Dear Parishioners:

Music has always been a part of my life. My Mom played her 33RPM albums it all day using a turntable stacking spindle. I remember her stacking too many albums on the spindle. When the first album attempted to drop, the whole stack of 12 albums dropped onto the turntable. But now there were too many albums and they slipped on each other causing the top album to produce a warble and not a beautiful song. Today I use an iPod, which has my 5000+ song collection, and play music all day. One of my favorite artists is Frank Sinatra. Last night I watched the documentary "Frank Sinatra – All or Nothing at All", which tells his life story from his family's arrival at Ellis Island to his death in 1998. Many of you may have an opinion him that goes beyond a singer or an actor. The press played up his Mob ties and he was a target of the anti-communist movement of the McCarthy era. But Frank was also a Catholic who felt called to those roots. Catholic social justice was a big part of his life. He fought for many causes but his top concern was for the way minorities were being treated. The documentary was very well made and showed a side of Frank Sinatra that I did not know about. When it was over I felt as if someone close to me had just died and there was sadness in my heart.

As I lay in bed that night my thoughts turned back to the documentary. An image began to form where my life, our lives, is like a commuter train ride. When I was younger I used to use the CTA train in Chicago. You enter the train at one point and exit at another. There are riders that get on at stations before you. And they may leave before or after you. I began to think that all of human history in terms of birth, life, and death are like my CTA experiences. Sitting on that train I neither knew where the other riders came from or where they went when they left. Our paths crossed for only minutes so I seldom talked to any of them. The image that formed in my mind was full of mystery and emotion. Where do we come from? But more urgent, as someone who is entering the twilight of life, where do we go when we die?

This week is also mysterious and filled with emotion. We are on that train ride, but with one special passenger, Jesus. And unlike my experience in the past, he talks to every passenger that ever has or ever will ride that train of life. We share in the emotions of his life, through the happy times and the sad times of our life. By his example we are called to talk to the other passengers we meet, even if it is just for a moment. We may be the one thing someone needed without knowing it. And he answers that age old question by his resurrection on Easter. Heaven awaits those who step off that train having heard his words and believed. Death is not the end, rather it is a new beginning. May this Easter bring you glorious joy and peace.

PRO-LIFE NEWS AND NOTES: The **40 Days for Life spring campaign** has come to an end and we learn that **454 babies have been saved from abortion**, due to many prayers, with reports continuing to pour in. * When an abortion-minded mother arrived at a Milwaukee abortion facility she was surrounded by five escorts so as not to be swayed by sidewalk counselors waiting to give alternatives to abortion. The woman happened to park in a tow-away zone, so she came out to re-park her car, providing Dan, a volunteer, time to tell her about the local pregnancy assistance center. When she came out of the abortion center; Dan spoke with her again asking about her baby and her needs. The mom decided not to abort her baby. *In Tunja, Columbia a woman visited an abortion center and had a pregnancy test; the abortion workers told her the best option was to abort her child. She decided to leave the facility. The volunteers outside were holding signs that said, "You are Not Alone". They helped the mom to find a pregnancy test at a pregnancy assistance center where the test came back positive and she received support and encouragement which led her to choose life. *In Chula Vista, CA two young women on different days approached the sidewalk volunteers crying after they read the signs and the people praying; one woman was two months pregnant and the other was being pressured to have an abortion. Both women decided to choose life. *In Kent, Washington, just outside of Seattle, the Planned Parenthood facility became the 110th abortion facility to go out of business during or after a 40 Days for Life campaign. Our gracious God answers prayers and honors the commitment of the pro-life warriors committed to saving moms and babies. Continue your daily prayers to end abortion, euthanasia and all assaults against life. Senate Pro-Life Caucus chair, Steve Daines, has called Xavier Becerra, newly-confirmed HHS Secretary, "the most radical pro-abortion cabinet official that I've probably ever seen". Becerra has revived all 14 felony charges against David Daleiden, the lead investigator for the Center for Medical Progress; Mr. Daleiden, you will recall, took undercover videos of Planned Parenthood executives talking about their sales of aborted baby body parts and tissue. Instead of going after Planned Parenthood for its grisly practices which are against the law, Becerra and Kamala Harris before him, decided to ruin David Daleiden's life and use him as an example for others not to follow in his footsteps. Also in his role as California attorney general he positioned himself against pro-life pregnancy care centers and the Little Sisters of the Poor at the Supreme Court. Daines says he expects similar cases to arise and that we will see more of these attacks on issues of conscience. The same day Becerra was confirmed as HHS Secretary last week, the Biden-Harris administration announced it would be canceling the Protect Life Rule and re-writing the Title X family planning program to allow taxpayer funding of abortion businesses.
