island and Wisconsin.



Seelos was assigned in 1866 as Pastor of St. Mary of the Assumption, New Orleans. However, his ministry in New Orleans was brief. In September 1867, exhausted from visiting and caring for victims of yellow fever, he contracted the disease. After several weeks, he died on October 4, 1867, at the age of 48 years and 9 months.

That every individual soul has a **GUARDIAN ANGEL**, though never defined by the Church, nonetheless has been the “mind of the Church,” as St. Jerome expressed it: “how great the dignity of the soul, since each one has from his birth an angel commissioned to guard it.”

The Old Testament depicts God's angels as His ministers who carry out special tasks regarding men and mundane affairs. Angels deliver Lot from danger; in Exodus, an angel is the appointed leader of the host of Israel, and God says to Moses: “my angel shall go

before thee.” The story of Tobias might serve for a commentary on the words of Psalm 90:11: “For he hath given his angels charge over thee; to keep thee in all thy ways.”

In the New Testament, Christ set a seal upon the Old Testament teaching: “See that you despise not one of these little ones: for I say to you, that their angels in heaven always see the face of my Father who is in heaven.” (Matthew 18:10). From this we see that even little children have guardian angels, and that these same angels do not lose the vision of God by the fact that they have a mission to fulfill on earth. Hebrews 1:14 states: “Are they not all ministering spirits, sent to minister for them, who shall receive the inheritance of salvation?” This is the function of the guardian angels; they are to lead us, if we wish it, to the Kingdom of Heaven.

According to St. Thomas Aquinas, our guardian angels can act upon our senses (*Summa Theologica* I:111:4) and upon our imaginations (I:111:3) – not, however, upon our wills, except by working on our intellect, and thus upon our will, through the senses and the imagination. (I:106:2; and I:111:2). Finally, they are not separated from us after death, but remain with us in heaven, not, however, to help us attain salvation, but to enlighten us with their angelic ministry (I:108:7, ad 3am).
