



New Horizons
Healing and Hope

Our first reading reminds us that we are to remain faithful to God even in the midst of difficulties. One saint who lived this out well with Mother Theresa of Calcutta. Mother Theresa was born in Albania in 1910. In 1928 **she took a leap of faith** as she joined the Sisters of Loreto and in 1929, she arrived in India.

In 1937 she became a teacher in the Loreto Convent School in Eastern Calcutta and was made headmistress of the school in 1944. She became disturbed by the abject poverty in Calcutta. On September 10, 1946 while traveling by train to the location of her annual retreat God called her to leave the convent and to help the poor while living among them. In 1948 she left the Loreto Sisters and began her missionary work in the slums of Calcutta and in 1949 she was joined by 13 young women who had been former students of hers. In the first years she had no income and had to beg for food and supplies. She was tempted to go back to her former way of life but she believed this was the life to which God was calling her.

During the last 50 years of her life, she experienced what has been called a Dark Night of the Soul. She could not experience the presence of God and it became difficult to pray. While she felt abandoned by God on a deeper level, she knew that God was with her. While it was difficult to pray, she at least sat in God's presence. In spite of this suffering, she continued to bring the healing and love of Christ to a world that suffered.

Our first reading is from the Book of Job. In the Book of Job, Satan goes to God and tells him that if Job loses the blessings in his life than he will no longer be faithful to God. God allows Satan to take away much of Job's property, his children and a disease afflicts his body. As a result, he is oppressed by sorrow. Out of his sufferings, he lays out his agony before God. Through it all he remains faithful. The Book of Job does not answer the question, "Why do people suffer?" Instead, the book presents a man who is faithful in the midst of his sufferings.

Job speaks of the suffering and drudgery that Jesus came to heal. This day in the life of Jesus includes an exorcism, the healing of Simon's mother-in-law and then heals a crowd of individuals. Jesus brings wholeness and liberation to the lives of those who suffered. Jesus is the Spirit-filled Stronger One who has come into the world to lift up those who are sick and burdened and to relieve the heavy weight that crushes them.

The disciples tell Jesus that the mother-in-law of Simon has a fever. Jesus goes over to her bed, and takes her by the hand and raises her up. The verb that is used for raise is *egeiren* and is one of the verbs used to refer to the raising of Jesus from the dead. This healing is a sign of the fullness of life in the kingdom of God and foreshadows the resurrection. The response of Simon's mother-in-law to the healing of Jesus is to take care of their needs. Thus, she goes from healing to discipleship. She participates in the mission of Jesus' disciples. We are to serve in the same way.

The Gospel shows that Jesus came to bring hope to a world of suffering. Jesus had compassion or suffered with the people of his time and in the same way the Risen Christ has compassion on those who suffer today. We are to not only receive this healing and hope but instead to encounter and make a difference in the lives of those who suffer in our world today. We are to bring them Christ's healing and hope.

5th Ordinary Sunday B

As a refresher, let us first have a quick glance at the books of the Bible, particularly those of the Old Testament. They are classified into:

1. Historical Books

- a. The Pentateuch(=Torah): Genesis, Exodus, Numbers, Leviticus and Deuteronomy
- b. Joshua, Judges, Ruth, 1&2 Samuel, 1&2 Kings, 1&2 Chronicles, Ezra, Nehemiah; 1&2 Maccabees, Tobit, Judith, and Esther

Didactic (Wisdom, Sapiential) Books: Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes (Qoheleth), Song of Songs, Wisdom, and Sirach (Ecclesiasticus).

Prophetic Books

- a. Major Prophets: Isaiah, Jeremiah, Lamentations, Baruch, Ezekiel and Daniel
- b. Minor Prophets: Hosea, Joel, Amos, Obadiah, Jonah, Micah, Nahum, Habakkuk, Zephaniah, Haggai, Zechariah, and Malachi.

This division corresponds roughly to the division of the Hebrew Old Testament: 1- **The Torah** or Law 2- **The Prophets** 3- **The Writings**

Our today's first reading comes from the book of Job, one of the seven books of wisdom. This book appears to be written by an Israelite living in the pre-abrahamic period. The fact that the author is familiar with later Jewish customs and traditions might be attributed to the additions injected in the work for the purpose of instructing younger generations. Neither Job's wife nor his friends Eliphaz, Bildad and Zophar seem to care about his beliefs and his staunch faith, strongly sticking to them. They almost drive him crazy with their roaming minds and discouraging discourse.

What had happened? The man lived in Uz, a region thought to be covering at the time, either the Southeast of the Jordan River or the area of Southern Arabia. He was rich and happy with thousands of sheep and camels, hundreds of oxen and donkeys, plus many servants. His family numbered seven sons and three daughters. Despite of all these blessings, Job remained a devoted and pious person without any stain of pride or self-aggrandizement. God watched him and found him honest and virtuous. Satan became irritated, denounced him and asked God to be allowed to test Job. One after another, his livestock and servants were pillaged and killed by the Sabeans (those people living in South Arabia and Yemen), destroyed by fire and looted by the Chaldeans. The last straw that exacerbated the matter was the collapsing of the house over his sons and daughters that instantly killed them.

Job did not flinch at none of the acrimonious events that befell him. He remained steady in his principles. Once again the Devil was not pleased. He demanded "his bone and his flesh" thinking Job would cave in and curse God. He did not. Satan engineered an ugly predicament: loathsome sores from head to toe (2:7), worms and dirt covered his whole body (7:5), sleepless nights (7:14), bad breath, disfigurement, emaciation, fever, pain day and night, etc. Job protested, lamented but never blamed God.

When somebody is a bad guy and terrible things happen to him we applaud the punishment inflicted by God and consider it as normal. We think he deserves it. But when an upright and righteous man suffers like Job, we are dismayed and wonder why. We adopt the attitude of Job's friends that judges and labels the person undergoing hardships as a culprit, who has done something wrong, and is now pretending to be innocent. The story of Job is about the mystery of suffering, the problem of human suffering to teach us that at the end of the tunnel there is light, there is hope; there is eternal bliss with God. Job is a hero, a martyr of Satan's machination. Fortunately he was not trapped in despair and hurt. Pain nourished his courage and bravery. He did not give up. He bounced back with God's many fold blessings at the end of his trials and tribulations. His property was restored "twice as much as he had before" (42:10).

Suffering in its multifaceted aspects continues today to disturb ourselves, our brothers and sisters, our families, our relatives and friends. The instigator, roaming around us, accusing us day and night before the Father (Rev 12:10), can only be defeated by our trust in God and our perseverance in holding onto his word and precepts.

Jesus' response to suffering was shown through his tireless visits to towns and villages to restore health to the cripples, the lepers, the possessed, the dead and so forth. He preached a message of love and forgiveness and made it a legacy for his followers to alleviate the pains of our brethren: to be life-givers not life-takers. He does not forget or ignore our friends and family as he did for Simon's mother-in-law. We only have to bring them to him in prayer and sacrifice.

THE GOOD NEWS

Today's readings begin with a few verses from the book of Job. First, Job complains that his nights drag on endlessly. Then, worse yet, "My days are swifter than a weaver's shuttle; / they come to an end without hope" (Job 7:6). Not exactly encouraging, these lamentations, not when taken alone.

Most of us have been there, though, and the antidote is the "good news" that Paul found so compelling that "an obligation has been imposed on me, and woe to me if I do not preach it!" (1 Corinthians 9:16). Paul felt driven to announce the gospel to as many people as possible, "to save at least some" (9:22).

This good news is the mystery of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ, who lifted Simon Peter's mother-in-law from her sickbed with a mere touch of his hand. "The whole town was gathered at the door. He cured many who were sick with various diseases, and he drove out many demons" (Mark 1:33-34)). Our woes and demons are as real as Job's, and Jesus is our savior.

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FEAST OF FAITH

The Gloria (1)

The Gloria, or Glory to God, follows the penitential rite. Both are acts of praise. In the penitential rite, we sing of the mercy of Christ. In the Gloria we praise God's saving action in the universe.

The Gloria is a relatively late addition to the Mass. It first appeared in the Roman liturgy in the sixth century, and then it was sung only by the pope—and only on Christmas! With time, the hymn came to be sung by bishops on major feasts, and then by priests; finally, it became the song of the entire assembly. With the advent of more elaborate musical settings, the people gradually stopped singing the Gloria, until this song of the people became the exclusive domain of the priest and the choir. But the liturgical reforms have restored it to its place as primarily the song of the assembly.

The language of the Gloria echoes the New Testament canticles. It may be begun by the priest, the cantor, and the entire assembly in varied combinations. The Gloria is sometimes called the "greater doxology," and in some ways it is like an extended, ecstatic version of the familiar doxology ("Glory be to the Father") prayed in the Divine Office and the rosary. —Corinna Laughlin, Copyright © J. We reopened in September, 2020. On the clothing side, SVdP permits only 2 persons at a time come in for clothes. No "friends in need" are allowed to come in on the food side. Food is brought to them down the ramp. It's been slower than usual. With so few allowed to come in, the weather plays a part of the slow down. Waiting outside in the cold is no fun. We try to rush as much as possible. To catch up a little, in November we gave out 51 Thanksgiving baskets with a hen. We set up our table outside to give each family a basket. It was warm and sunny so we actually enjoyed it. We were so blessed by your generosity in your food donations for Thanksgiving with so few people coming to church in this serious COVID season. Our angel tree went well, too. All the angels were taken off the tree the first weekend! We lowered the age of the children this time from infant through 12 years to infant through 10 years. We had only 27 family families consisting of 70 children. Again, your generosity was very appreciated.
