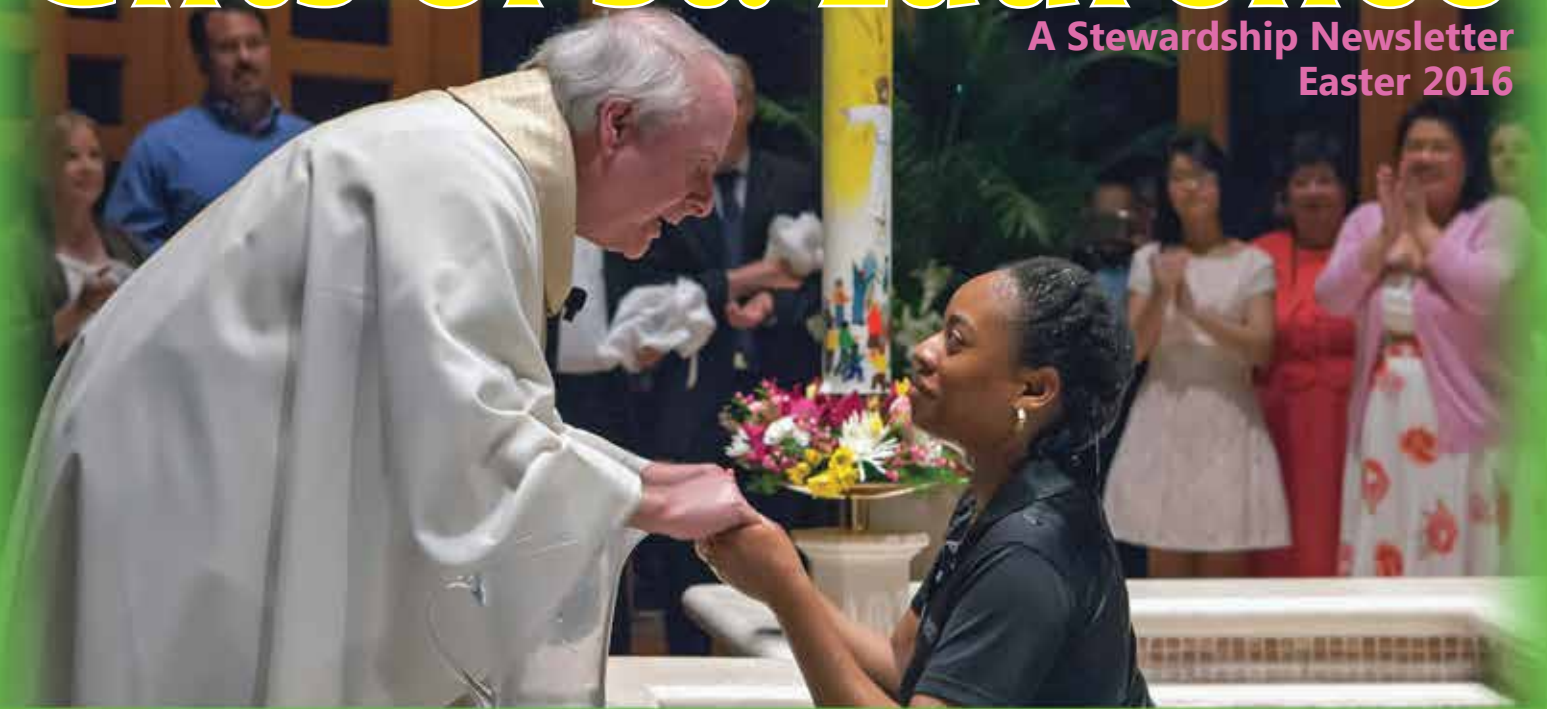

My dear parish family,

Happy Easter! Even the word 'Easter' has the sound of happiness and hope. Easter is the reality for Our Lord Jesus and the destiny for his people. Appearances notwithstanding, we are destined for eternal communion with the resurrected Christ. As St. Paul writes, "If we confess with our lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in our hearts that God raised him from the dead, we shall be saved."

Authentic Easter faith necessarily leads to interior freedom, joy and a loving life. Easter faith shuns nihilism and despair. This doesn't mean our earthly lives are easy. The Cross is the only way to Easter, for Jesus and for us.

I love these two Psalm passages. They speak vividly to me of the experience of Easter.

Psalm 116:

"How gracious is the Lord, and just;
our God has compassion.
The Lord protects the simple hearts;
I was helpless so he saved me.

Turn back, my soul, to your rest
For the Lord has been good;
he has kept my soul from death,
my eyes from tears
and my feet from stumbling.

I will walk in the presence of the
Lord in the land of the living."

Psalm 66:

"For you, O God, have tested us,
you have tried us as silver is tried:
You led us, God, into the snare;
you laid a heavy burden on our backs.

You let men ride over our heads;
we went through fire and through water
but then you brought us relief."

Many of you need a healthy dose of that relief and refreshment right now. May that Easter joy pour upon us and on the whole world! For all these 50 days of the Easter Season, may we sing the Easter 'Alleluia' and never cease to praise him.

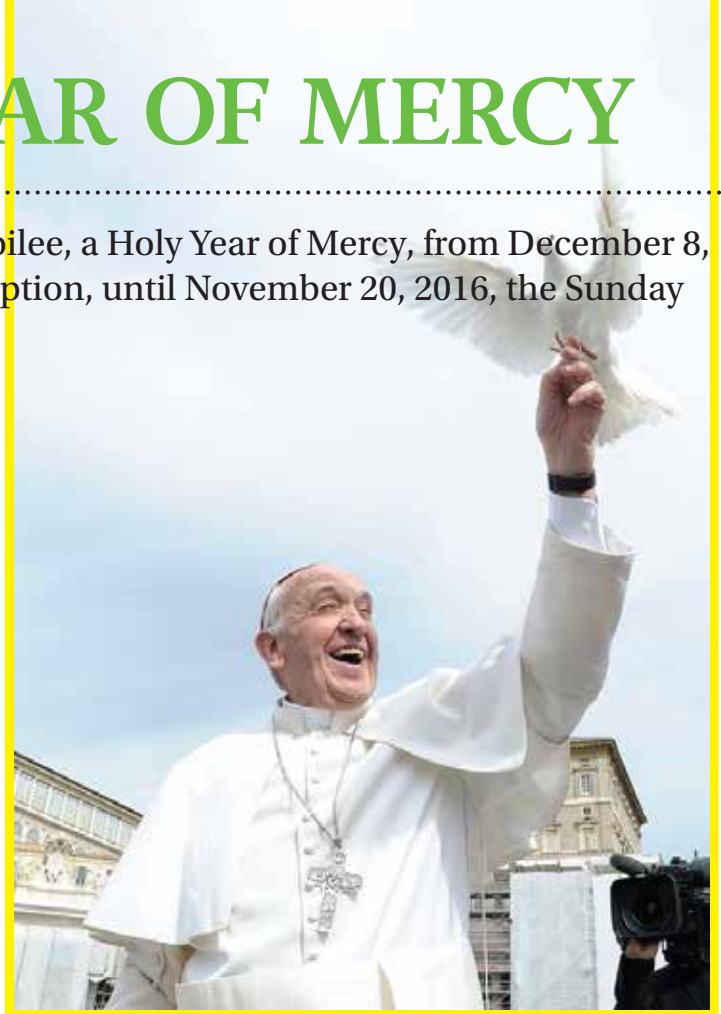
We Live in an Era of Mercy

A Message of Divine Mercy

The Divine Mercy devotion is based on the writings of St. Faustina Kowalska, an uneducated Polish nun who lived 100 years ago. Her diary, *Divine Mercy in My Soul*, records the revelations she received about God's mercy. Even before her death in 1938, this devotion had begun to spread and on the Second Sunday of Easter of the Jubilee Year 2000, at her Canonization Mass, Pope John Paul II proclaimed to the world that "from now on throughout the Church this Sunday will be called Divine Mercy Sunday."

Tuesday Morning Bible Study is a weekly Bible study with 100+ men and women members, now in its 13th year. It has grown over the years, primarily through friends inviting friends – people eager to learn more about God’s Word. TMBS originally started in the old St. Laurence Religious Education Center. But since that facility had no elevator, some members’ participation was limited because they could not join in the small group break-outs. Our space was limited, but the study was blessed and continued to grow.

When the construction of the Ave Maria Parish Life Center began, the concern was finding a facility large enough for TMBS to meet. We were blessed again when Sacred Heart Parish in Richmond agreed not only to allow us to use their space, but to merge their TMBS with ours! We spent 1½ years at Sacred Heart, where they welcomed our whole big group with open arms and hearts! Jesus blessed us with new friendships and a whole new experience in studying the Word of God. When it was time to return to St. Laurence, we left with mixed feelings: sad to leave our new friends, but joyful to be coming “home” to the new Ave Maria Center.

Now in our beautiful new building, we see how Jesus is blessing us in new ways! The large kitchen and serving area allow us to gather for fellowship before the session begins. Marian Hall gives us ample room for the whole group to gather for praise and worship and to view the DVD lecture (on two screens!) with a state-of-the-art sound system. Small groups meet on the second floor in 10 different meeting rooms and there is an elevator for those who need it.

Our current study of the *Book of Revelation* by Jeff Cavins will wrap-up April 12. We look forward to starting up again in the fall, when we will study *Acts: The Spread of the Kingdom*. All Things NEW

Who doesn't love new things? A new outfit or haircut can boost one's confidence. A new toy will keep us entertained. A new household appliance grants assurance that things will continue to work smoothly around the home. And, who doesn't love that 'new car smell'? New things are the best! God understands this reality, I believe, because he created this reality. In the book of Revelation, Jesus speaks these powerful words: "Behold, I make all things new" (Rev 21:5). Maybe we've heard this verse before, and maybe for some it even sounds a bit cliché, but let's take a moment and really think around what Jesus' words imply.

All of us have some old, broken stuff in our lives. Maybe we find ourselves in a bit of a rut; a cycle that we can't break free from. We've made some mistakes. We've done things we regret. We've hurt others and we've been hurt, too. We are running on our own strength, and we are running on empty. What would happen if we stopped trying the same old tricks and self-help mantras and rather invited God into our lives in a new and personal way? What if we stopped trying to recycle what God wants to replace?

St. Paul gives us a hint at what may happen in his second letter to the Corinthians: "So whoever is in Christ is a new creation: the old things have passed away; behold, new things have come. And all this is from God, who has reconciled us to himself through Christ" (2 Cor 5:17). This is God's promise to you and me, to remove and replace all of those things in our lives that are dragging us down and keeping us from being the world-changers we are called to be.

And how do we know this is true? How can we trust this? We simply have to look at the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Not only did our God decide to become man, but he freely chose to die for us. Somewhere along the way we began summarizing the Gospel with the terms bad and good. "We were bad, so Jesus came to make us good." It is a nice thought, but that simply isn't the case. We weren't bad, we were dead, spiritually dead. He didn't come to make the bad good, but the dead alive. If he didn't hold himself back from the cross back then, why would he hold himself back from us today?

St. Paul, again, reminds us in his letter to the Hebrews, "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever" (Heb 13:8). And the story doesn't end with the cross! The God who raised himself from the dead will also bring life out of the deadness in our hearts. When we look to the empty tomb, no matter where we find ourselves today, we can look towards tomorrow with hope as we are reminded that Jesus came, not just to restore, but also to renew and resurrect.

Whatever brokenness or hurt you are dealing with in your life, remember – for the believer, pain is always temporary. So, this Easter season, let us turn away from those same old things that weigh us down and turn our attention to the new – new things God wants to work in our lives.

God makes all things new.

What is the Triduum?

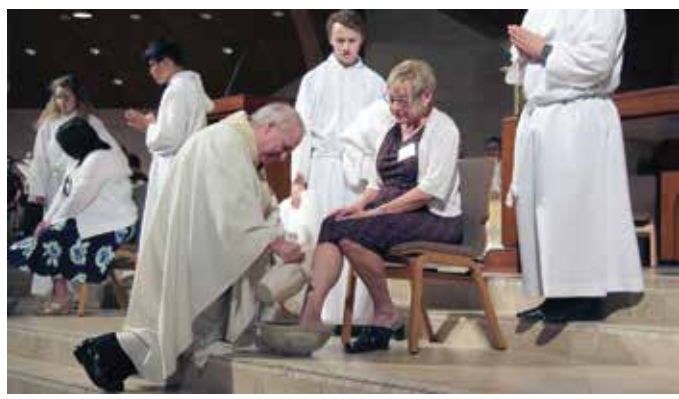
The Easter Triduum (pronounced *trid-oo-uhm*) begins with the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, includes the Solemn Good Friday liturgies, reaches its high point in the Easter Vigil, and closes with Evening Prayer on Easter Sunday.

HOLY THURSDAY

Mass of the Lord's Supper

7:00pm in the Church

Rich in symbolism, this Mass is the ritual reenactment of the Last Supper. All three priests concelebrate, the bells are rung during the Gloria, holy oils consecrated by Cardinal DiNardo are presented, and the feet of 12 parishioners are washed by our priests, just as Jesus washed the feet of his disciples at the Last Supper. At the end of Mass, we sing *Pange Lingua* and process with the Blessed Sacrament to the parish hall, where some will stay in Adoration keeping vigil with the Lord.



GOOD FRIDAY

Solemn Good Friday Liturgy

3:00pm and 7:00pm in the Church

This celebration of the Lord's Passion is offered twice at St. Laurence, to accommodate the large crowds that come for this solemn liturgy. The altar is stripped completely bare and the tabernacle is empty. Fr. Drew asks for everyone to wear red, the liturgical color for this day. The Liturgy of the Word is proclaimed; everyone, young and old, comes forward to adore the Cross, and Holy Communion is distributed during this profound service.



EASTER VIGIL

8:30pm in the Church

The Easter Vigil is the greatest and most noble of all solemnities and by its very nature, takes place at night. Everyone gathers around a large fire blazing on the church plaza. The paschal candle is lit and from this candle, everyone lights a candle of their own before walking into the darkened church. Multiple readings from the Old Testament trace the history of God's people until we sing the Gloria, and the lights come on fully and the bells are rung! It is at this Mass that people are baptized and confirmed. It is a glorious Mass that should be experienced by every Catholic at least once!

Alleluia! This is the day the Lord has made, let us be glad and rejoice! Two extra Masses are offered to accommodate the many people who come to Easter Sunday Mass. This day is the beginning of the 50 days of the Easter Season – and every Sunday year-round is a commemoration of this Sunday.



Try Something New!

In September 2015, our parish conducted a survey of adult parishioners, called the Gallup ME25 Survey. Over 3,800 parishioners participated, giving us feel for the spiritual engagement of our parish. Two months later, the results were broadcast to the parish (see the complete report at www.stlaurence.org/get-engaged) and in January 120 ministry leaders gathered to identify these four specific areas of priority:

1. In my parish, my spiritual needs are met.

3. In the last six months, someone in my parish has talked to me about the progress of my spiritual growth.
4. In the last month, I have received recognition or praise from someone in my parish.

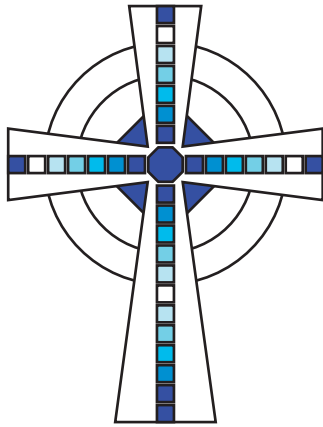
